Although our Canadian neighbors read American books and magazines voluminously, they have their turns of speech that are not American and do not appear to be British either. Dominion papers last week told how the senate had given "the six months' hold" to the government's bill appropriating \$25,000,000 for new railway lines. The measure in question did not get a "Hill" action was postponed for six months. The bill was, as it were, raised to a high shelf and placed out of sight. That kind of a stunt is not a "boost."

Secretary Work says of the removal of Director Davis of the reclamation service, "I shall put the protests on one side and put on the other the letters and messages from power users who have to pay for the director's work, these letters, being commendatory of the change in policy." He also speaks of \$1,000,000 outstanding in delinquent payments and adds that hereafter he intends to see that the reclamation work is not confined to its engineering aspects. Still he doesn't make it clear just what he thinks was the matter with Mr. Davis—Springfield Republican.

The Salvation Army meeting an illustrated lecture tonight, showing six reels of pictures from the front line, is one that should command a large attendance. The work of the Army during the great war was one of devotion and self-sacrifice. The facts and lassies were deservedly popular everywhere with the boys—that fought on the front. The Army has had a successful ten-day revival here under the efficient leadership of Colonel George H. Davis, and the address will prove a fitting climax of the meetings. The admission charge of 25 cents is purely nominal, considering the heavy expense involved in the conduct of the meeting and the securing of the films.

There has naturally been criticism of Governor Tompsett of Connecticut for his veto of the bill prohibiting the pollution of streams and harbors by the discharge of waste from factories. He has many defenders, however, and not merely among the manufacturers who opposed the bill. It is pointed out, for instance, that the bill imposed no prohibition on the dumping of sewage from cities and towns; it aimed only at the elimination of waste and filth from manufacturing plants. The bill, in fact, made only a beginning in the solution of a large problem. But it must be seriously asked whether this beginning was not a desirable step in the right direction. Both factories and municipalities must sooner or later tackle the scientific disposal of sewage.

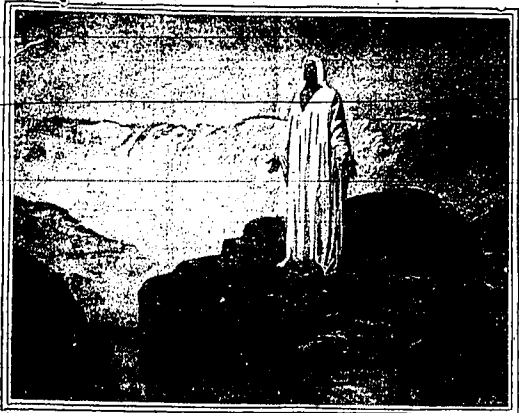
## A DRAMATIC PICTURE OF REAL LIFE

"Human Wreckage," one of the greatest pictures it is, that has been released from the studios of Hollywood, is a tragic drama of real life. It was inspired by the untimely death of Wallace Reid, the matinee idol of the movies whose career was cut short by the fiend known as dope or drugs. And in it stars his wife, who tried desperately to save her husband, only to meet with heart-breaking failure. Running through the film story is a great moral lesson. "Human Wreckage" is allied with those righteous forces that seek to save the young men and the young women from a fate worse than death—becoming addicted to the drug eating habit.

Government reports show that legal imports of opiates in 1922 totalled 2,105,151 ounces, or more than three times the total imported in 1921. Not more than 10 per cent of this is actually required for medical or scientific uses. The amount smuggled into this country, all of which is sold to addicts, through so-called "dope peddlers" probably amounts to more than the legal imports. That this underground traffic keeps pace with legalized handling is reflected by the fact that opiates discovered and seized in 1921 amounted to more than three times the quantity seized in 1921. It is estimated there are a million and a half drug addicts in the United States today. The average age is 25 years. While this country produces an opium, it consumes more per capita than any other country in the world.

There is something intensely dramatic about Mrs. Reid's fight against narcotics and as a result there is something intensely virile and intensely confounding about it. All the world knows the magnificent fight he fought against the greatest curse humanity has ever known; a fight he lost when death forever sealed his lips and closed his eyes.

Mrs. Reid, the world knows, was the inspiration behind her husband's determined but unavailing fight against odds which not even a superman can overcome. She it was who gave the broken, physically wrecked film star succor in the hour of his greatest need; stood by him and tenderly cared for him, fighting his battle even as he fought it himself—but without avail. The world wept with Mrs. Wallace Reid when death snatched her husband out, and dove the victor. It wondered why it had to be that he who fought so valiantly should be defeated by an accursed traffic, the like of which the world has never known. But no need to wonder, if you know the least bit of the power of drugs, for hardly can the greatest human fight possible overcome the venom of this vice over its fangs have kunkin into human flesh. That is the awful pity of dope. That is why the fight must be pressed with vigor to save the uninitiated before the first seed is sown. Mrs. Wallace Reid is not alone in the fight she wages. She

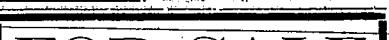

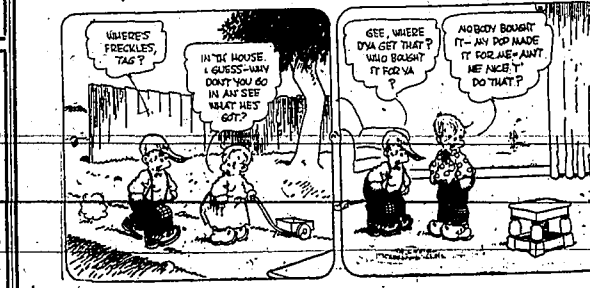

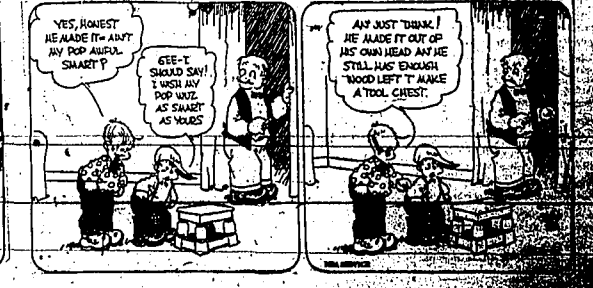
