NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—As a single mourner the nation will stand with bowed head for a brief moment today in reverent respect for the departed leader.

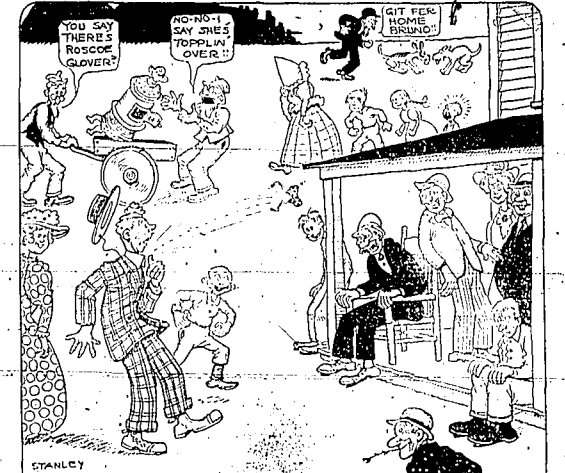

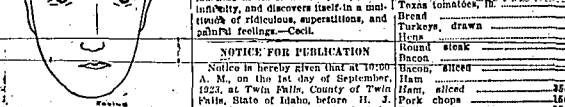

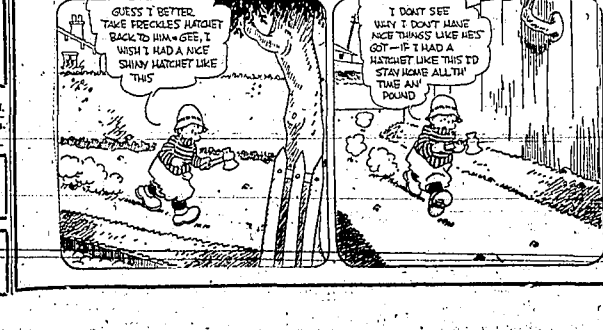
