

U.S. ENVOYS LEAVE OPIUM COMMITTEE

Delegates Walk Out at Geneva, Arousing Anger of Associates; Urge Steps Be Taken to Halt Drug Production; Row Follows Departure of Americans.

GENEVA, June 1.—The entire staff of the United States delegation in the opium committee at Geneva has departed for their respective headquarters here.

The Americans refused to answer questions regarding their proposals or enter into any discussion regarding them.

Porter announced that the Americans could not stay to enter into discussion on the opium committee.

Porter then reiterated that it would be impossible for the Americans to answer questions or sit in the discussions.

The American delegation then withdrew and the session broke in a heated row.

KILBANE IS FAVORED IN CRIQUI BOUT

Little Frenchman, Optimistic on Eve of Scrap Believes He Will Knock Johnny Out in the Sixth Round.

NEW YORK, June 1.—Eugene Criqui, European featherweight champion, today announced he would knock out Johnny Kilbane in the sixth round when they meet here tomorrow.

The 34 year old Frenchman, who fought his way to the European championship after he had part of his jaw split away at Verdun, said he felt this time he weighed 124 pounds and that he was ready to take the title.

Kilbane, on the theory that work and not words win the prize, refused to venture a prediction on what he would do.

"I'm the champion and I feel as good as I ever did. You know what I mean," he said.

The champion said he was also underweight and that he would spend the rest of the day doing nothing. He finished his training two days ago.

Tom O'Rourke, who is staging the contest in the park of the New York state, said that the grounds would hold 60,000 spectators and he expected to have customers in all the seats.

The card stands at 3:30 tonight (daylight time) with a four round bout between Jack McVoy and Dave Jones.

The second event will be a scrap between Al Zinner, Kilbane's chief sparring partner, and Billy Lewis.

Two eight round bouts will be staged between Bill Kaplan and Ed Herman, two contenders for the featherweight crown.

All the bouts go the limit, the main event is expected to end under 7:00 but after 6:30 and if the preliminaries do not go the distance, the final will be staged earlier.

Kilbane is ruling a seven to five favorite in the betting, and there seems to be very little French money on the market.

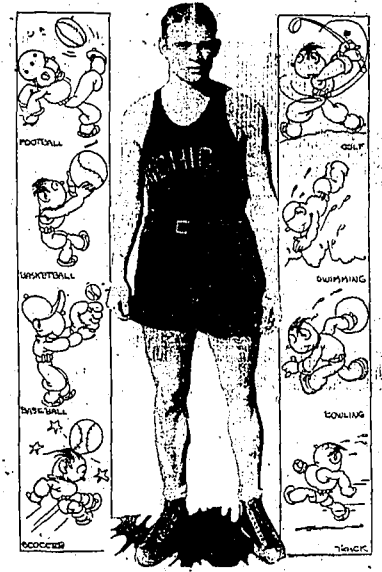

HOW PHYSIQUES OF DEMPSEY AND GIBBONS COMPARE

SHELBY, Mont., June 1.—Comparing Jack Dempsey and Tommy Gibbons these are advantage points for each.

When they step in the ring July 4 night they will look like Gila in height and weight.

Dempsey has more weight in his shoulders than Gibbons.

The contender's physique is more evenly distributed than Gibbons.

In height the champion has a slight margin. He is 6 feet 1 inch, Gibbons is 5 feet 8 inches tall.

As to their necks, Gibbons wears a 17 collar, Dimpsey wears a 15 1/2 inch one. Dempsey's chest is the biggest, his breathing hole is 32 inches normal.

Gibbons is 125 pounds, Dempsey is 120 pounds. Gibbons' arms are bigger. His biceps are 18 1/2 inches, his forearm 14 1/2 inches, his forearm 14 1/2 inches, his forearm 14 1/2 inches.

Now for their records. Gibbons has been in St. Paul, Minn., March 22, 1921. He is 32 now. Dempsey was born at Mansfield, Colorado, June 24, 1895. He will be 33 soon.

Gibbons has been boxing since 1913. Dempsey started boxing in 1912. In the number of ring battles Gibbons leads. He has had 85 fights. Dempsey has fought 60 times.

Gibbons has never been knocked out—has never been knocked down. Dempsey has been knocked out once by Jim Flynn in one round and has been off his feet once a dozen times.

Gibbons has lost one decision in his 85 rounds. Dempsey has lost to Billy Blake on a foul down and to against him. Most of the newsmen here believe that William Harrison of the New York boxing commission gave the fight to Gibbons as a knockout to the stomach.

Their knockout records run a close race. Gibbons has put 37 opponents to sleep. Dempsey has knocked out 22 out of his last 26 starts.

There is another thing—and it is greatly in favor of the contender. Gibbons has had 24 fights and has not having a victory since 1921 up until a month ago.

Dempsey has had but one battle—that his four round knockout of Carpenter during the same title.

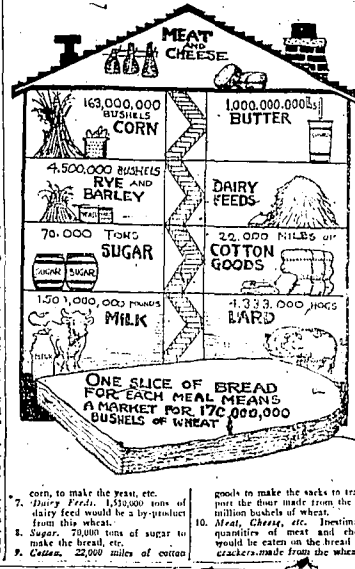

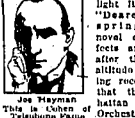
