

FIND BROKER'S Mangled Body ON RAIL TRACK
Murder Suspected in Baffling Missouri Case; Wealthy Business Man's Body Located Under Strange Circumstances; Suicide Theory is Abandoned.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 4—A tramp seen loitering near the railroad tracks where Guy A. Moore was found robbed and slain, was sought by police this afternoon in connection with the mysterious death of the wealthy grain broker.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 4—Police investigated today what they believe was the murder of Guy A. Moore, 42, wealthy banker and former president of the Kansas City board of trade.

Moore's mangled body was found on the railroad tracks near the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul bridge just inside the city. His pockets had been turned inside out. Lies on the right side of the head, coroner's death certificate stated, Moore had been struck by the freight train. The broker had apparently been heading for several hours for the train car yesterday discovered the mangled form on the rail tracks.

The suicide theory was given credence by police, but business associates, who talked with Moore a few hours before his death, were in the best of spirits. He had suffered no financial reverses, friends and relatives said.

C. W. Lawler, the dead man's business partner, said it was his belief that Moore had been robbed and attacked and then thrown on the tracks. "I believe that Mr. Moore was killed before his body was thrown on the track," Lawler said. "There was no blood about the spot where the train passed over his body."

Another circumstance which added mystery to the broker's death was the statement of close friends that Moore, an inveterate walker, had disappeared twice at night during the past week. Two of his friends said he failed to return home and had not visited his family of six, who live at 1117 E. 13th street, and friends set out in search for him. After midnight they found him emerging from the office building, and when he had been walking, they said, and joined them in an automobile home.

Lawler said Moore carried a large sum of money when he left the office building. He carried a \$100 bill and a check for \$100,000, and a wrist watch was found near the body, indicating, Lawler said, that Moore had been killed by the supposed robbers who hurried from the scene after placing Moore's body on the tracks.

Moore's motor car was still parked in front of the office building Sunday.

Moore is survived by his mother, Mrs. Wm. C. Moore, Fort Collins, Colorado.

New Scandal Mars Serenity of Film Life at Hollywood

Mayer, 47, prominent director, in the company of an extra girl and a prostitute since being, will not be given a public airing this afternoon when the four are arraigned on a vagrancy and lewdness charge.

Attorneys announced today that no testimony will be taken on the alleged "wild party" in a Hollywood bungalow which caused the arrest. An attorney will be made to amend the charge to one of disturbing the peace.

SOCIALISTS PLAN COUNTER ATTACKS
PARIS, June 4.—Extreme socialists of France are resolving forces to launch counter attacks on the monarchists. He later attempt any further action.

In big time, this publication said: "Because the complicity of Premier Laval has not been established, permits him to be derided by warring factions of the left, and a recruiting resolve men. The next fascist attack will be followed by the republicans, and the monarchists and the government to be warned."

This manifesto referred to the recent attack by monarchists on three socialist leaders who were expelled, accompanied with ink and pencil, and other articles, in which they were mobbed. Dr. Abrams' theory, "comes out of the open" according to Dr. Ray J. Lewis, chief of the department of medicine at the University of California. "Dr. Abrams claims to have no scientific backing," Dr. Lewis told the medical press. "He should have a study made of them by such scientific experts in physics and the allied sciences as are available at the University of California."

"Personally I am convinced that Abrams is mistaken in his diagnosis of the disease," Dr. Lewis said. "The usual course and is forgotten."

FEW SHRINERS TURN OUT AT WASHINGTON PARADE
Over-Lacking Blamed for Lack of Visitors; Feared They Could Not Obtain a Place to Stay; Pilgrimage Made to Mount Vernon.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—With a disappointingly small number of visitors from other parts of the country, the parade today with a varied program of parades, processions, band concerts and other events scheduled to keep the city in carnival mood until Friday.

The enthusiastic advertising and handling were "left responsible for the failure of thousands of expected Shriners and their families to arrive. They were frightened away by the reports of tremendous crowds here, and probable lack of sufficient accommodations. This was evident when a St. Louis tempo band, which its members would remain of home, finding the money they would need to help build a hospital. They said they understood there was no room in the city.

Merchants and hotel keepers were keenly disappointed over failure of the 50,000 expected to arrive. Only about 10,000 came in an especial train. "Today's program began with a pilgrimage to Mount Vernon by Imperial Potentate James C. McAndrews and his drum. McAndrews was accompanied by a large number of Shriners. Shortly afterward the transmittent auto caravan which left San Francisco last week and spent 20 days in the caravan were to take part with President Harding and Secretary Hoover in dedicating the monument to the "antislavery" starting point of the Lincoln Highway.

