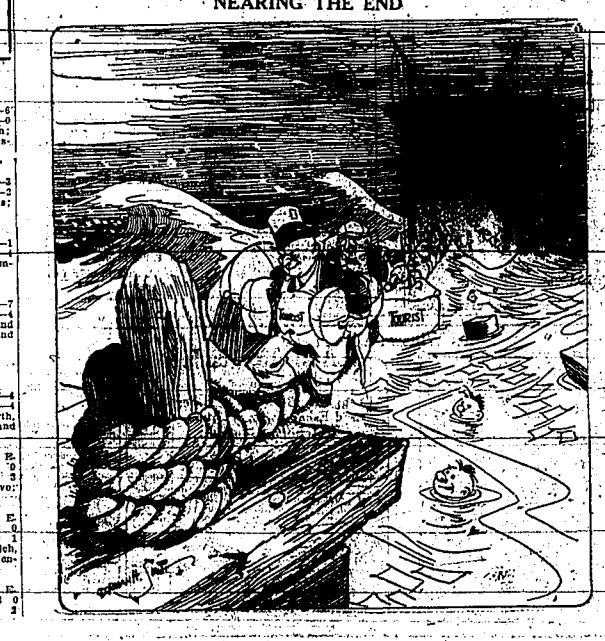

who, if necessary, be commenced without delay.

In some instances I observe a lack of coordination, not only in the general efforts of the club, but in the efforts of the individual members. The club that are most successful in their organization are those in which a president is keenly active in all the affairs of the club. It is the responsibility of a president of a club to Kiwanis to create and maintain a high standard of leadership. The highest and best type of leadership does not require the exercise of force by the leader. The ability to divide responsibility, and after having it, to distribute it, is a definite responsibility of one of the highest qualities of a leader. It is his duty to divide his responsibilities among his subordinates, that there is no means of independent action in his organization. This is especially true of Kiwanis on account of the fact that, as an organization, it has no money. The leader in his club must be able to divide the responsibility to render a full service of duty.

How can the club leader best accomplish the duty?

To answer to this question I have noted some of the important duties which to me are indispensable.

Leadership is inseparably bound with the spirit of Kiwanis purposes. The leader must understand and understand the principles to which his organization is devoted, cannot intelligently lead unless he is a member of the whole organization and details of the organization. This is in no way a selfish business. It is his duty to know his full duty unless he can give the best of his service.

It must be his duty to know his own organization is never healthy, until a man in every body's business is nobody's business. If he expects there to be for their part he must do his part.

He should subdivide the responsibility as he does by understanding it, he must never permit his hand to lose the pulse or to interfere with his control.

He should be the kind of leader who does not command, "Don't do that" and says, "Come on boys, let's do that." His attitude toward international and in the district should be one of subservience for the accomplishment of the general goal of the organization.

The purpose of Kiwanis is such that the general goal always means the individual goal. The wealth of Kiwanis experience and accomplishment is accumulated as an international organization and he must be a willing instrument to the general goal. The only way to achieve the general goal is to be able to see the value in watching the activities of his club. No club should become side-tracked and it is his duty to see that it does not.

He should realize fully the importance of human values in the building of Kiwanis character, and should never cease to emphasize these values. These are the foundations upon which Kiwanis is built.

James H. Hays once said, "Leadership is not so much a matter of education as of character." He must be a man of character able to command confidence and respect.

When it ceases to be interested in the public welfare it will cease to have a purpose which will draw men together and keep them together. Social benefits in themselves are not sufficient, as is a social inclination and social relations, more or less, constantly.

The realistic and assumption of a definite responsibility brings with it a special pride of accomplishment. When that responsibility is proved and assumed, by many with

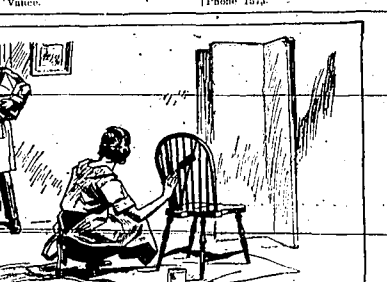

the same fixed determination, a co-operation which will insure success. Nothing else is quite an unbroken.

