BEN PHINELL SUSPECT IS DISCOVERED

Los Angeles Authorities Find Man with All the earmarks of Wanted Sect Ruler; Termed the Father of 67 Children; Probe is Now On.

LOS ANGELES, July 21.—The Los Angeles police today announced that they had discovered the real King Benjamin Phinell and his whereabouts in the House of Deeds.

Dr. Helen Allen of Salem, Virginia, "the father of 67 children," is being held on the basis of charges involving one of his daughters, 17 year old Gladis Allen, "the high stepper from the mountains," while the authorities investigate her career in Hollywood.

Southwestern Grain Growers Strike for Higher Wheat Price

CHICAGO, July 21.—Southwestern grain growers have started a "selling strike" for higher wheat prices, the American Farm Bureau Federation was informed today.

The federation issued a statement saying its plans for farmers to withdraw 200,000,000 bushels of wheat from the market and store it in farm bins already being followed in Kansas with the aid of financing through the intermediate credit bank at Wichita.

The Wichita bank is now lending farmers about \$100,000 daily on stored wheat and will soon be lending \$2,000,000 daily, according to word from Miles C. Lanater, president of the institution.

The money is being borrowed under the intermediate credit act passed by the last congress. The federation believes the 24 other intermediate credit banks are preparing to follow the lead of the one in Wichita.

Simultaneously with reports of this wheat storage receipt at Kansas City and Gulf ports have fallen off, indicating that farmers are holding for higher prices, the federation says.

Exporters at Gulf ports were forced to pay a premium to satisfy their demand yesterday. The "selling strike" also resulted in a one-cent advance in price at these points.

The American Farms Federation scheme to withdraw wheat from the market resulted in price dropping below a 1 bushel on the Chicago Board of Trade. Loans of about \$185,000,000 to farmers through the new credit act will be necessary to finance the 2,000,000-bushel pool.

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE HEAD DEFENDS SELF

NEW YORK, July 21.—In answering publicly today indignations for alleged anti-saloonism, the head of the anti-saloon league, William H. Anderson, superintendent of the New York State anti-saloon bureau, accused that he was in a conspiracy to act Gov. Al Smith of beer and light wine fame, in the White House.

An additional grand jury indicted Anderson twice yesterday for grand larceny and once for forgery. Anderson faces today his trial for forgery. Anderson, who is a candidate for governor in next year's campaign, acted as counsel for Anderson, securing a stay of five days for his client, who was released on \$5,000 bail.

Anderson faces two additional indictments for extortion, making five in all. They were voted and will be laid up and reported next Wednesday.

The grand jury also called for an immediate investigation into the activities of the anti-saloon league in New York county, January 1, 1923, by the state legislator.

NO WIFE REPORTED

WASHINGTON, July 21.—The war department today had not been advised of the reported slide in the Panama canal. Officials explained that only serious slides which block traffic are reported officially to Washington and they hoped that no news meant good news.

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\$10,000 Is Taken In Small Change from Street Cars

KANSAS CITY, July 21.—Twenty of more than 20,000 in pennies, nickels and dimes from street cars and trolleys were charged today against four former employees of the Kansas City street railway company. The trolleys had been carried over a period of almost two months by a conductor, motor man and an employe in charge of the fare boxes, officials charged.

Clarence C. Topley, motor man, and Edward Jutta, who had charge of checkouts in the fare boxes at one of the large bars, confessed their part in the robbery, authorities said, implicating Paul Brown, a conductor.

BORAH TALKS TO CALDWELL FOLKS

CALDWELL, Idaho, July 21.—The election result in the state of Minnesota where Magnus Johnson, farmer, and anti-saloon league, defeated Governor Pross, republican stalwart, for the seat in the United States senate made waves through the ranks of the late Senator Knute Nelson, is making more than a cry of economic distress here.

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SUPERIORITY OF PRIVATE ROAD NOTED

President's Visit Convinces Him That Government Line Does Less Business Than Other Road, Through Heart of Alaska Copper Belt.

WITH PRESIDENT HARDING EN ROUTE TO DENVER, July 21.—Members of President Harding's party were today making comparisons between the government's Alaska railroad, on which \$26,000,000 has already been spent and the privately owned line along the copper river country visited yesterday by the president.

The comparisons were all in favor of the private road, which, however, is ten years older than the government road. The government road is a 472 mile long line which carries copper ore from the copper mines and supplies to the mines.

This government railroad officials explained the fact that all along the copper river railroad, there was much trouble on the sidings while not a car of freight was sent along the 472 miles of the government road.

A movement will be begun in congress this winter, it was indicated, to lease or otherwise dispose of the government railroad to private interests on the grounds that they can more efficiently and economically manage the line.

Mr. Harding and cabinet members with him will support the idea, believing that the Alaska railroad will in time be the center of a great transportation system including branch roads and inland waterways.

Such depends, however, on the development of the country, which work in Mr. Harding's opinion, must be left to private enterprise. Congress must not be stampeded into spending huge sums to try to force Alaska growth on advice optimistic citizens, but neither will the government's interest in the territory be lost through parsimony.

