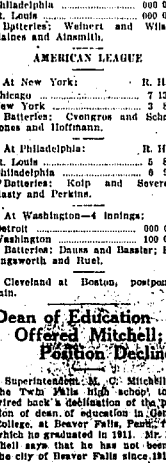

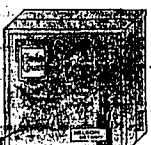

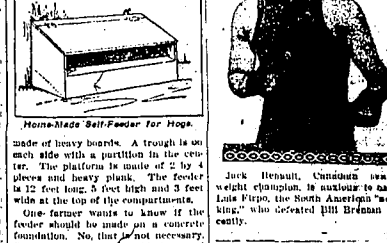

Those who claim to know tell us that many of the buildings in Twin Falls could not be reproduced for the price they are selling at the present time. We hope this is not true and yet we know that the cost of building material has never slumped as other materials have done.

Real estate is looking up in Twin Falls but no great upthrust is expected in the market until late in the fall. You will hear all sorts of inflated stories about this one and that one selling for cash but if you hunt down these stories you will find generally that most of the deals that are being transacted today are trades.

LEAGUE'S FINANCIAL STANDING

Practical folks, who are up, according to themselves, either theorists or idealists, have been prone to declare that the League of Nations is a visionary affair. Well, the Morgan's are not visionaries. They figure things in dollars and cents. Those who look on the league as only a weak affair, will do well to read and ponder over the following from the Springfield-Republican under the heading, "The League Austrian Loan?"

J. P. Morgan & Co. would have undertaken the task of marketing in this country \$25,000,000 of the Austrian loan if the firm had not been convinced that a market could be found. The United States government has manifestly given its tacit approval to this financial operation, for its mere signal of disapproval would have been regarded by the Morgan house as a command to drop the business immediately.

First—We believe the bonds to be well secured. Second—It is the first step toward economic rehabilitation of central Europe taken by all countries working together, and we believe that the American market should take its part which such a concerted effort is being made to better general business conditions in the world.

While the League of Nations is at the bottom of this business, a publicity campaign against the loan by the league's opponents in America is not anticipated in investment circles, although the successful marketing of the full \$25,000,000 in Austrian government bonds will be a crushing demonstration, he repeated, because "money talks."

The \$25,000,000 loan is only part of the loan Austria will require, to live through the reconstruction period of the next two years. A total deficit of \$100,000,000 must be covered in paying Austria out of the financial abyss into which it has fallen. The total loan will be secured by the customs and tobacco revenues, which are administered by a commissioner-general appointed by and responsible to the League of Nations, and it will be guaranteed by a number of European governments, including that of Great Britain.

This financing is the culmination of remarkable work already done under the administration of the commissioner-general, who has already borrowed \$15,000,000, in the form of one-year discount notes. Since the League of Nations took control of Austria's finances, the crown, or monetary unit, has been stabilized by stopping the flood of irredeemable paper money; by instituting budget reforms, reducing government expenses and creating a government bank of issue.

league's influence and the confidence it has spread abroad in Austria's ability eventually to return to a normal condition. The total loan of \$100,000,000 will be marketed in Great Britain, France, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Switzerland, Belgium, Spain, Czech-Slovakia and Italy as well as in the United States. Six of these countries were neutrals throughout the war. The loan will doubtless be fully subscribed and the Austrian Republic given a fresh lease of life.

Representative Convinced That Speedy Action Will Be Taken; Absence of Objections Expedites Things Before Interstate Commission; Issue Regarding Purchase of Indian Lands Unlikely to Delay the Construction of Dam for American Falls Reservoir.

That the certificate of convenience and necessity issued by the Oregon Short Line for the extension from Rogerson to Wells will be granted about June 25, and that there will be no delay in the work of building the American Falls dam, were opinions expressed today by Congressman Johnson T. Smith, who, after his return from Washington, turned on the capitol hill to his glad to be here, to rejoice with other citizens over the brilliant prospects.

The issuance of the certificate will take place in due time," said Congressman Smith, "and things are proceeding satisfactorily. The time for advertising will expire about June 20 and action may be anticipated in a few days afterwards. I think that we have reasonable expectation that the interstate commerce commission will act about June 25. There have been no protests filed and that means that the commission will not have to postpone the matter in order to hear and consider objections."

Delay is improbable "I do not think that there will be any delay caused by the raising of the question of the value of Indian lands in connection with the construction of the American Falls dam," said the congressman. "I believe that the matter will be adjusted, I doubt very much whether Secretary Bland will hold that the construction of the dam is necessary in order to buy the lands and I believe that the government will get together with the Indians regarding the matter. Even though condemnation proceedings should be necessary, it is not probable that the lands and should action by congress be finally deemed necessary to complete the transaction, that other things which will have to be done in and around American Falls before the lands will be needed and for this reason, I do not anticipate any delay in any event."

Congressman and Mrs. Smith appear to be in fine health, although the latter was laid up before leaving Washington.

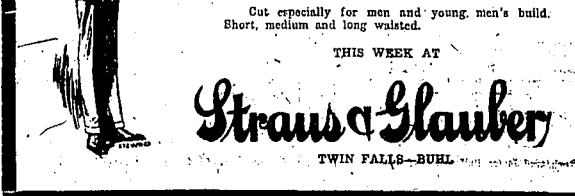