A significant thing in Kiwanis life is that men engaged as competitors in the same business are brought shoulder to shoulder. These men have forgotten their basic selfish interests. 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RE-ENACTING HISTORY

Calvin Coolidge and Frederick H. Gillett do not furnish the only instance of a president and a speaker of the house of representatives both from Massachusetts and holding office simultaneously. In 1799 Theodore Sedgwick of Sheffield, who was instrumental in putting down Shay's rebellion, was elected speaker of the house during the presidency of John Adams. And, according to tradition, when John Adams got up early on the morning of March 4, 1801, to take the stage coach from Washington to New York, so as not to see the government degraded by the accession of Thomas Jefferson, the hated demagogue, Theodore Sedgwick came along with him to set off the tainted atmosphere.

In these days Massachusetts represented a larger portion of the total area and population of the country than today. If the possession of the presidency and the speakership at the same time excited the envy of other states it drew not figure largely in the record. But the dignified departure of Adams and Sedgwick suggests an historical precedent which might dignify President Coolidge if he were disposed to let awake nights borrowing trouble.

As John Adams was defeated by Jefferson in 1800 so his son John Quincy Adams, was defeated by Andrew Jackson in 1828. Thus our two Massachusetts presidents of the past each served only one term and each was succeeded by a democratic president who became one of the chief historical figures of that party. This might not seem the best of fortunes for President Coolidge, but it takes a somewhat optimistic democrat to contend that there is a potential Jefferson or Jackson among the candidates for the next democratic nomination.

This name Theodore Sedgwick, so his biography reads, was separated from Yale college by decision of the faculty for a "slight misdemeanor" while an undergraduate. That was about 150 years ago; but every now and then at Yale and other colleges some youthful scapegraw, who failed to get his sheepskin at commencement time, has since made himself an historical annoyance to the college authorities by becoming famous as a statesman, lawyer or poet. Instead of conventionally disappearing from the world of successful accomplishment these men leave an example, dangerous or helpful, according to the point of view, that success of a later day may succeed as well.

"BOOZE"

Many men believe we ought to have light wine and beer. Many more believe we should not. Thousands of the best minds in the country are arguing this pro and con.

"No lawmaker can interfere with my personal privileges." Maybe not—maybe so. It depends on what you consider your personal privilege.

"Every man's house is his castle and no officer has the right of entry and seizure." Still a dog lover's canine friend and keep him in your house and you will see.

"The country has no right to deprive me of a harmless personal pleasure because some other man abuses that pleasure and injures himself." Well, if it was your pleasure to stand, burn down houses or commit murder, would the argument hold?

The best citizens in any community are not law-breakers. It is the Kiwian idea that the minority should submit to the will of the majority; that the minority should help the majority carry out decision made for what it considers the best interests of all.

The veteran wheeze of the lawyer who told his client, "They can't put you in jail for that," to which he replied, "I am here, ain't I?" applies here.

The United States and, with modifications, Canada, have anti-liquor laws, passed by the majority. They are as much a part of the law as "Thou shalt not kill."

True Kiwians obey the law, regardless of whether they sympathize with it or not.

A "K" button on the lapel of a man's coat should be a guarantee like the "sterling" mark on silver. It should stamp a leading citizen—a man to emulate and follow. If leading citizens are law-breakers, others will not obey the law. If the reform of the community will obey prohibition laws, we can never hope to have the skimmed milk portion of humanity obey other laws.

If members of Kiwanis are really leading citizens, they will remember that they are models in the community and must obey the laws. "Leading citizens" do not attempt to break down our social fabric.

All of which leads up to the fact that the Kiwian who carries "chick-liquor" to a Kiwian function of any kind is in absolute opposition to the spirit of Kiwanis. Both society in general and his fellow Kiwians in particular suffer from his indiscretion.

Liquor has no place in a Kiwian luncheon, a Kiwian social function, a Kiwian picnic or outing, a district or national convention.

FLYING FLIVVER IS NOW ASSURED

New Invention Is Expected to Put Plane Within Reach of Every Family.

The "flying flivver" has literally and suddenly come into the sky. Although the pioneer and inventor, aeronautic experts believe that flying flivvers soon will become as plentiful, relatively, as their man-made, the new invention is believed to have been tested before it reached upon a Jersey tree in an attempt that from New York.

