## BOUT BETWEEN DEMPSEY AND WILLS LOOMS

If Allowed Tex Rickard Will Put Them in the Ring Together in September; Rickard Shows Sudden Interest in Proposed Mill...

NEW YORK, May 22.—Tex Rickard stepped suddenly into the ranks of promoters seeking the proposed Dempsey-Wills heavyweight championship match this morning. Rickard went before the New York boxing commission seeking information if the bout could be held in this state. If the commission will permit this bout to be staged, I will make the two principals to meet under my jurisdiction early in September, Rickard said. He had not made any effort to get the match in the past because he had thought it would not be possible to get official permission. Wills through his manager, Paddy Sullivan, has put it up to the state boxing commission to designate him as a challenger for the heavyweight championship to rule him out of the game. Almost a year ago, Wills went through the formality of filing an official challenge for a championship bout and posting a certified check for \$2500 as a guarantee. Sullivan has now called upon the commission to announce what to be done about it, and the commission is up against the necessity of declaring itself. Wills must be given a chance if boxing is to remain as a legal pastime in New York.

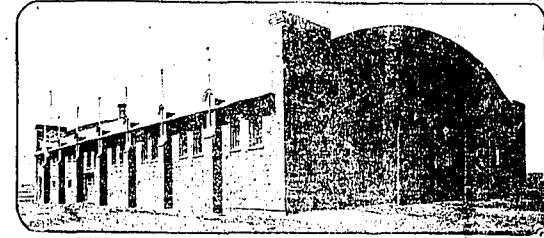
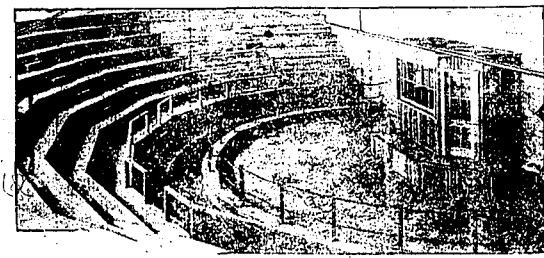
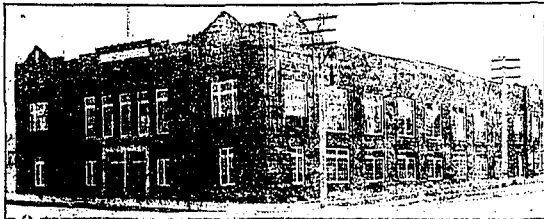