SHORT LINE IS AUTHORIZED TO BUILD RAILROAD

Action Confirms Promise Made by Officials of the Union Pacific Wednesday That Construction Would Begin Within Thirty Days; Commission Acts This Morning.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 21.—The Oregon Short Line railroad company was today authorized by the interstate commerce commission to construct a new line of railroad between Rogerson, Twin Falls county, Idaho, and Wells, Idaho, Nevada.

The new line will be 98 miles long, opening up a rich agricultural territory at present without railroad facilities. Its estimated cost is \$5,000,000. The road expects to derive annual revenues totaling \$135,000 from the new line and \$161,000 added revenue to its existing system.

The new road will connect with the Southern Pacific and Western Pacific at Wells, Nev.

The above United Press dispatch received this morning by The Times clinches the assurance given by Chief Engineer W. H. Armstrong to Senator Martin J. Crowley, Wednesday, that dirt would be flying within a month, since President Carl L. Gray stated that the dirt flying would begin inside of thirty days from the time of granting of the certificate.

The value of the new line which is now expected to be developed as a freight line, is likely to be developed into a rival of Butte, and as it is situated where crops are raised, the products needed to feed a large population there will come from the Twin Falls tract.

However, the great live stock interests of Nevada will absorb all the hay that can be grown, and open a market for the alfalfa fields. However, even greater than all these is the short haul to tide water of the unutilized products of the state.

The announcement today marks the culmination of a long fight for a road south which began in the very earliest days of the state. Twelve years a strong movement was started, crystallizing all the previous work at this time Vice President Hiram Bingham announced the determination of the Union Pacific to build through Idaho.

A survey was conducted, part of which will be used on the new line, but it branched off to Montana, Nev. Instead of Wells. (Continued on Page 2)

SAVERS OF RANDIT KING ARE HUNTED

Armed Forces Search for Marders of Pancho Villa; Famous Figure in Mexican Life for Years; Gentry is Greedy Shooked by News.

MEXICO CITY, July 21.—Federal forces tonight searched the near Santa Barbara at dawn in search of seven savans who also down Pancho Villa, their leader in 1916, while he was driving his car down the street in a suburb of Parral.

Villa, the famed outlaw of Mexico, died, the government made every effort to trace his assassins and as daylight dawned over the eastern coast of Mexico today the search was still in progress.

The savans apparently have covered their tracks well. There were no reports here to indicate that any trace of them had been found. Army officials, however, are confident that the murderers got away to a good night's sleep, there were no horses for hire in the vicinity of Parral. They searched yesterday afternoon and late into the night but their efforts are said to have been unsuccessful.

Troops are being moved into the region from all nearby posts. This morning the town of Parral resembled an armed camp and business is practically suspended. Troops arrived through the night. They want to see the body of the famous Villa.

Thirteen savans of Villa, arrived this morning at Parral. He came from Chihuahua City to take charge of the search.

Troops also were stationed about the neighborhood of Villa's ranch in Parral. They have been instructed to prevent troops and guard Villa's home and office. So papers or other things in the hands of the government officials are to be guarded. President Obregon has ordered a personal investigation and it is believed some of the savans may be found among the outlaw's private papers to shed some light on the daring assassination.

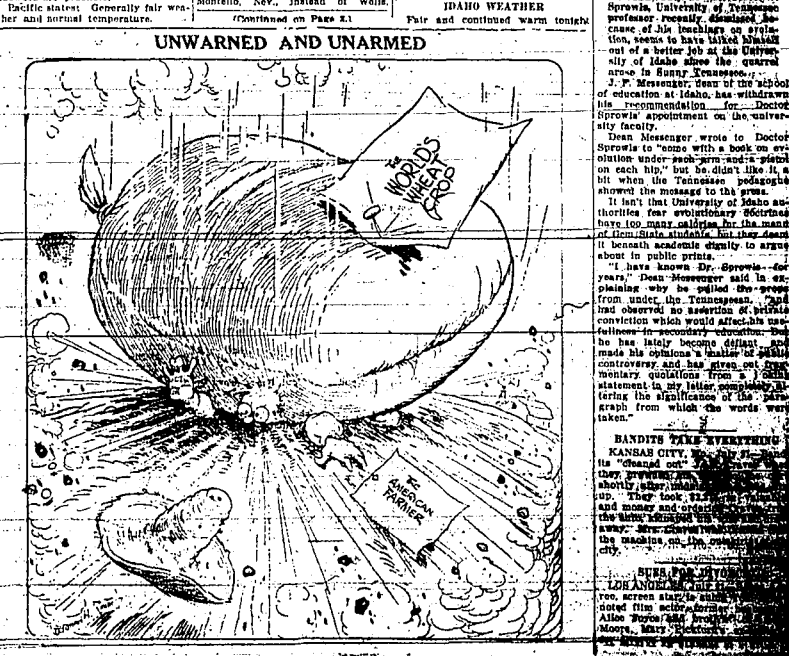

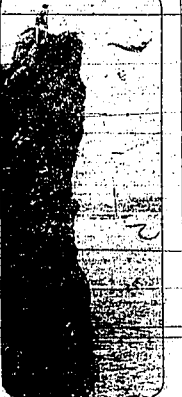

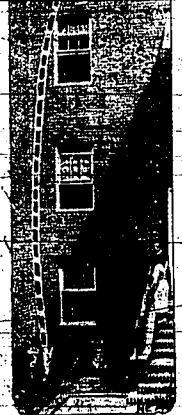