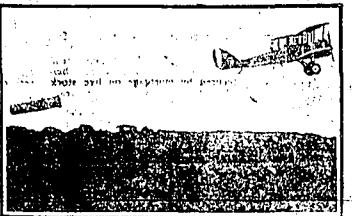

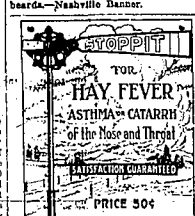

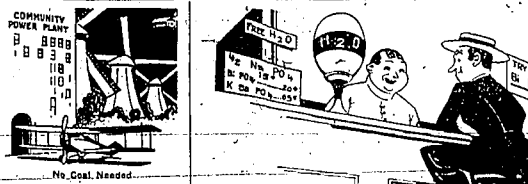

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AGRICULTURAL CREDITS ACT

RE-ENACTING HISTORY

Calvin Coolidge and Frederick H. Gillett do not furnish the only instance of a president and a speaker of the house of representatives both from Massachusetts and holding office simultaneously. In 1799 Theodore Sedgwick of Sheffield, who was instrumental in putting down Shays' rebellion, was elected speaker of the house during the presidency of John Adams. And, according to tradition, when John Adams got up early on the morning of March 4, 1801, to take the stage coach from Washington to New York, so as not to see the government degraded by the accession of Thomas Jefferson, the hated democrat, Theodore Sedgwick came along with him to get out of that tainted atmosphere.

In those days Massachusetts represented a larger portion of the total area and population of the country than today. If the possession of the presidency and the speakership at the same time excited the envy of other states it does not figure largely in the record. But the disgusted departure of Adams and Sedgwick suggests an historical precedent which might distress President Coolidge if he were disposed to be awake nights harrassing trouble.

An John Adams was defeated by Jefferson in 1800 so his son John Quincy Adams was defeated by Andrew Jackson in 1828. This pair of Massachusetts presidents of the past each served only one term and each was succeeded by a democratic president who became one of the chief historical figures of that party. This might not seem the best of auguries for President Coolidge, but it takes a somewhat optimistic democrat to contend that there is a potential Jefferson or Jackson among the candidates for the next democratic nomination.

This same Theodore Sedgwick, so his biography reads, was separated from Yale college by decision of the faculty for a "slight misdemeanor" while an undergraduate. That was about 150 years ago; but every now and then at Yale and other colleges some youthful scapegraves, who failed to get his sleepshin at commencement time, has since made himself an historical annoyance to the college authorities by becoming famous as a statesman, lawyer or poet. Instead of conveniently disappearing from the world of successful accomplishment these men leave an example, dangerous or hopeful, according to the point of view, that scapegraves of a later day may succeed as well.

"BOOZE"

The United States and, with modifications, Canada, have anti-liquor laws, passed by the majority. They are as much a part of the law as "Thou shalt not kill."

A "K" button on the lapel of a man's coat should be a guarantee that the "sterling" mark on silver. It should stamp a leading citizen—a man to emulate and follow. If leading citizens are lawbreakers, others will not obey the law. All of which leads up to the fact that the Kiwanis who carry "hip-liquor" to a Kiwanis function of any kind is in absolute opposition to the spirit of Kiwanis. Both society in general and his fellow Kiwanis in particular suffer from his indiscretion.

Liquor has no place in a Kiwanis luncheon, a Kiwanis social function, a Kiwanis picnic or outing, a district or national convention.

FLYING FLIVVER IS NOW ASSURED

New Invention Is Expected to Put Plane Within Reach of Every Family.

The "flying flivver" has literally and suddenly come into the sky. Although the pioneer was wrecked, aeronautics experts believe that the flying flivver soon will become as plentiful, relatively, as their automobiles. The new experiment in human flight proved itself before it crashed upon a Jersey tree in an attempted flight from New York to Washington.

