WILLY CITIZENS

New Reparations Offer on Way to Allose If It Falls Chancellor Cuno May Be Forced to Resign; Dissatisfaction Over Non-adjustment.

BERLIN, June 6—Life of the Cuno cabinet depends on the decision of the new Reparations offer now on its way to the allied capitals.

In the face of strenuous opposition from many sides because of failure to reach some agreement with the allies, which will permit the present reparations to be undertaken, Cuno is understood to have proposed:

1.—Payment of approximately a billion and a half gold marks yearly.

2.—Settlement of the exact terms to be left to an international conference. Contents of the documents will be officially divulged upon receipt by the allies. It is feared that Cuno proposed the reparations amount be raised to the following:

1.—Consumption taxes on such commodities as tobacco, sugar and brandy and a customs monopoly on the same three. These taxes it is expected will provide 400,000,000 gold marks a year.

2.—Flotation of a gold mortgage amounting to ten billion marks at five per cent interest against the railways yielding 600,000,000 gold marks annually.

3.—Last mortgages on industrialists, factories, land owners localizing possibly to 100,000,000 gold marks, which is considered would yield another five hundred million gold marks.

A special property tax which would provide 100,000,000 gold marks a year.

NEWS OF THE SPORT WORLD

NO PRIVATE WIRES WILL BE ALLOWED AT TITLE BATTLE

SHREVEPORT, Mont., June 6.—Handling of a championship fight requires more than a clock. The Great Northern railroad, working with the Western Union in Shelby, Mo., has decided to allow the results of the Dempsey-Gibbons fight to the world outside. It will take more than a million ticks.

The results will be ticks on what the motor will be ticks on how he will tick.

There will be 15 sending tickers at the rinkside.

At this fight there will be no such thing as a private wire.

J. C. Hopkins, superintendent of telegraph of the Great Northern, would like to give every newspaper writer a separate wire.

But this is Shelby and not Toledo or Jersey City.

Writers will be grouped around the tickers sending their general direction.

For instance the scriber sending east will be grouped on one side of the ring. Those firing their inquiries west on how Dempsey smacked Gibbons but how Gibbons runs Dempsey will be grouped on another side of the square circle and so on.

Copy will be filed in three. Clerks provided by the Western Union will feed the staff to the operators quickly and without confusion.

Superintendent Hankline believes that close to a million wires will be handled by his staff.

The major dome wire associations will probably look on to the telephone lines. There are accommodations for four outlets this way. It is possible that additional wires may be strung by the phone company from Grand to double the present capacity.

The Great Northern already has one observation car parked here and equipped as a first class telegraph office. By June 15 another will be brought here and fitted up.

Railway officials are planning to park 32 special trains here on newly built spurs.

The five trains expected from Canada will be stopped at Verdun, a mile and a half east of Shelby.

The Great Northern will establish a regular hotel camp here to house

and feed the extra employes needed for the overnight big city terminal.

It is possible that some of the visiting newspapermen will be housed in pullmans. Between 200 and 400 scribers are expected to be here to tick what happens.

The railroad is working with Promoters Mike Collins, Lay J. Maloney and Mayor Jim Johnson, in every respect to make the show a big success.

Railway officials estimate they will haul 25,000 to Shelby by July first.

Fans who will travel by auto should number around 20,000 more.

The arena, built to seat 40,200, is nearly half complete. The promoters are already clearing up plans to boost the capacity of the section to 50,000 if the advance sales looks healthy enough.

There are 1,200,000 feet of lumber being used in the hotel. A dollar will make the gate \$1,200,000 a dollar or every foot of lumber used.

PUNCHING BAGS WITH GIBBONS

SHREVEPORT, Mont., June 1.—Four kinds of punching bags will get Tom Gibbons in time to battle Jack Dempsey for the heavyweight title of the world at the Polo grounds here.

They are—human, sand, springs and air.

In each of them will be painted an imaginary Dempsey chin and solar plexus spot.

Gibbons will use, approximately 1,500 pounds of human beef in his daily workouts.

So far he has selected three heavy, two light-heavies, one middleweight and two bantams for his shock absorbing department.

The 200-pound bantam will be Jack Clifford of St. Paul, Bud Goran of Racine, Wis., and Joe Burke of Detroit.

The light-heavies will be Jimmy Johnson of St. Paul and Harry Foley of Little Rock, Ark.

Martin Moore of Minneapolis is a checked middleweight.

Sammy Mandell and Bud Taylor of Chicago represent the bantam speed.

Others will be shipped in as Gibbons wears them down.

They say Gibbons does not intend to pull his punches in whaling for his punch. If his human torso do not keep out of his range they are going to take the commensurate.

This outfit represents every style of boxer and fighter.

White Gibbons knows he is fighting a fighter in Dempsey, yet he plans to use a change of pace on the champion.

Dempsey will beat down any man living that slugs with him. But he never met a man who is both a moving and knock-out target.

Besides the human punching bags Gibbons will use three leather rollers.

One in the big sand bag like the Bertie Gibbons maul.

Another is a stationary spring bag. It is a recent patent of his brother, Mike. Nothing equals it as a developer of the knockout punch. It is fast on the wall. Heavy springs, oil and rubber are used in the making. It has the strength of a million tons.

Also Gibbons drew a lot of playing with the air-filled standard bag. There's speed-building and judgment distance practice in it.

There they are the four kinds of punching bags which Gibbons will pop into with his knockout snuggles.

The Gibbons head is not in a hurry. It studies style like a roman diamond a pattern book.

He slugs a half a million hands in his recent tour. In each shake was "I'm pulling for you to win, Tom. So far as Montana's mind is con-

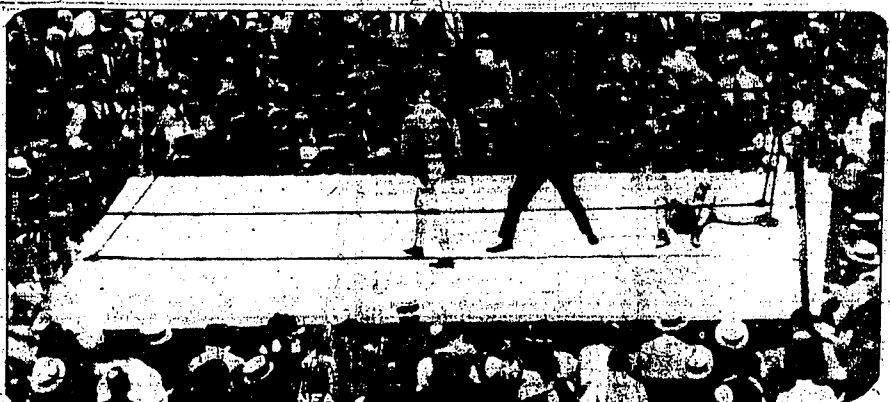

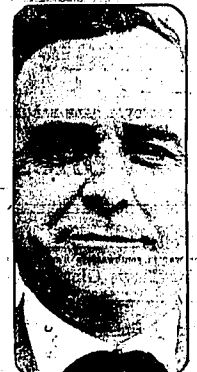
BLACKBURN CASE FOR PRELIMINARY THURSDAY A. M.
