

PILOTS SEND GRAVE HEAD IN RACE

Two Men Leap for Their Lives When Gas Valve Fails to Work During Balloon Derby; Many Entrants Sighted; Outcome Soon Over-Orled.

BYRON, Ohio, July 5.—After the gas valve to a balloon in the national balloon race failed to work and balloons were exhausted, the two men, pilot of Springfield, Ill., and his assistant, P. A. Erick, leaped for their lives eight miles south of here, at 7:30 on Thursday morning, within 15 feet of the ground. The balloon, released at 10:30, carried cargo, shot upwards and dispersed. While high over the city, 50 miles west of Toledo a few minutes before a note calling for help and the balloon was thrown from the balloon. "Valves went work and out of ballast, and assistance to get ballast was the rest of the note."

The standard of one-half of one per cent as indicating intoxicating beverages within the meaning of the law was originally established because of the earnest plea of the liquor manufacturers themselves. For a generation, it has been the standard of the Internal Revenue Bureau.

The decision of the supreme court, handed down Friday, which holds that the Hindus are not of the Caucasian race, reverses the decision of the federal district court of Oregon and the United States circuit court of San Francisco. Whatever may be its value from the point of view of ethnology, there can be no question that it simplifies matters diplomatically, since it will tend to delay feeling on the part of other Asiatics who are denied citizenship.

According to many, perhaps a majority of writers on the subject, the Aryans, or Indo-Germans, are, ordinarily, somewhere in Central Asia. One branch moved thence into India. The other three, the Celtic, the Germanic, the Greek-Latin, and the Slavonic, came in successive waves westward and settled in Europe.

There were other arguments, but this was the strongest.

To say that the press can be bought and sold or influenced by any such a power or force is to say that practically every newspaper man is an coward and lacks the moral stamina to stand for what he thinks. The Times has denounced wrong so scathingly in the past two years that we feel that there is little ground for such a complaint especially on the part of the readers of this paper. The chances are that the fellow who is making such statements is the fellow who has been hit by one of our straight-forward honest news stories or editorials. The odds are 10 to 1 that he had some little morsel that he wished withheld from the public and because we refused he is retaliating by spreading some false propaganda.

The recent gift of the Rockefeller institute of over \$1,000,000 divided among a dozen or so great hospitals, for the furtherance of study along this line, means that it will not be long before such treatment is thoroughly understood and knowledge regarding it widely spread.

Cancer still resists. Much has been learned concerning it. Surgery, taken promptly, being it gets into the lymphatic system, works thousands of practical cures. But its cure is still unknown. Every victory on other fronts, however, gives hope that before long the medical profession will get over the top to rout this most dangerous, hard-fought enemy.