The mechanics of the Dowsitt-Dewitt crew between a glider and a regular airplane is nothing in the respect of weight, size, fuel requirements, stability, speed and probable construction cost. Earl Dewitt is quoted as having said that the machine can and will be manufactured in quantity at a retail price of \$500. Georges Harlot, the pilot, has said that the craft would cover 120 miles on a gallon of gasoline. But in respect to practical usefulness, as a means of aerial transportation of persons or goods, the flying flivver shows no promise of living up to the flying reputation, in the opinion of aviation experts.

The Dowsitt-Dewitt machine is different from a motorless glider chiefly in that it has a motor. To withstand the vibration of the engine, the wing arcs, fuselage and sections and the body had to be constructed more strongly than in the case of a glider. This meant additional weight, and together with the weight of the motor itself—said to be only four pounds—made the whole craft considerably heavier than a glider. The total "tonnage" of the flying flivver was about 400 pounds, with-out the pilot, which is double the average weight of motorless gliders. And successful mail-carrying gliders have been made weighing even less than that.

The Dowsitt-Dewitt craft is different from a regular airplane mainly in that the motor is of much lower horsepower than the motor of an airplane. It is smaller and lighter. The motor mounted in the flying flivver is a two-cylinder Dowsitt-Dewitt twelve horsepower model. It carries small airplanes carrying 100 horsepower motors, on the average; though constant improvement in the motor power of this design are gradually reducing the horsepower requisite in proportion to the weight of machines. The Dowsitt-Dewitt motor, however, is a 60-horsepower engine. This plane is one of the smallest in the country.

In point of size the Dowsitt-Dewitt invention measures 40 feet from wing tip to tip and 15 feet over all height. The craft is a monoplane, and even with the 40-foot spread its wing area is less than the average airplane. It is just about equal, however, to the total wing surface of many small types of comparatively high speed one-seater planes, which have more powerful motors, weigh much more, but can sustain their weight with the small wings by virtue of their airfoils.

Extends Power of Gliders. The power equipment of the flying flivver, small though it be, is enough to do away with the limitations peculiar to motorless gliders. Its additional weight, however, is not too great to prevent motorless gliding. The craft cannot start flight from level ground. Ordinary glider flights are begun from hilltops by pulling the craft down a hill until they pick up flying speed, and take off from the slope. With the flying flivver, however, it is possible to take off from level ground. The aerodynamic impossibility of making a motorless winged craft climb up in the sky is possible because of the law of equal and opposite momenta of the air. The fact that air currents do move upward and downward as well, is often overlooked because such currents are rarely associated with the surface, and move in areas above where the surface is flat and smooth. Obviously, a downward current is felt when it strikes the earth, and subsides out in a sort of rolling wind movement. It is plain, too, that an upward current cannot originate just at the earth's flat surface, because it would cause a vacuum there.

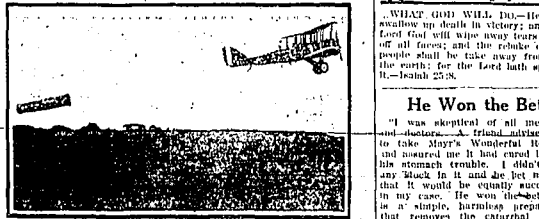
The currents by virtue of which gliders can keep their altitude or even climb, are not called winds, usually defined as horizontal natural movements of air. They are sometimes technically known as "winds with vertical component." Soaring birds, gliders and balloons use the same principle. It is, in fact, the upward movement of air, by means of which the bird or glider or balloon rises. Palestine excavations carried out at Heisan, the Bekdashan of the Old Testament, have resulted in the discovery of substantial Egyptian buildings with evidence of five centuries' occupation, and two large, clear monumental inscriptions of Seti I and Ramesses II, respectively, according to a dispatch from Jerusalem.

"The inscriptions indicate military dispositions of known Egyptian garrisons, and give references to neighboring cities on both sides of the Jordan. Bekdashan is a small town near the Jordan; 65 miles north-northwest of Jerusalem; Seti I was king of Egypt of the nineteenth dynasty, about 1366 B.C. He was the father of Ramesses II.

INCREASING USE OF STUCCO

As a Building Material It is Finding Application Among Architects and Builders.

Not only do architectural critics consider stucco as one of the most attractive finishes to be obtained for exterior walls of modern buildings but the general public as well has placed its approval upon this method of architectural finishing and beautifying.

