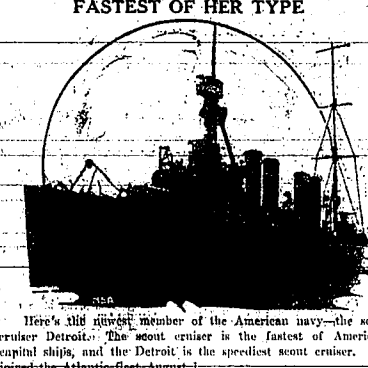
DE VALERA'S ARRESTED BY IRISH FORCES

'President of Republic' Apprehended; Faints While Making Address at Election Meeting; Has Colorful Career.

ENNIS, Ireland, Aug. 15.—Eamon De Valera, president of the Irish republic, was arrested at an election meeting here today, (said) from the platform and was escorted to a military barracks by the troops of the Irish free state.

It was understood by many. In the event of a military attack on the town, De Valera had been placed under arrest, but an official statement to that effect was at first not forthcoming.

It was also reported the Irish rebel leader had been wounded during the rioting and it was said later to be untrue. De Valera had been speaking about two minutes, addressing a crowd of about 1,000, when he was arrested. He was taken to a military barracks and placed in a cell. He was later released and returned to his home.



MASS MEETINGS ARE PROHIBITED

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 15.—Meetings of Tulsa residents called to protest against enforcement of martial law were prohibited today by order of General D. H. Mahan.

While troops patrol the streets, General Mahan is conducting an exhaustive investigation into "reign of terror" which Gov. Walton declared existed as a result of many whippings and floggings, when he ordered the militia to take over law enforcement in Tulsa.

Police and sheriff's forces functioned as usual, with the heads of the departments reporting to the sheriff officer in command. All arrests were cleared of unnecessary militia at 11 p.m. and all who could not give a good account of themselves were held in jail for further investigation.

Mahan summoned many witnesses to tell what they knew of abolition and whippings by masked men.

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WE REQUIRE ESTABLISHED IN GERMANY

New Coalition Government Fully in Power Today; Chancellor Makes First Address; Mentions Cuno As Ambassador to U. S.

Chancellor Stresemann's first appearance in the Reichstag, where he won an overwhelming vote of confidence last night, has produced high spirits and optimism that resistance to France and Belgium in the Ruhr will continue. European political observers to the conviction that the change of government in Germany has merely served to strengthen that country's hand.

It is believed that the policy of passive resistance will be carried out and that the situation in the Ruhr is slightly improved. However, German labor is willing to give Stresemann a chance for any more moderate reason. The general public is skeptical because the workers proved too well disciplined.

BERLIN, Aug. 15.—Chancellor Stresemann's new coalition government appeared today in power today, after presentation to the Reichstag yesterday, and a strong vote of confidence by that body.

A majority of the middle groups of public opinion seemed in full accord with the government and ready to back it, and the communists and extreme reactionaries—the only groups in opposition.

The new chancellor's opening speech of calming, despite new outbreaks yesterday in Aachen (Als in Chappelle) and vicinity, in which were killed many officers of 100 wounded and extension of the strikes in the chemical and electrical industries at Frankfurt.

The new chancellor's opening speech in the Reichstag, during which he boldly downplayed coming help from the "new government" will follow, out the same broad lines as the preceding cabinet of Dr. Wilhelm Cuno.

Stresemann declared himself in favor of consolidation of the political and economic situation as an indispensable preliminary to resumption of reparations payments. Continuation of passive resistance, which he said, was fully justified in the first British note to France, and an interest-free loan to provide funds.

A Kemmerer Bowed in Sorrow for Victims of Disastrous Mine Blast

Almost Every Home in Kemmerer in Mourning As Result of Horrible Catastrophe; Large Number of Bodies Have Been Recovered From Inside; 137 Men Entered Mine, Which Would Place Toll at 100; Costenation Begins at Little Wyoming Town During Entire Day.

At 10:30 reports direct from the mine were that 88 bodies had been removed, 13 others located in the workings, three remained unaccounted for and 37 had been taken out alive. This confirmed United Press reports carried early this morning. Announcement that 137 men had entered the mine to go to work would leave 100 dead, if the latest check on the disaster is correct. It is considered possible that some more men may have been in the shaft at the time of the explosion. As time passes without mention of others, however, officials believe reports at this time to be as will be shown on the final check.

SUGAR COMPANY'S REQUEST DENIED

The Twin Falls canal board yesterday conditionally denied the request made by the Americanized Sugar Company that the flow be increased in an lateral leading by the local factory in order that canal water may be used in the factory.

The canal board will not allow the flow to be increased unless the sugar company, paying the written consent of all land owners whose property the lateral passes.

To make sufficient water available for the factory use, it would be necessary to increase the flow of the lateral during the late fall months, when several owners of land through which the lateral runs are objecting on the ground that the increased flow in the fall months might result in damaging their land by seepage.

