## JACK DEMPSEY WILL BECOME COAL MAGNATE

Next Few Months to Bring Fortune to the Heavyweight Champ; Jack Will Not Draw the Color Line and Will Fight Wills If It Can't Be Arranged.

**NEW YORK.** May 10.—After sitting in the field of all contentions and bargaining more than a cool million in cash in the next eight months, Jack Dempsey will retire from the ring and become a coal magnate of the West, the heavyweight champion says.

Jack Kearns, who handles the business affairs of Jack Dempsey, the fighter, and William W. H. Darrow, the coal baron, will not say that his charge is contemplating a retirement, but he does admit:

"After we have settled up with Gleason, Whilard and Firpo there will be no other fight, and we will have to occupy our time with other interests."

He says that the boxer has fought, said, "as a promoter to assume the consequences and contributions to the Dempsey fortune if he so desires, Kearns admits that he is the only man he would trust to get the best deal for his old friend Dempsey." Wille, manager of the champion, has said, is a promoter to assume the contract, that the two signed a long time ago.

Some doubt exists here that Wille wants to fight the champion or he would have the opportunity at this time to stage a mighty blow about disengagement.

With the exception of a show which might profit by a Dempsey-Wille fight very far removed the colored fighter, who is an ever-sorely handicapped for the championship, it has been heard reported that Wille has declined to quit the game.



## DAM NEEDED FOR FULL PRODUCTION

Returns from all parts of the territory within the bounds of the proposed American Falls district indicates a coming victory for the bonds Saturday. It is of interest to all that these carry. It is true that there is only a shortage of water on the average once every five years, and this affects only the latter part of the season, but in every instance that this has taken place, the total crop at the end of the season has been more than enough to build the claim. There is no real reason why such shortage might not occur more frequently. The time of observation covered is not sufficient to say that it is an invariable law that such shortage shall occur in five-year periods. It is true that there is an argument to the effect that owing to over-production, the more people raise the poorer they are. Carried to its logical conclusion this would mean that if the country were not irrigated at all, all the people would be millionaires. Whether there is a nation-wide over-production in anything or not, is beside the question here, since it is clear that the difference between large or small production on this tract makes virtually no difference in the national production. The man who has 2000 bushels of wheat or 2000 tons of sugar beets is better off than the man who has but 1000 of either, and everyone who stops to think about the matter knows it.




