## Reading the Bible

By REV. JOHN C. PAGE, Theological Editor, Bible Institute, Chicago.

SEARCH the scriptures; they are they which testify of Me.—John 1:19.

A Christian training man recently remarked that although he had attended church for fifty years he had never heard a sermon on the subject of Bible study. Doubtless his experience was unusual but whether it was or not the matter of Bible study is so closely related to the Christian's growth and development. Growth in knowledge and growth in grace are associated in the closing words of Peter's second epistle. God has united these two and they cannot be put asunder.

The word "search" suggests careful investigation. It is possible to read the Scriptures and yet fail to obtain that for which the Scripture was given. Our Lord charged the Jews in order to learn to love Him. What are the essential requisites for the reading and study? Scripture itself gives the simplest and best answer.

The first essential is spiritual illumination. In I. Corinthians 2:14 we read, "Who natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God; for they are foolishness unto him; neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned." From this point of view the Bible is unlike any other book. It deals with revealed things; "the things of God." The things of a man may be known and explained by any other man but not so the things of God. God is not an explanation; He is a revelation. "The things of God" have been revealed to us by His Spirit, but the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit. They are foolishness to him, neither can he know them.

Who is the natural man? He is the man born once. He has had a natural birth and possesses natural life. This life is self-centered because God-centered. Until that man is born again, or from above, he cannot see or know the things of God. In the natural man the Spirit of God does not dwell but when a man is born from above and receives that life which the Bible describes as divine and eternal, then the Spirit of God finds a dwelling place within, and the man is referred to as "spiritual" rather than "natural." The first essential, then, in profitable Bible reading and study is spiritual illumination. It is a serious mistake to suppose or assume that the Bible can be understood by mere intellectual effort. It is a book containing the revealed things of God, and clearly the Spirit

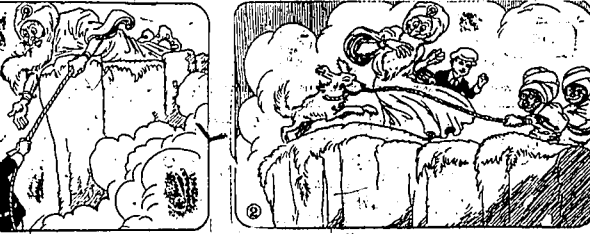

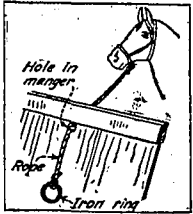




SIMPLE WAY TO THE HORSES

Have a snap at the halter end of the rope, then run the other end of the rope through the hole in the manger and tie on a large ring or almost anything which will act as a light weight and which cannot get in such a way that it can be pulled through the hole. When the horse stands close to the manger the ring will go down and thus there will be no chance for him to get his foot over the ring.

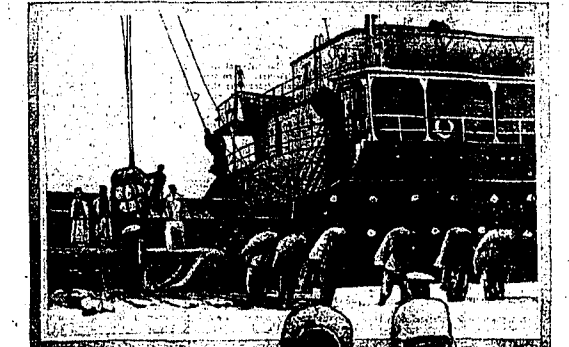

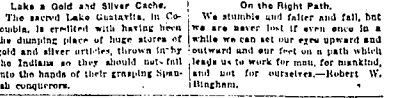

He scored a knockout in four rounds. His prize money totaled \$400. Mike Mike's Knock. On Feb. 9, 1914, he went into the ring with George (Knockout) Brown. Brown was going good then. But Gibbons won in 10 rounds. That was his hardest and first real fight. A few days later he took on Billy Mike. Again he won in 10 rounds. And he broke Mike's jaw. Brown expected to get him again. They were matched to go at Madison, Wis. "Knockout" got a worse beating than he had in any other fight. Then Tommy fought Buck Cronin

on May 22. He swears he'll never forget that fight. Buck sure had Wallop. "Knock" hit me the hardest. I've ever been socked," he testifies. "I hung on in the second round. Mike thought I was going to get knocked out. It seemed to hurt me more than it did me when I got hit hard. I guess I'm sure and all like that. "I had followed Mike's instructions up to this time. After I got patted on the head I asked him to let me fight my own style. He said, 'Go to it.' "I knocked Cronin down five or six times in the third round. In the fourth I knocked him out. On Thanksgiving Day, Tommy went back to New York to fight Billy Glover at Gibbons's club. It took him six rounds to put Billy to sleep. Kearns Backed Wright. 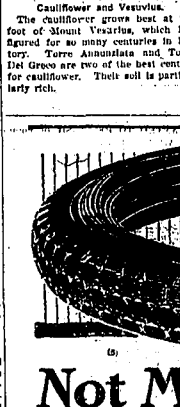

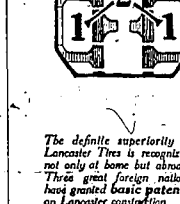