The parade of the Shrine of the Most Holy Mother of the Holy Virgin Mary, which will be held in the city will welcome the important pilgrimage and his drum and a band.

Under California law she must now remain in prison a minimum of seven years and she may remain for life.

SEES LACK OF BLACKBURN HEARING TO BE THURSDAY
PARIOTISM IN HISTORIES

Investigator Reports That Numerous Glorious Episodes in American Annals Have Been Ignored or Frowned Upon by Eminent Writers.

NEW YORK, June 4.—A plot exists to "rehabilitate" the "British colonies" and "the United States" as part of the "British empire, David S. Broderick, editor-in-chief of the "American Review," said today in a report to Mayor Hylan.

The forty thousand word report traces the histories of historical figures following the investigation into charges that many rebel histories are pro-British. As a result of his investigation he commented that the "British empire" has been "barred from New York schools."

The "American Review" is a weekly magazine published by the "American Review" in New York. It is edited by David S. Broderick, a former editor of the "New York Times."

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Will Sentence Robert Leeper, Slayer, June 19

OWA CITY, June 4.—Robert Leeper, who shot and killed "Dinner Crasher" found guilty of a jury of murdering his father-in-law, will be sentenced today by Judge John H. Blinn. The sentence is expected to be at least 10 years.

Leeper was a war veteran and was accused of committing the crime while in the service of the United States Army.

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COMMUNIST AGITATORS POUNDED UP
Strikes Continue to Spread in Ruhr as Police Display Activity in Arresting Reds; All Suspected Rendezvous Raided by Authorities.

BERLIN, June 4.—While hundreds of "communist" agitators were being rounded up by police forces, strikes continued to spread in the Ruhr region.

It is reported that the strike spread in the Ruhr region, and that it is being carried out regardless of interference.

While police were arresting communists in Bochum and Dortmund, fresh strikes were coming many hours in the Ruhr region.

The German police, partly reorganized in order for the purpose of attacking the communist flame, were working in military style.

At Herford, fifty communists were taken to a door to door search is conducted.

In Dortmund 600 "reds" were arrested. In the Ruhr region, many of the houses raided turned out to be veritable arsenals, with colors packed with ammunition.

Many business houses and restaurants in the Ruhr region were closed by the police, their windows shattered and their doors locked with chains and padlocks.

APPOINT RADICAL HEAD OF COLLEGE
STILLWATER, Okla., June 4.—Dr. C. W. Wilson, former labor leader and anti-trust lawyer, today assumed the presidency of a new college to be established in Stillwater, Okla.

Wilson was elected to the college by a vote of 100 to 10. He is a former labor leader and anti-trust lawyer.

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HONDURAS REVOLT STORY HEARD HERE
NEW ORLEANS, June 4.—Reports of an impending revolution in Honduras were brought here today by refugees aboard the Curruel from Tegucigalpa.

The threatened revolution, according to these refugees, mostly American, is being organized by a few men sent out of Honduras by anxious Honduras and Yalapa, it being centered in Tegucigalpa, a few who aspire to the presidency when the term of the present incumbent ends.

Several Honduran officials and their families were reported to have arrived on the Honduras Incognito, to seek the safety shelter of American resorts until things quieted down in their country.

Grain Exports Show Increase for Week of June 2, Report
WASHINGTON, June 4.—Exports of grain during the week ending June 2 were 4,817,000 bushels, an increase of 265,000 bushels over the exports a week ago, the department of commerce announced today.

Exports were: Barley—1,170,000 bushels. Corn—4,220,000 bushels. Cotton—12,000 bales. Flax—52,000 bushels. Wheat—3,286,000 bushels. Exports of flour were 145,000 barrels, a decrease of 27,000 barrels from shipments the preceding week.

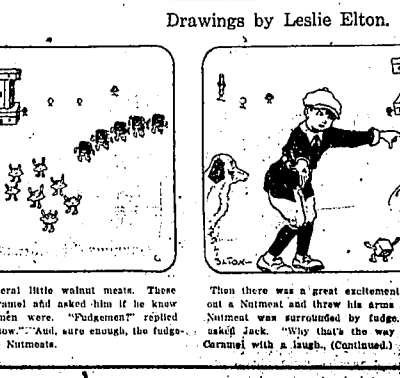
