Tezmer, the widow, failed to identify a pretty maid as the man who shot her. The man, a "girl with blue eyes and a smile" who shot Tezmer, is believed to be in the neighborhood of the town during a robbery at the Tezmer "Gold Coast" home. She said the latest suspect was a man who had been taken before Mrs. Tezmer, but she has refused to identify any of them.

SOFIA, June 15.—My wireless to the United Press via Paris.—Our army has easily suppressed the isolated resistance of the Bulgarian Stambolisky's partisans.

The country everywhere is calm. Communication by wireless, telephone and telegraph has been re-established. The army now is being used only to maintain order and to parry attempts of Stambolisky's followers.

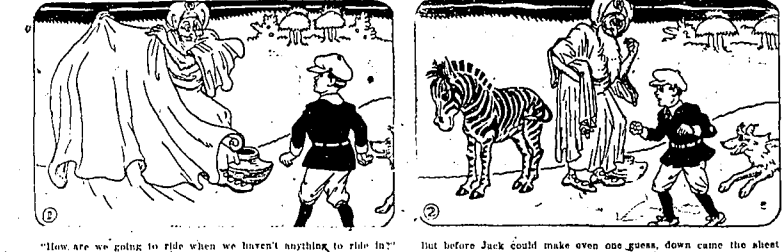