Stucco is a masonry product which not only is pleasing in appearance but has permanency as well. Properly applied it will resist action in the foundation of a home. It is said to be impervious to the weather. It is understood to resist the nature of the weather and destroy some other forms of finish. Stucco forms a protection to the structure to which it is applied, it protects and perpetuates itself as well.

Attractiveness possible in the variety of its use and design is a feature. It is used for the exterior of houses or other buildings can be built with this type of finish and no two buildings need be alike. The difference in color is obtained through the use of small pebbles, crushed rock, flaked shells and other materials capable of resisting constant exposure to the weather, and varying so greatly in texture and color that unlimited combinations can be obtained, giving to each building a distinctly different effect from the one adjacent. These surfaces are never polished and are said to be built for the restoring for old structures, resulting not only in making them look new, but making cooler homes in the summer and warmer homes in the winter.

MUST NOT OVERLOOK VINES

Have Strong Useful Possess as Well as Generally Recognized Ornamental Effect.

Vines are among the most useful plants for "tying" buildings to their surroundings. There is a freedom and grace about their growth that helps to relieve the formality of buildings or fences better than almost any other method of decoration. The selection is necessary, however, as there are disadvantages in the use of some vines under certain conditions. On brick and concrete buildings some vines are not so appropriate. The impression that such vines are injurious to the walls should be removed. They exist in some quarters is erroneous, the United States Department of Agriculture believes.

The great problem is so to train the vines that they may be removed to permit proper painting of the wood-work when this becomes necessary. This may be done by means of a trellis banded near the ground or a chicken wire placed over looks at the highest point of the vines removed. A trellis can be made of chicken wire on a pipe frame that will keep vines entirely away from woodwork.

The question is not to train the vines but if they are permitted to become rampant and grow over the building, they will "smother" the structure and eventually destroy it.

Sunday School Lesson

LESSON FOR AUGUST 25

DARNAHAB, THE GREAT HEARTED

LESSON TEXT-Acts 11:14-18; 11:19-20. GOLDEN TEXT-"He was a good man and full of the Holy Ghost and of wisdom."-Acts 11:14.

PRIMARILY TOPIC-Darnahab and Paul's Trial about Jesus. SECONDARILY TOPIC-Darnahab and Her Conversion. TERTIARILY TOPIC-How Darnahab Became a Christian Character Illustrated by Darnahab.

Darnahab, the Man (Acts 1:30). The original name was Joseph. When he became a Christian, he was renamed Darnahab signifying the change from the old life to the new. This was a common custom, for example, Simon to Peter and Saul to Paul. The name means "a consolation." This shows not only the nature and spirit of Darnahab but also the nature of the gift of the Holy Spirit. The exercise of this gift made him a son of consolation.

II. Darnahab, the Philanthropist (Acts 11:19-20). So fully had the divine love permeated the very being of Darnahab that seeing the need of his fellow men, he sold his property and brought the money and laid it at the apostles' feet. His generosity expressed itself in deeds, not in words and promises. He counted nothing his own while his brethren were in need. He gave to the poor and to the needy. There was no such thing in the early church as a building fund of a community of goods. The ownership of property was recognized, Acts 4:34.

III. Darnahab, the Christian Statesman (Acts 11:19-20). The violent persecutions of the church scattered the disciples. As they went they preached the Gospel and churches were established. The most conspicuous of these was at Antioch, the capital of Syria, because it became the most important center in the spread of the Gospel. The message went well as long as the Gospel message was preached to the Jews only. The idea held in the minds of the Jews at that time was that the Gentiles were excluded. But at Antioch certain of these disciples deliberately preached Christ to the Gentiles. The seal of the Lord was upon this ministry and great multitudes believed and turned to the Lord.

This revolutionary preaching reached the ears of the church at Jerusalem and caused not a little excitement and discussion. The church decided to send a committee to Antioch to look into the matter.

1. Darnahab Sent to Antioch (vs. 22). Fortunately in this case they sent the proper man. Darnahab was a good man and full of the Holy Spirit and of wisdom. He had a spiritual discernment and broad sympathy. Good men are quick to see God. When he came to Antioch he saw the grace of God in the Gentiles.
