

DENVER WILL PROTECT ITS GIRL MOTHERS

State Will Aid Young Mothers in Getting Work; Ben Lindsey Says Colorado Is First to Take Needed Step to Save Young Children.

DENVER, June 19.—A "superior" work for girls will be appointed in Denver within a few days by Jorenio Court Judge Ben B. Lindsey, following the state law effective yesterday, which protects "expectant girl mothers."

"Not only will children be supported by the state with a \$60 a month allowance from six months after to birth until six months after birth, but mothers will be furnished employment to protect care for their child after this allowance has expired," the judge said.

"Of every 1,000 women in this court for assistance 700 appear of their own free will. Colorado is the first state in the union to recognize its debt to the unborn, and to continue its protection after birth. No longer will expectant mothers feel the necessity of seeking assistance from unscrupulous medical agencies."

"It has been on good authority said that 1,300,000 children were murdered in this country last year by abortifacients—fully 1,000,000 in this country, I believe. Give the girls a chance and they will abort and protect their offspring. I think that Denver will contribute but a small number to the infant toll for the next year, and Colorado will be free from this smirch against the civilized nation."

"One case has already come up before Judge Lindsey. When this girl became a mother her child will enter into practical custody of our constitution, that 'all are born free and equal,' the judge said.

"And I am confident, and that those highly doubtful assistance of so-called 'doctors' will now call for the protection afforded by the state."

WILL STRIVE TO BREAK AIR MARK

SAN DIEGO, June 19.—An effort to remain aloft four days and four nights, breaking all duration records of spectacular margins, will be made the latter part of this month during the fall moon period by Captain Lowell H. Smith and Lieut. John H. Hitcher of Lockheed Field, army aviators.

Their specially equipped De Havilland plane, will be refueled in mid air. Lieutenant Frank Fletcher and Lieut. Virgil Hines, Lockheed field, adjutant, will pilot the fueling plane which will deliver fuel, water and gasoline. The fueling will be delivered from overhead, the fueling plane flies within 25 feet of the record plane. CHICAGOAN'S MURDERESS IS LOCATED

Mrs. Temmer Identifies Smiling Blue-eyed Individual as One Who Killed Her Husband in Garage; Wore Pretty Black Beaded Dress.

CHICAGO, June 19.—Mrs. Frances Thompson, alias Fred G. Thompson, was identified today as the "smiling, blue-eyed girl bandit" who killed Michael C. Temmer at his "Gold Coast" home, Chief of Detectives Richard Hughes announced.

Mrs. Temmer, the widow, made the identification at the Temmer home. Hughes said the alleged "girl bandit," also was known as, Francis Carrick, police assassin.

The "girl" disappeared in a train at Chicago, was arrested on a rail on a "northside apartment" early today by police squad led by Captain William Cusack. A man giving his name as John Doe and a woman who Mrs. Temmer identified as "girl bandit" were also found in the apartment.

When arrested the "girl" wore a pretty black beaded dress, satin shoes, and a black and white striped blouse. When the police squad entered, she said, according to Cusack: "Wait, I suppose you want me for the Temmer murder." "What do you know about the Temmer murder?" Cusack asked.

"Well, you don't want me," she is quoted as replying. "The girl you want was a blonde." The previous description after the police was that the slayer of Temmer was a blonde, with long, wavy hair, and a black and white striped blouse. Hughes took her before the widow.

"The Temmer was shot during a robbery at the Temmer home. He and Mrs. Temmer had just driven their car into the garage when a girl with a male companion held them up. Mrs. Temmer became hysterical, and the girl demanded her wedding ring and Temmer moved her hand to her pocket. She was shot in the back of the head by the slayer of the girl and shot Temmer without warning.

The slayer identified today has feminine features.

CAPPER AIMS BLOW AT BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO, June 19.—The Chicago Board of Trade has become the world's greatest gambling place and the largest source of revenue to the producer and the consumer, Arthur Capper, Kansas, told 600 delegates at a wheat conference here today.

The conference is being held to discuss a way of increasing wheat prices. "By operating here," on the market, he said, "we are interested in making profit to the speculator at the expense of the man who grows the wheat and the man who eats the wheat," Capper declared.

"In the famous 'Wheat' conference of 1916, a speculator cleaned up more than two million dollars within 24 hours through their operations on the board of trade. That two million dollars was more by far than all the farmers of Kansas were paid for their entire crop."

To protect the farmers and the consumer, Capper urged the organization of a co-operating wheat marketing system. "A real commodity marketing association such as an association of raisin, cotton and tobacco producers, would place the business of wheat marketing on a business basis. It could be handled in a more direct way."

Capper suggested a co-operating marketing system for wheat growers was endorsed by Governor D. C. Hoar, chief speaker at the conference and by Governor Jonathan M. Davis, Kansas.

# ORTEGA DIES AT HOSPITAL FROM SHOT

### Mexican Wounded Sunday Evening in Quarrel, Passes Away This Morning; Gives Version of Affair.

Andrea Ortega or Andrew Orta died this morning at Twin Falls Central County hospital as a result of a bullet wound inflicted Sunday afternoon by Romulo Lamo. He was conscious until near death and made a final statement in which he said that he was accused by a man as he went from the Martinez place to the Pacific hotel; that the man promised not to fight him, but later drew a gun.

On the other hand, courts demand such rigid evidence in murder cases, especially in first degree murder charges, that the slightest oversight in proceedings may prove fatal to a case, so a post-mortem will be held.

While the office of the prosecutor has not indicated what offense would be charged it is believed that Lamo will be held for first degree murder.

There is a report in the effect that the man had earned some amount of money whereby the wife of Ortega was to be purchased by Lamo and that the quarrel grew out of the matter.

# METER SYSTEM TO BE INSTALLED IN THE CITY SOON

### Commission Will Install 600 Meters to Measure Water Where Not Already Measured; General House in Rates Ordered in the City.

Increase of water rates by 25 per cent as a temporary measure pending final installation of meters, costing \$12,000; with a special levy for the city and the purchasing company was determined on last evening at a meeting of the city commission. It was pointed out that the state statute provides that rates shall be in proportion to service rendered and that this can only be completed with the meter system. The city attorney was ordered to draft an ordinance embodying the new rates.

The rates under the new plan will be \$1.20 instead of \$1.25 for the minimum of 4000 gallons, with 15 cents a thousand for each additional thousand and a flat rate of \$1.00 instead of \$1.10; \$1.85 instead of \$1.45; \$2.10 instead of \$2.05 for 12,000 on the temporary flat rate. It is expected to put the new ordinance into effect July 1. There are now installed about 1500 meters in the city. Until the other 600 are installed and put into operation it will be impossible to operate them successfully. People have a way of putting on the meter for the winter and his flat rate for the summer. It will cost about \$20 apiece to install the meters.
