Seventy-five thousand dollars was distributed to Burley people this week by T. J. Warner, liquidating agent for the State Banking Department handling the affairs of the defunct Commercial State Bank of Burley, says the Burley Bulletin.

## SPECIAL TAX FOR CATTLE IS STATE DEMAND

Half of 1 Per Cent of Assessable Value of Such Stock Is to Be Added to Levy by Virtue of Mandatory Law of Last Legislature to Pay for Cattle Destroyed.

Notice has been received by the board of county commissioners that the Idaho law of annual industry has fixed the special levy of half of one per cent on the assessable value of the cattle in the county, for the purpose of paying of indemnities for cattle destroyed under the compulsory vaccination law, provided for by the last legislature. The law provides for the term of payment to the federal bureau, or for amounts under the provisions of the act, which are in mandatory and the commissioners have no option.

The bureau of animal industry is allowed to levy a tax of one per cent of the assessable value of the cattle if it should deem this to be necessary. When cattle are destroyed as provided by the statute compensation is made to the owner, but it shall not exceed the assessed valuation of the cattle destroyed.

No payment shall be made for any cattle destroyed if the owner does not disinfest the premises as directed by the state or federal authority, or if the cattle contain any communicable disease, or if animals, pertaining to that not approved by state or federal bureau, or for animals which the owner knew to be diseased at the time they came into possession.

Out of 80,000 samples of seized liquor analyzed by the official chemists at Washington, one per cent were found to be pure. In other words, drinkers of the stuff have 99 chances in 100 of encountering blindness or sudden death, and 100 chances, even, of acquiring a habit which, if ever broken, will be at the cost of indignity, suffering and unutterable sorrow.

Considering the spectacle of smuggling and bootleg piracy on the high seas, The Manchester Guardian says: "It is disconcerting for us to think how our own country is involved. We ought to go to any reasonable lengths to assist President Coolidge and his home government." If his majesty's government would act upon this hint, it would not merely be fulfilling a moral obligation, but would set in operation a form of propaganda for the conquest of the good opinion of the United States which even Hiram Johnson could not denigrate.

There is a reason for the heavy tourist traffic through Twin Falls this season. Many of these travelers are looking for a location and their eyes have been turned toward the Twin Falls tract. Therefore, they are making it a point to direct their itinerary in such a way as to pass through the Magic City. Twin Falls church folk paid glowing tributes to the late President Harding yesterday in their various services and especially at the park service last evening. But the highest tribute was not uttered. Those silent tributes which go up from the hearts of citizens like ours are the real tributes, which cause men to do and dare. Regardless of part, affiliation of men of every clime and from the four corners of America have wafted their silent prayers and expressions of love and sympathy to our late president. In times like these men forget that we have in America republicans, democrats, socialists, etc., but they never lose sight of the fact that they are true American standing four square for the greatest nation, and the greatest flag that has ever been floated upon the breezes by a free people.

## THE ANONYMOUS ATTACK COMES FROM BEHIND

It is a strange fact that those who shrink assuming responsibility for their acts resort to the anonymous attack to strike from behind. Anonymous communications are like poison letters, they seek to tear down and ruin under the guise of innocents. No one is immune from their shafts which fly at random striking and wounding at will.

The anonymous communication is an old enemy in the average newspaper office. They come with every mail but they never see the light of day, unless there is attached to them some means of identification. Those who refuse to place their names under a communication, especially when they seek to criticize or attack, fail to show the true American spirit of sportsmanship and only belittle themselves in the minds of their fellowmen. If a thing is worth saying it is worth standing by. The truth never hurt anyone.

But the anonymous letter, the anonymous statement, the anonymous communication is an enemy to society, a dangerous instrument that proves on its face those responsible for its issuance do not even have the courage of their own convictions.

## TRANSPORTATION AFFECTS ALL

When life was simple, problems could be considered upon their own merits, without relation to other problems. The colonial planter ate what he raised, and could if ever would be shipped. If he went on a journey, it was then time enough to consider the horse, the coach, the road over which traveled. Traveling was one thing, and living at home was another, neither affected the other. Today we see what others were and could if ever would be. We are by the coal which others mine, and whether or not we ever go on a journey, the roads—whether they be railroad or rivers or canals or dirt roads—must function to bring our food and fuel to us, and to take from us the goods we make. True, the farmer lives from his own grain and cattle, but he must yet depend on transportation to sell his product, and to bring him what he buys with the reward of that product.

Transportation cannot, now, be considered as a part of any problem. It is a part of ALL social problems. And it is especially a part of the educational problem, since children must go from home to school, and where the school is some distance away, must ride. The good road means a good school, a well attended school, an effective school. The best school, located on a mud road, miscalculated a road, cannot instruct children, children who cannot get to school because of mud.

The schools of this nation can never reach their fullest development, or do full justice to our children, until we have good roads everywhere.

All taxes are burdensome; but the tax to build good roads and keep them good, if properly spent, pays great dividends, not only in decreasing the cost of hauling, and so increasing profits, decreasing the time of journey, and so increasing the time of earning, but in decreasing the number of "absences" on children's report cards, and so increasing their school life.

## Western Babies Prove Hardier Than Eastern Infants Says Report; Seek Lower Death Rate Nationally

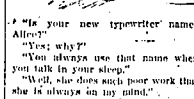


Pacific Coast babies have proved more hale and hearty than their brothers and sisters living in other sections of the country. No longer does the tenderfoot East set the pace as an example of how to live the perfect life. This is the view of Dr. George W. Palmer, director of the research, American Child Health Association, who is shown in the inset. He says: "Horace Greeley was right. 'Go West, young man, go West,' he said. The young man went and found it an excellent plan to bring up his family. The most attractive spots for babies have just been revealed by the publication of the infant mortality statistics for 1922 in 935 cities of over 10,000 population, as compiled by the American Child Health Association. Oregon, represented by four cities of over 10,000 population, is the winning State with a rate of 38.6. This means that during the year out of a hundred babies born 61.4 died. Fifty-eight and six-tenths seems a lot but it is the best record made by any state in the Union. Oregon's rate may be compared with Tennessee where 103 out of every thousand babies born failed to reach their first birthday. "The figures for each state and averaging them for sections of the country, the Pacific Coast—Washington, Oregon and California—win first honors with a rate of 60.7. The west-north central section, represented by Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas and Missouri is second with a rate of 65. The best showing east of the Mississippi is that of the east-north central section repre-

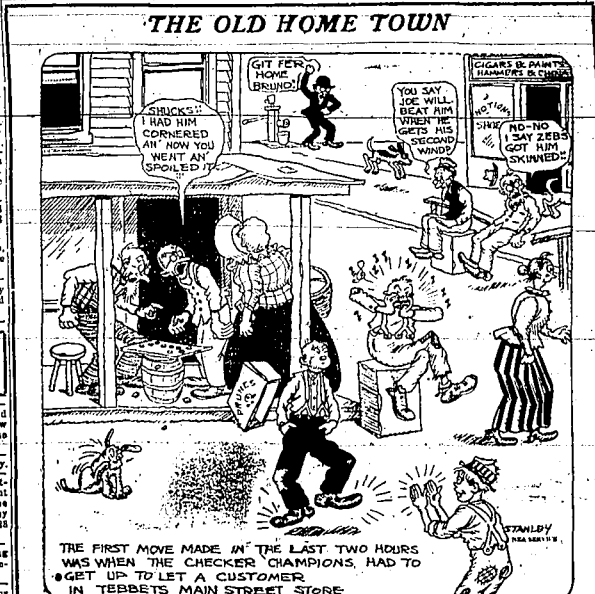
