

DEQUILT SEA PALACE HURT BY SABOTAGE

Improper Operation Also Had Part in Damaging of Big Liner

Rechristened the Levianth Dispute Over Boat Becomes Casualty

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 7.—Highly faulty operation and deception caused the damage to the machinery of the Waterland, described at the time the big liner was seized by the government, according to the official report of Commander E. P. Jessop.

Tramp steamer "Levianth" was damaged by sabotage but he referred to this damage as minor with respect to that caused by improper handling of the ship.

"A dispute over the cause of this damage arose a few days ago when the steamer, now an American liner, was taken to Southampton, T. G. Gilman, who supervised the rechristening of the ship, stated that poor engineering operation and sabotage was responsible for the damage.

His statement was disputed by former Secretary of the Navy Daniels, who in the November, 1917, issue of the Journal of American Society of Naval Architects, but this was refuted in the conduct of the war.

The case of the Waterland is quite different from that of the other ships, Jesse wrote. "The Waterland, being the largest ship afloat, and the most complicated machine, had inferior engineering talent operating it."

"Great cracks were found in the casing of the starboard high pressure turbine. These were so extensive that it was impossible to use the turbine on the last run. This was soon corroborated since the discovery of certain rotten matter on a board showing that the vessel had been in dry dock on three propellers and at reduced speed."

GOVERNOR TO SAVE M'GEE FROM PRISON

Prison Set for July 10; Meetings Scheduled for Sunday by Friends of Editor; Whole State Aroused Over Heated Incident.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., July 7.—The trial of the "editor" of the New Mexico News Tribune on fifteen charges of contempt of court growing out of his attacks upon Judge David Leahy, member of the state judiciary and the Honorary political "fix" has been set for July 10.

The case will be tried by Judge Leahy, who has already sentenced Magge to imprisonment at hard labor for the alleged theft of Judge Leahy's name for the state supreme court.

FAIR pride plays a most important part in creating economic thrift and thrift is the key to material resources. It is not only to want in material resources but includes what is serious concern for the future. Industry does not mean the production of labor. It is unfortunate that any fair pride should exist with regard to the dignity and honor of being engaged in manual pursuits or that his life's work is one of endeavor for which he is blighted simply because of ill-fated reactions. The status of those who work with their hands is, at the present time, a heavy shortage in many of the trades. This is particularly true in the building craft and many of the rapid increase in the cost of building construction in the last few years has been due to this cause. On the other hand many other vocations, including the professions and the work performed by clerks, minor sales, messengers, bookkeepers and janitors lines of pursuit are overcrowded.

It is well to be progressive but there is much sound common sense in some of the so-called old-fashioned customs and practices. Many of our most successful men were originally farm hands or factory boys. It is not merely an idle platitude to speak of the dignity of labor. The skilled artisan who is willing to give an honest day's work for an honest day's pay holds second place to no one in the scheme of human endeavor. Let us get back to some of the ideas of our forefathers with regard to the rightful place of physical labor. False pride in these matters has cost many a young man a successful and useful career.

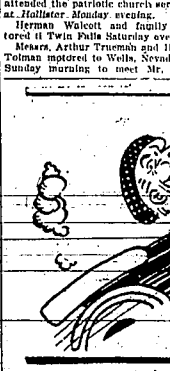
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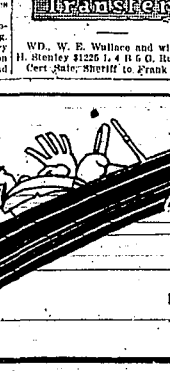

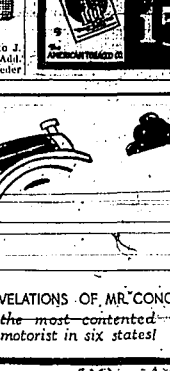

RELIGION CONDEMNS THE 12-HOUR STEEL DAY

If Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation, and his associates who are perpetuating and defending the 12-hour steel day in the steel industry cannot discern the hand writing on the wall, they will be devoid of an intelligent understanding of the humanitarian and moral forces against them. It is not alone organized labor that is crying out against the 12-hour day. The president of the United States has appealed to the steel interests for a more humanitarian treatment of their employees, and now a great federation of the religious forces of the nation, speaking for Protestants, Roman Catholics and Jews, put forth a protesting statement in the name of the Federal Council of Churches, the National Catholic Welfare Council and the Central Conference of American Rabbis. "The forces of organized religion in this country are, now warranted," this statement affirms, "in declaring that this morally indefensible regime of the 12-hour day must come to an end." The protesting statement is a just, logical analysis of the recent defense of the 12-hour day by a committee of the American Iron and Steel Institute, with Judge Gary as chief chairman.

The religious, earnest and godly indignation of their attempted defense of an indefensible practice. This protest by the organized forces of religion leaves nothing to be said in rejoinder by the supporters of the 12-hour day. Judge Gary's contention that men are not injured is effectively met with a quotation from a report of a committee of Steelholders of the United States Steel corporation, appointed in 1912 to investigate the matter. The report expressed the opinion that "the 12-hour day of labor, followed continuously by a group of men for any considerable number of years, means the deterioration of efficiency and lessening of the vigor and vitality of such men." The plea now put forward that the shortage of labor requires the 12-hour day in the steel industry is shown to be insincere from the fact that the steel corporation refused two years ago to make the change, although at that time "there was appalling unemployment, which could have been in large measure relieved of the unemployment. They cannot go on indefinitely, aggravated in stubborn, unreasonable opposition to the powerful moral, humanitarian and political forces aligned against them."—Spokane Review.

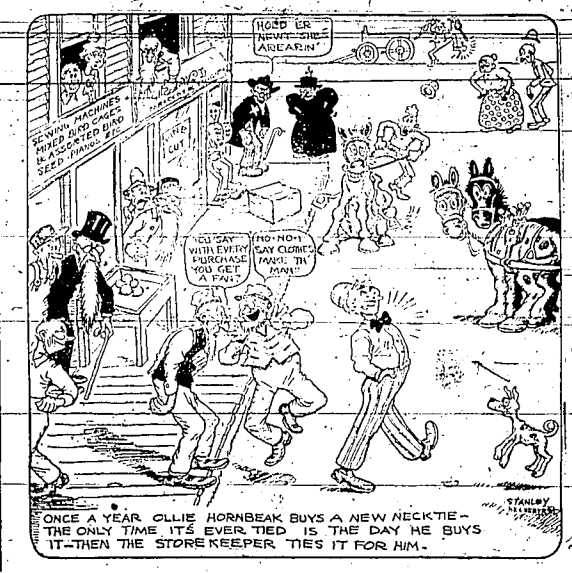

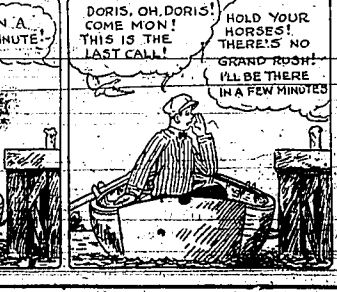

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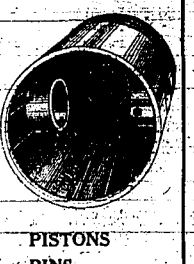
