

BILLION GOLD MARKS TO BEAR GERMAN OFFER

Chancellor Cuno has Plans to Raise Money in Several Ways; International Conference Will Be Called to Make Final Consideration of Offer.

BERLIN, June 7.—The German note placed in the hands of the allied today proposes payment of exactly 1,200,000,000 gold marks annually as reparations.

Chancellor Cuno proposes to raise this amount as follows:

- 1—500,000,000 marks through a mortgage on the national railroads.
2—Another 500,000,000 by mortgage industry and factories.
3—200,000,000 by a heavy tax.

The latter amount would be commensurately increased as the economic stability of Germany restored. Cuno pointed out to the allies, such a tax before the war yielded 800,000,000 marks a year and Cuno considers that it would increase as conditions improve.

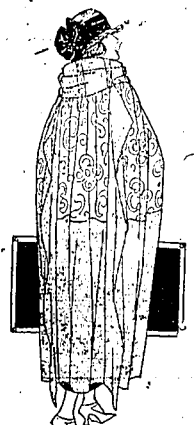

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FARM STOCK

REMOVE HORNS FROM CATTLE

Where Clipper Can Be Used Strongly. It Satisfactorily Cutting is Different.

There are many ways of confining cattle that are to be done. Where the horns are removed with a clipper strong station may be all that is necessary, or a shearing chute can be made if a stump has to be removed for one or two animals and where a saw is used a convenient method is to rest the animal. For this method with the clipper, the animal is held in the illustration and known as the English hold. It has been used with good results. In fact in throwing an animal for any purpose it will be found a convenient and easy method. You can make this by placing a rope hobbie around each neck. Have the hobbie tight enough so that it won't slip down over the head, but loose enough to slip a rope between it and the loc. After a hobbie has been

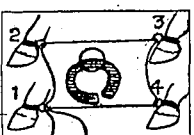


Diagram shows how to throw an animal. The rope nearest to the left side of the drawing should be tied into the right side of the hobbie through rings at 2, 3 and 4, and then back into 1 again. Then the rope, indicated on the right, should be slowly pulled to the left to shove the hobbie, with the ring attached.

applied to each of the four pasterns, a rope hobbie on the hobbie on a fore limb, then pass the rope through the ring on the opposite fore limb. Then run it backward through the hobbie on the hind leg of the same side, then across through the hobbie on the opposite hind limb, and then forward through the hind hobbie, or hobbie in which the rope was first tied. Then you will pull up on the rope. This will bring all four legs together, and as one person does this have some one gently push the animal over (away from the one pulling on the rope). Then the rope around the feet so the animal cannot get free. As soon as the animal has been secured an assistant keep the head down by holding the neck against the ground. After the operation is over, untie and remove the rope and hobbies. A leather strap just large enough to go around the pastern and which can be laced, will be used on one side, makes a good hobbie, and one that is easily put on and taken off.

NO MORE BLACKLEG VACCINE

Distribution of Virus Was Discontinued July 1, but Frequent Requests Are Made.

Distribution of blackleg vaccine by the bureau of animal industry, United States Department of Agriculture, was discontinued July 1, and public notice was given at the time. The discontinuance was the result of an item in the agricultural appropriation act for the year beginning July 1, which reads as follows: "Prohibit the sale of vaccine for blackleg which has been used for the manufacture, preparation, or distribution of blackleg vaccine." Frequent requests for vaccine continue to reach the bureau of animal industry, however, and applicants necessarily are advised to obtain the vaccine from other sources. Since the blackleg vaccine is no longer distributed by the bureau of animal industry, the stock owners are advised that applications for it cannot be granted, and they will avoid delay by applying direct to commercial concerns or other sources.

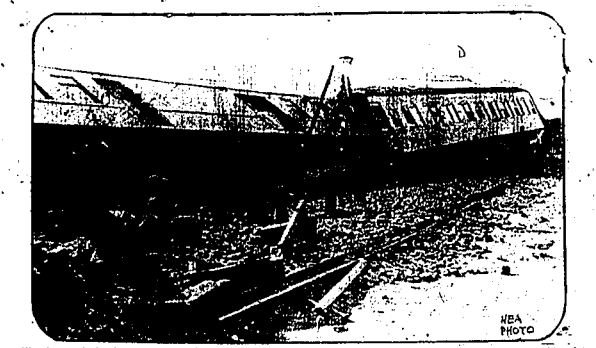

Bulletin issued by University of Wisconsin Division of Information for Dairymen.

