

WALL ROCKS CALIFORNIA: BIG DAMAGE

LOS ANGELES, July 22.—(Earthquake) A hot, breathless day with a high heat in the 80's—prevailed this morning when movie work after a night in which the most severe earthquake in this region since 1914.

Three distinct shocks were felt here, with minor tremors all over the panic-stricken Californian took little notice, but the several hundred thousand spectators from the middle west, who were experiencing their first earthquake since from their homes, when earth "shaking" caused children to run up and down the sidewalks and men and women to fall from the walls.

San Diego, Riverside and Mojave Shaken by Tectonic Quakes; Pasadena, too, Feels Quakes of Disaster; Adobe Houses Are Demolished.

LOS ANGELES, July 22.—A succession of earthquake shocks, between 11:25-25:00 night and 1 a. m. Monday was felt throughout southern California. The shocks started early today to total approximately 1500.

The fall of damage was well beyond running from a few cents to several hundred dollars. There was an outstanding crash at any point, which was the destruction of a small set of stately buildings for almost part was confined to plaster and brickwork breaks and the shattering of expensive plate glass windows.

San Bernardino suffered the heaviest loss. The hull of records there, lost—lost—lost—lost. Pasadena estimated at \$25,000 was suffered at the outbreak, where figures of two buildings were thrown to the street.

Some recent statistics made public by the National Guild of Fire Underwriters furnish proof of the intensification of the fire problem in this country. According to the figures there is an annual loss of over 15,000,000 dollars directly to fire. During the last five years about a billion dollars worth of third class dwellings were destroyed.

Some of these losses are due to avoidable causes. We mean that substantially \$200,000,000 worth of homes were needlessly burned up in the United States in the last five years.

If \$10,000 is the average cost of a home these figures indicate an avoidable destruction of about \$2,000,000,000 during the five year period, which would be sufficient to shelter the population of a city of 10,000,000.

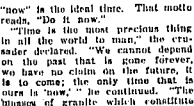
The wiping out of this property means a tremendous economic loss to the country. It is so much capital lost.

And these losses, appalling though they seem, are as nothing compared to the billions of dollars human lives a year!

The solution of this problem lies almost entirely in education. Various individuals and organizations have been trying for years to secure greater attention to fire in the public schools. If such an addition to the curricula of the nation's schools went no further than a partial elimination of fires from preventable causes, the saving of human lives and property which would result would be worth all the time, energy and money involved.

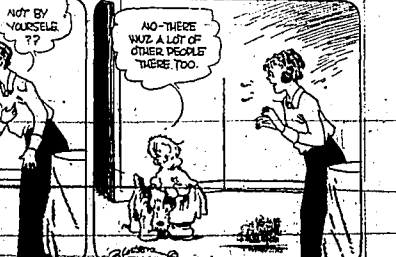

**Director of Swimming, University of California Summer Session and Co-Author of "Swimming Simplified" SECOND ARTICLE—HOW TO SWIM THE CRAWL**

BY LIRA M. SHEFFIELD

To achieve the correct leg position: Place the feet on the tank and grasp some support slightly above the surface of the water.

Keeping hold of the support, take the face-down, floating position described yesterday, but keep the nose above water by turning the head so that the right side only is in the water.

With the legs extended, kick your feet up and down alternately never having a greater distance than eight to ten inches between the ankles. The up stroke of each foot is easy, the power being on the down stroke.

After practicing this for about two minutes, combine it with the face-submerged position.

To learn the elementary crawl and stroke, stand erect, either on land or in water about waist deep, with the right arm extended straight in front of you, palm down, the feet apart.

Next lower the body, holding slightly forward, until the shoulders are under water.

Now take a deep breath, hold it. This is technically known as the "face-submerged position," and it is the starting position for the crawl naturally as you are walking.

When the face-submerged position is correctly combined with the arm motion, you will be swimming. The stroke which comes next naturally is the elementary crawl, and you will notice from this motion how

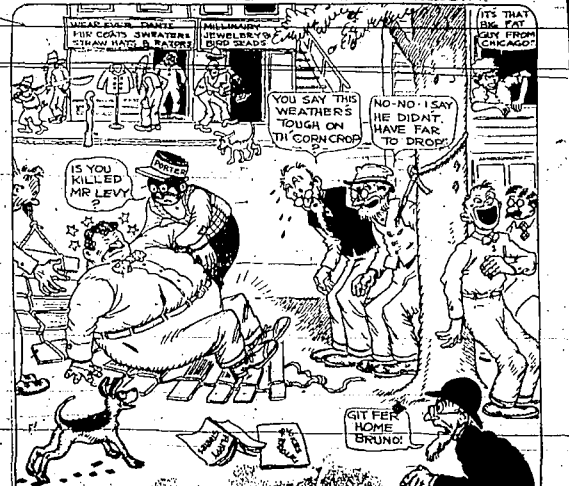
