CRIME NEWS AND THE NEWSPAPERS

Professor John B. Waite of the law school of the University of Michigan, an acknowledged authority on criminal law, has little patience with the criticism directed toward the newspapers that devote too much space to reports of crimes committed and that in so doing it but serves as a textbook in crime for the potential criminal.

This is indeed an interesting statement, particularly so when we hear complaint lodged against the press for printing so much on crime as it develops in the current news. The newspapers have been severely and we are inclined to think unthinkingly criticized because they print the facts about crimes in various forms.

Frankly admitting that he has an particular interest in the complaint that newspapers serve as textbooks for potential criminals, Professor Waite said that perhaps, through the publication of crime details, and the frequent exposure of faults of procedure, certain instruction in ways and means are given to impressionable minds, "that that is inevitable so long as crime and its methods exist as facts," he declared, and then he added:

"To my mind newspapers publish not too much fact, but too little. If the long run the public cannot suffer through knowledge of the truth, if they get the whole truth and nothing else. To deny the value to the people of facts and all the facts, is to slander the whole idea of democracy. It is never knowledge, but ignorance, that leads to blundering public action, and perpetuates the evils of popular government and misguided personal action.

"They who urge censorship of the news on the ground of political expediency suggest inequity on the part of the people. Possibly I am myself a fanatic in the enthusiasm of my belief that we Americans, as a people, are capable of guiding our actions better and more wisely than any intellectual oligarchy can indirectly guide them for us, and so I suggest that not less news of crimes be printed but more. To print the results, to the criminal, of the crimes he has been convicted of committing, to let the public know what the punishment has been for these misdeeds, is backing up the effects of administering justice."

Professor Waite called attention to the fact that originally punishment grew out of the desire for vengeance by the person injured. It was imposed by the state merely out of desire to keep the peace by regulating it and limiting its scope. Punishment cannot be abolished, he pointed out, without leading to an outbreak of illegitimate vengeance. He called attention to the Russian Czars, Vlodimir I and II, who tried to abolish the death penalty, with the result, in each instance, of a widespread development of private feud and reprisal murders. "Even today a general failure in administering criminal justice would inevitably produce lynch law or 'vigilante' action," he said, and recalled that only a few months ago a judge on the bench referred to punishment for crime as the "fighting of a past wrong; the avenging of the oppressed."

There is much that is true to what Professor Waite says. Wider publicity of crime and the punishment that follows might be a preventative of crime.