Not many dairymen are thoroughly familiar with the big question of the variation in the cost of producing milk. Milk costs are necessary in order to determine profit or losses of the herd," says P. R. McNall and D. R. Mitchell in their new bulletin, "Why Costs of Milk Vary," which has just been issued by the University of Wisconsin. Costs per hundredweight of milk varied from \$1.58 to \$1.61 for different months of the year. Such figures as these are brought out in the new bulletin, which contains valuable information for the practical dairymen who is trying to hold down production costs.

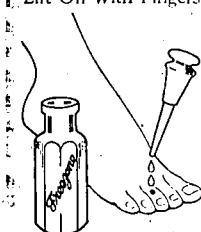

All who can spare time should hear Walton Pickett speak on co-operative marketing at the Parish hall tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Co-operation in the economy and prosperity of many lines of business is here to stay, and this will include cooperation in the marketing of a great percentage of staple farm crops.

However, this does not mean that there is no room in the same lines for private enterprise. As a matter of fact, the future as in the past private enterprise will succeed alongside private concerns.

There is no danger of a farmer's trust, and to that extent the statement which Saprio made to Judge Gary was misleading. Farmers can, if co-operating under careful management, steady distribution, eliminate useless charges and get a better net profit than would otherwise be the case.

Hence, while the ultimate result may not be all that is hoped for, the co-operative movement has come to stay and the net benefits will be appreciable.

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FARM LIVE STOCK

SEMI-ANNUAL SWINE SURVEY. Questionnaires Will Be Distributed on Agricultural Routes by Rural Mail Carriers.

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture, the semi-annual pig survey, cards for which are now being distributed to rural mail carriers, will cover the entire country.

The survey last spring covered only 17 states, but an installment of present and probable pig production the survey was a great success and fully demonstrated the feasibility of extending the scope of the inquiry, says the department.

The basis of questionnaires will be distributed by each rural mail carrier on agricultural routes, approximately 1,000 cards will be sent out. They have been prepared in simple form and can be filled out in a few minutes.

Where possible, the small carriers will fill in the answers as made by the live stock raisers. The cards will show the number of sows farrowed during the last six months of 1922, the number farrowed during the first six months of 1923, the number of sows farrowed, of that to farrow during the last six months of 1922 and the number farrowed or intended to be bred to farrow during the first six months of 1923.

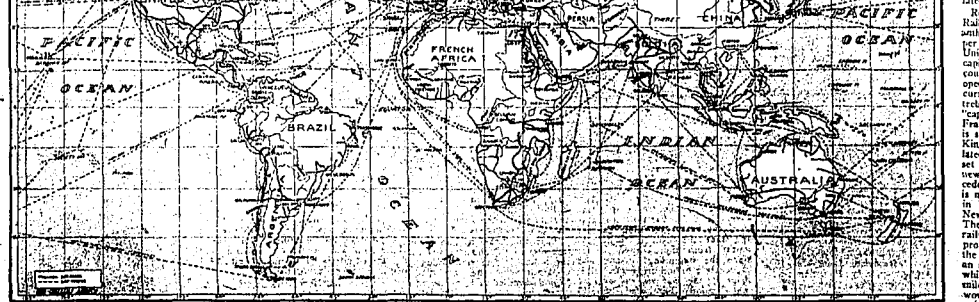

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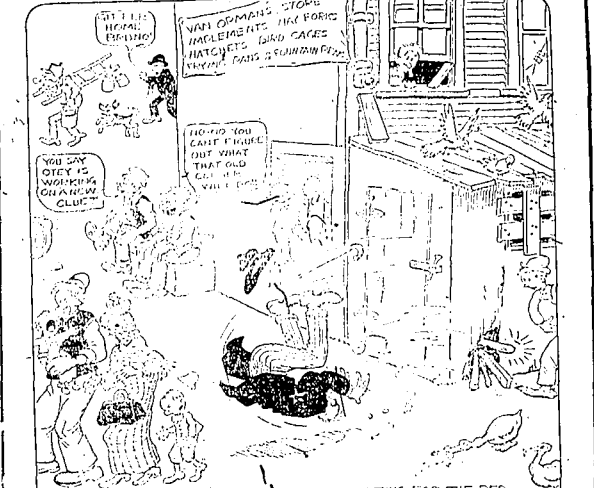

