Greece Escapes Worst Evils of Refugee Invasion By Efficient Work of American Red Cross.

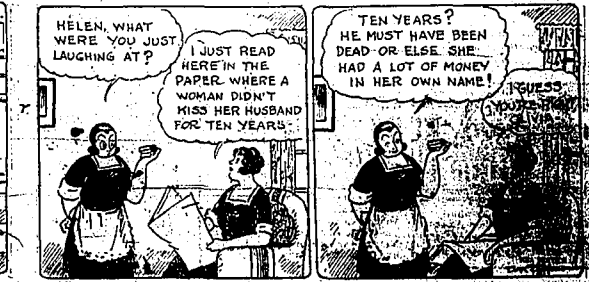

BERRY MEN WILL PLAN SHIPMENTS

Important Meeting Will Be Held at the Home of L. S. Otto Tonight on Subject of Marketing Small Fruit Profitable Crop.

Definite propositions regarding the shipment of berries will be made at a conference of the committee appointed at a recent meeting with L. S. Otto, vice president of the Idaho Producers Union, which will be held at the Otto home at Five o'clock.

Some time ago the committee, which consists of A. E. Henderson, J. A. Waters and W. D. Averitt, was appointed at a meeting of berry men in talks on the subject with Mr. Otto. A conference was held a few days ago at which time Mr. Otto did not have in his possession all the information required. He received this information yesterday. The question whether the berry growers will ship through the union will be considered.

There are many berries planted this year. The Kimberly Nursery company has a splendid field of five acres of raspberries. Mr. Henderson has eight acres of strawberries. But there are other kinds. Messrs. Averitt and others have many berries. There are others. It is believed that if satisfactory arrangements can be made for shipment organization can be pushed and more plants in time shipment a little later in the season, and the profits greatly enhanced. Even as it is, berries have proven very profitable on the Twin Falls tract and can be made much more so.

Painted Copper.
Eighteen pieces of painted copper, offered for sale in North Wales oil tags, were bought for \$125 by an agent for a group of London art dealers. The dealers reacquired the metal among themselves. The highest bid was \$2,250. The successful dealer then sold the lot to a private collector for \$2,500, who in turn sold them to the South Kensington museum for \$4,000. Resembling, says Elmer Henon in the Staffer magazine, these pieces of "painted copper" proved to be an altar piece by Pentland, the great French encaustic. The Paris Louvre has an expert by this artist, which it values at \$2,000. Encaustic is one of the oldest arts, says Henon. It was done in India and China centuries before the Western world developed it.
