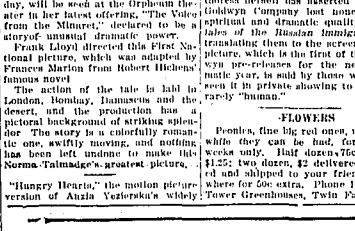

Permanently improved roadways are invaluable assets to Idaho. The state cannot overdo this, so long as the heterogeneities are of enduring quality.

During aviators are achieving new records almost daily as to speed and long nonstop flights. Progress in aeronatics is phenomenal.

The garb of the humblest workman may elude a horn of the noblest quality. It is standing the test of crisis that really tries men and appraises them at their true valuation.

Politics should be divorced from passion and prejudice, so much as is possible. Political decisions by the men now composing the political parties are not sufficiently weighted with thought.

The graduates are coming forth buoyant and ready and eager to conquer the world. Some of them will put back from the ships of conquest. Others will go forward. From these graduates the future generation will be recruited. Far be it from any one to sneer at or to belittle that special training which students get in high schools and other institutions of higher education.

The genius of William Shakespeare is proclaimed more and more as the world becomes more familiar with his works and makes comparison with the best effusions of other great writers. His genius stands out in relief, in its incomparable superiority among the great authors and dramatists of all time.

THE BUILDING KIWANIANS

Up from Georgia come news dispatches telling of resolutions passed by the convention of Kiwanis international, the organization which includes all the Kiwanis clubs. The active, energetic, responsible men of this organization have pledged themselves to seek earnestly a remedy for war, to foster the observance of Mother's day and to give aid to disabled veterans.

The Kiwanis clubs of America are building organizations. Their motto is "We Build." They are not supposed to be content to be merely luncheon clubs nor are they properly described by the term "hosting organizations." For the booster is a hully-hoan, a beater of drums, one who keeps shouting "Forward! Never say die! Keep it up!" The booster sometimes champions a progress that is not sound, just because it is progress. But the Kiwanians have turned their attention, not to shouting but to building. They essay to look to the foundation before the superstructure. They go after sane progress, sometimes slowly for the sake of sureness rather than pell-mell and unprofitably for the sake of gratification and applause.

There is a wise provision in the Kiwanis organization that those who become members shall be owners, proprietors, partners or executives of business or, for alternative, skilled specialists. The members are, therefore, presumed to be trained men, men accustomed to think, to arrive at decisions and to act upon them. This is the right stuff out of which to fashion a building organization.

And in the minds of such men, movements for peace, for the glorification of motherhood and for service to service men should reach maximum effectiveness, Kiwanis will sadly disappoint America if they do not.

But the Kiwanians must remember that resolving is not in itself building. They must remember, too, that having the facilities for service, the men and the brains and the tools, does not necessarily mean doing the work. And they must realize that while the idea of Kiwanis cannot fail, the men who call themselves Kiwanians can fail by failing to grasp that idea.

Good thinkers among the Kiwanians know that there is danger of this. In the Kiwanis magazine some months ago a writer exclaimed, "How great would be the failure of such an enterprise were it to be a luncheon club." Such a club is only a place where men gather to eat together because man does not like to eat alone, in solitude. Such an organization serves no higher purpose than selfishly to feed upon its selfishness. And then he went on to say that while it may be worth something merely to bring men to meet other men and to get an exchange of thought, true progress, true building, comes only through translating friendship and thought into action.

The dispatches from Atlanta, which recalled to mind this comment, suggest a great responsibility for the Kiwanians. What a tragedy it would be—though not a tragedy uncommon in the world of clubs—if the high purposes developed and expressed at such a convention should be frittered into nothingness at the tables of a thousand mere luncheon clubs.—Statesman.