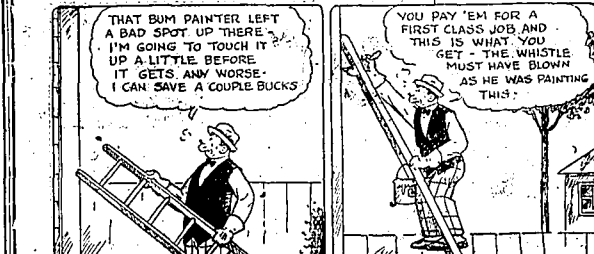

BLACKBURN HEARING S ON TRIAL

Dead Woman Told Dr. Dwight She Took Medicine Because Husband Wanted Her To; Defendant Told Various Stories to Officer

At 3 o'clock this afternoon, Probate Judge J. P. Hunkel took under advisement until 10 o'clock Saturday, the arguments of counsel for Melvin Blackburn, who contended that the evidence introduced by the state would not warrant holding their client for any higher offense than second degree murder, if for that.

That Melvin Blackburn, charged with murder of the Mrs. H. H. Clark, told him on the evening of May 17, that a friend had given him five medicine pills which he sent to his wife, adding, "I agreed to keep it secret as it was a penitentiary offense," and that on the evening of May 21, Mrs. Blackburn supposed his wife had said, "I had been wanting you to see a doctor," and that she was striking statements of Dr. Frank J. Dwight, the prescribing physician, Blackburn is charged with filing a return, Deputy Sheriff J. W. Albart said that at one time Blackburn had been in the powder house from a drugist in the nearest drug store on Shoshone street and had taken from the "big man there" and pointed out Mr. Murray that later he said he got the powder from a woman in a place to whom he paid \$10 and that later still he said the person from whom he got the powder was out of the country, Mr. Murray at once denounced the first story of Blackburn as "a damned lie." Mrs. William H. Hurst, mother of the dead woman, was the first witness. She said she went to bed early one evening of May 17, 1922, 9 o'clock. Some time afterwards she was awakened by the fall of Mrs. Blackburn and her sister and went to the bedside, where they woman was weeping, weeping Mrs. Blackburn had some powder which she gave to the witness saying, "It is medicine that Melvin said, here it is." The witness says she took the powder and kept them, instead of destroying them. The next morning she called the powder, who was unable to come immediately, but arrived as soon as he could, about 8 p. m. Mr. Blackburn then treated the girl who was brought to the Twin Falls general hospital, where she died three days later, that Blackburn and Cecil were married January 28, 1923, a few days before the second trial of the prisoner on the rape charge was to come up.

The Hurst live nine miles north of Twin Falls canyon. Mrs. Hurst said that her daughter suffered for a couple of weeks that she was ill but did not complain. She had given her white tablets for two or three weeks Dr. Dwight told about finding the pills, tried to vomit, with the stool, and pulse at wrist gone when he called. He gave hypodermic treatment but she would not take it had the desired effect. She was treated at the hospital and after a few days could swallow. Later she had violent vomiting of blood and cramps action was shown. He charged this with responsibility for her death.

Made a Test

He said that on the evening of May 17, he had, with A. E. Patton, the druggist, made something out of chemical examination of the powder, at the Fisher drug company. He indicated presence of lead-iodide mercury, but he was not positive. Later City Chemist E. H. Doober made the examination and found it. He said

that he asked Blackburn what it was he sent in the papers and he said he did not know. 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Great quantity of poison
Chemist found only 10 of his examination of the powder. One examination contained about 60 grains and another 74 grains.
