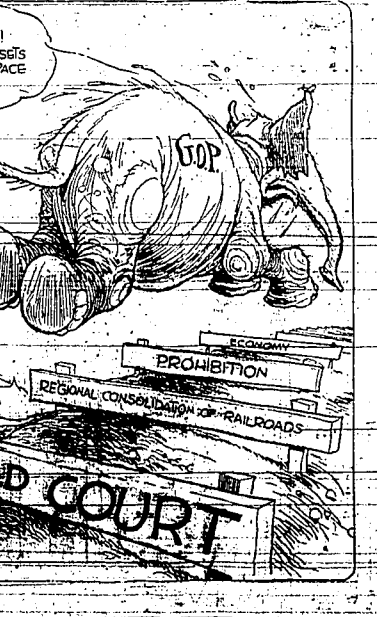
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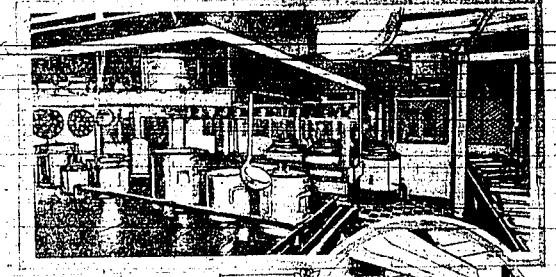

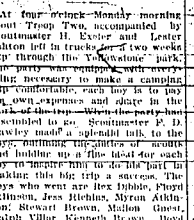

CLEVER FUNDAMENTALISTS DEFENSE

BY JAMES D. WHELAN

One of the cleverest and most condensed defenses of the what is generally classed as the fundamentalist viewpoint is a little book entitled "Evolution" with the subtitle "An Investigation and a Criticism," by Professor Theodore Graeber, of Concordia Seminary at St. Louis. This institution is a school of the Lutheran church, where the fundamentalists have an overwhelming preponderance.

The writer heretofore who leans toward those whom Professor Graeber would class as "Theistic Evolutionists" cannot always agree with the sweeping conclusions of the author, who, however, certainly suggests some puzzling questions not merely to the materialist evolutionists but to all other thinkers. He does it, too, in less than 160 pages of condensed matter.

It is, for instance, indeed hard to understand how the fish, Phryganea Filamentosus, which hatches its eggs outside the water "not that way" by any gradual process of evolution, either through transmission of acquired characteristics or survival of the fittest, of evolution, though one might assume that a fish with a mine like that is liable to do most anything.

To quote, "With great dexterity this fish distends from 5 to 7 cm. above the surface of the water and then fastens the eggs on the walls of the aquarium, usually in the corner. Even though one mudd and can preserve, damp air by covering the aquarium, the worms would nevertheless surely die if the fish were not constantly concerned to keep the water damp by an actual exhalation of little drips of water. In the performance of this act the fish remains near the surface of the water and then, by a quick upward movement of the fins of the tail, throws a drop of water upon the spawns in such an expert manner as is truly admirable. One must also keep in mind that the spawns require from three to five days for hatching and now one can understand what a huge task this little fish performs and what efforts are required. Later on the young hatch and then slide down the slick wall of the aquarium into their native element."

It is, indeed, hard to understand how any sort of natural selection could account for cases of this kind.

His argument on scriptural grounds are thoroughly fundamentalist and are compact and scholarly; still they will not command unanimous orthodox approval. God, of course, could create the whole world and the continents thereof in six days of 24 hours each. He could create it in six indefinite periods, each elapsed as a day, or He could create it potentially in an instant and let it evolve in its fullness from an original period of life. Dr. Graeber assumes the first alternative as correct. After all, the question for those who believe the scripture to be the inspired word of God to answer is, "What do the words of Holy Writ mean?" Professor Graeber leaves no doubt about what he thinks about the matter. The author writes, "The fundamentalist has determined, a priori, against Darwinism. That is that position inviolable."

In a letter-written some weeks ago in reference to his opposition to the Darwinian theory of evolution, Mr. Bryan wrote: "My Gents are set forth in a resolution unanimously adopted by the Legislature of Florida, expressing it as the sense of the legislature, 'that it is improper and subversive of the best interest of the people of this state for any professor, teacher, or instructor in the public schools of this state, supported in whole or in part by public taxation, to teach or permit to be taught atheism, agnosticism or to teach as true Darwinism or any other hypothesis that links man in a blood relationship in any other form of life. Please note that the objection is not to the teaching of the evolutionary hypothesis as an hypothesis, but to teaching of it as true or as a proven fact. This was the language of the resolution which I introduced at the Presbyterian general assembly which was defeated by a substitute which went part of the way and which, in its wording recognized the injury that is done to students by teaching of materialistic evolution."

Any person not obsessed with the worship of pseudo-science can agree with Colonel Bryan so far. But, after all, his explanation takes a question.

An hypothesis is something which is unproven, and therefore should not be taught as true. But if taught at all, it ought to be something which will improve, is a thing which might be really true and which the investigator may assume as possibly capable of proof later. It would be absurd to say, "You may teach this as an hypothesis but at the same time you must explain that it is not true and cannot be true." Colonel Bryan's reply says that physical relationship of man with other forms of animal life is unproven, but may be taught as an hypothesis. But what would happen if the hypothesis should be proven later? Obviously, it ought to be accepted.

The writer agrees heartily that many books, including some textbooks teach the unproven theory of evolution of man from lower animals, and that this should be prevented. What is still more important than the alleged physical relationship is the theory against which many material evolutionists protest, that there is no difference of kind between the intellectual processes of man and that of lower animals. Teaching of this is at best original fiction.

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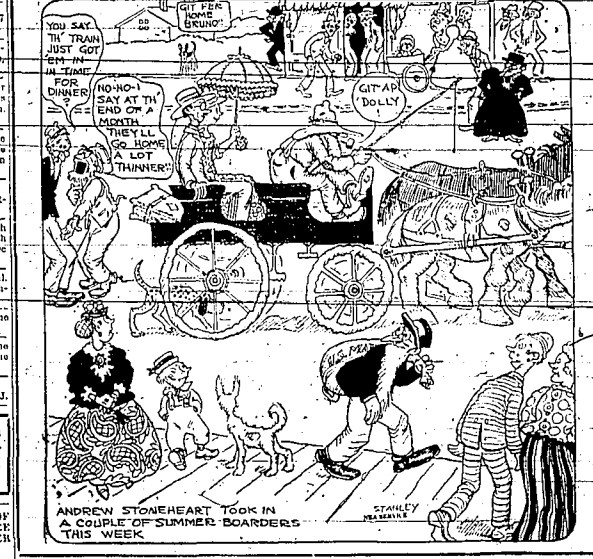

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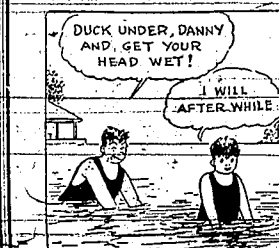
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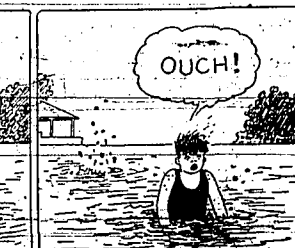