HELEN WILLS AND PRESENT CHAMP BEST OF NET STARS

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Play in the national women's tennis championship is proceeding upon expected form and it seems almost certain now that Miss Helen Wills, the good looking California miss, will meet Mrs. Molla Mallory again in the final round for the title. Once again the wonder is arising if this is "Little Helen's" year and the large part of tennis is hoping that it is.

The young California girl in the British-American contest, and the first two rounds of the nationals had played tennis and her form aroused Wallis Love, the former European critic to remark that her game is on a par with Miss Lenz, the greatest of them all.

So far in her progress through the early rounds Miss Wills has been very tested while Mrs. Mallory has very little opposition. In the second round she had as her opponent another most capable player in Miss Loretta Baker, the British star.

Today she has to play Mrs. Helen Patrick, and then in the next rounds if they follow form she will be expected to meet Miss Kathleen McKane, England's greatest player, and either Miss Eleanor Goss and Mrs. L. C. Cress, another British star.

Mrs. Mallory probably will have Mrs. Coraith Brown, the British player, and Miss Leslie Harter, the second ranking American, to play to beat to get into the final round.

The American champion, although not credited so far, had shown herself to be in good form but she may have plenty of trouble with Mrs. Harter as the British player should improve in form with each round of the tournament.

The American Bankers' association, through cooperation of local banks throughout the country, is waging an active and impressive advertising campaign against fraudulent stock and other promotions which will not stand the tests of financial analysis. The slogan of the campaign is "Ask your own banker."

It is timely and wholesome advice. Your best bank is expert and the benefits of its long experience in investments and finances is yours for the asking. American banks are performing a distinct service in this respect and one that is bound to be of great benefit. When in doubt, "ask your banker." If the investment is sound you will not lose by the slight delay incident to investigating.

A SHIP RATE WAR

The first shot in a trans-Atlantic passenger rate war is to be fired at the opening of the tourist season, according to advices from London, which quote authoritative sources as predicting that America will discharge the first gun. When the great Leviathan enters the trade under the American flag, a new era in the history of the American merchant marine will be opened.

In spite of conditions in foreign countries being more propitious for shipping interests it is not going too far to predict that a rate war initiated by America and carried "to the limit" is presently feared by European passenger lines, which for half a century have held a monopoly of transportation between the new and the old world. So acute is the fear entertained that persons in the closest touch with the situation predict America's challenge to the world will be a "knock out blow."

With the economic conditions in European countries and in England fluctuating between the shadow of war and the prospect of peace, the time is ripe for America to assert herself as a factor in international commerce. The facilities of American lines are not inferior to those of foreign registry, and in broadening its challenge to the world, America has nothing to fear. If it takes the initial step in the rate war, it will impress this fact indelibly upon its rivals.

STRICTER MOTOR LAWS

Statistics given out by the National Safety Council reveal an appalling number of deaths that have occurred within the United States, the past year, through accidents involving automobiles. More than 12,000 persons were victims of careless driving or the mania for speed, and in 78 cities of over 50,000 population, 1,347 children lost their lives.

With fatalities from automobile accidents each year looking more and more like the casualty lists from France during the world war, it is an opportune moment to lay down such rigid restrictions governing the granting of automobile licenses as to exclude many who now enjoy a driver's privilege. Therein lies the root of the trouble—the comparative ease with which a person acquires the right to drive, be he capable or not. Of course, the prospective driver must submit to an examination in most states, but analyzed, how effective is this examination.

The death rate for 1922 should be sufficiently convincing for a sweeping change in the automobile laws of most states.

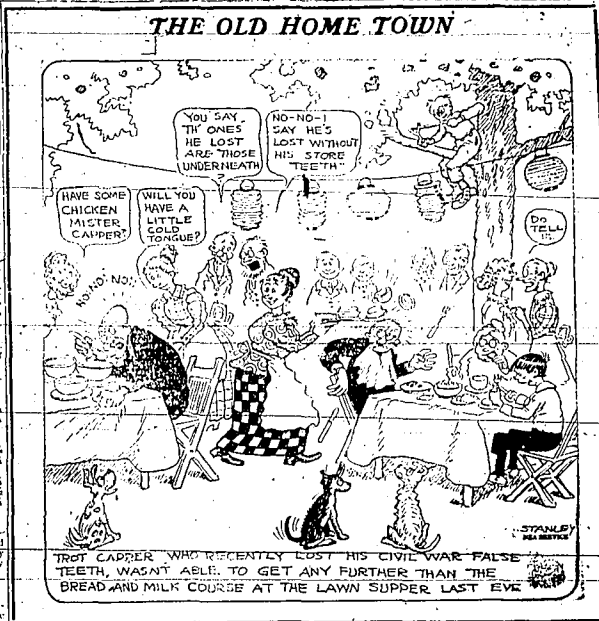
