



Its treatment of labor disputes has ranked it far above its elder sister. It was responsible for the publicity concerning the shocking termism along the Missouri and Arlamsus railroad a few months ago. This is only a sample of the United Press' intelligent and public-spirited nolicy-The Nation.

The Associated Press in its policy of conservatism has grad-The Associated Press in its policy of conservation has grad-ually become reactionary and has assumed the role of pratector of its patrons, who, it assumes, are unable to determine what sort of news they ought to read. In this way it has inevitably come to lean toward the trusts and to send over its wires a gradier proportion of news favorable to them than favorable to their critics.

It is still a great service, but has its failings and limitations some of which tend to expand and grow.
