

# COMMUNISM LIBERAL PARTY FORD CAUSE PARTY SPIRIT

### Third Party Breaks Wild Open Shortly After its Organization Three New Principles Adopted; Ford Ousted Capitalist by Some Delegates

CHICAGO, July 6.—The country's third political party "split" today a few hours after its organization over communism and Henry Ford. ## A PRETTY GOOD YEAR

The North American wheat crop on paper is nearly 100,000,000 bushels below last year's total of 1,215,000,000. Unfavorable weather through the winter, and the long springs, doubtless, led to this. The latest government estimates are well below the ten year average.

But four years ago, the same conditions have been almost identical in most sections, and both winter and spring plantings are responding in a way that offers every encouragement. The department of agriculture looks for a yield per acre at least a bushel above that of 1922, while other crops which are occupying a considerable part of last season's yield average all year to promise well.

Obviously this is not to be a bumper year, and our wheat surplus for export will be materially reduced. There is, however, no disturbing element in the situation. The farmer will get good prices for his wheat, and he will have more of other crops to sell in a market stimulated by general prosperity.

The fact of the matter is that 1923 is going to be a pretty good year all the way round, and we might as well admit it.

## A RADICAL GOVERNOR

Down in Oklahoma they have a governor elected by the "mobsters." In yesterday's news report, it is a story from Oklahoma, telling about Governor J. C. Walton's latest activities.

It seems that certain organizations, similar to those in other states, have set themselves against the law. Whippings, threats of hangings, all the usual hooliganism and atrocities of organized "hundred percents" broke out suddenly in Oklahoma county. The sheriff and police seemed impotent to act, perhaps because they themselves belonged to the secret organizations. The campaign of terror went undisturbed until outraged citizens got into touch with the governor. The governor called upon the local officials to act, and they failed.

At once the "mobsters" got into action. Five hundred national guardsmen were sent to Oklahoma. The force of the state supplanted the sheriff and his cohorts. The whippings without due process of law stopped.

With the sending of troops the governor announced that there would be martial law in every Oklahoma county where the civil rights of citizens were not enforced by local authorities.

Put, to such purpose the militia would not be in as general disrepute as it is in many states.

A few more "radical" governors might bring greater respect for the American constitution and a more widespread "love" by the people that the government intends to guarantee to them the liberties the constitution guarantees.—Union Herald.
