ORDER HAINES TO BE HELD FOR ACTIONS

Counsel for Editor Magee to Face Jury on Contention He Spoke in Defense of Client and Official... Leaky's Court, Much Excitement.

LAS VEGAS, N. M., July 10.—Shortly after midnight officials of the San Miguel county court work up Judge Richard H. Hanna, chief of counsel for Carl C. Magee, Attorney General, who goes on trial today for alleged contempt of court, and presented him a second citation to show cause why he should not be suspended from practice.

He was ordered to make a return by 12:30 o'clock in the afternoon, submitting his answering brief and presenting himself for trial immediately. If the court finds him guilty of the charges in this citation, which accuse him of being present at the meetings and speaking in defense of Magee and in criticism of Judge David Leaky's court, Magee will lose the backbones of his defense and be forced to go through his own trial for contempt without counsel.

Associate Counsel Fred Wilson said this morning it was hopeless to defend the contempt charges against the services of Judge Hanna. Long before 1 o'clock when Magee was on his way to the San Miguel county court house was surrounded by spectators of all classes of new Mexican citizens. They were shouting and making noise and speaking in defiance of the law. Indians kept themselves in blankets and steps on the lawn until the doors were thrown open.
