

MEASURES TO TAKE TO PREVENT CHAOS TAKEN

District Attorney Moves to Prevent Repetition of Recent Disturbance in which Klansman Is Mysteriously Slain.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 27.—District Attorney Samuel N. Gardner moved today to prevent further disturbances like the riot in Carnegie hall Saturday night which resulted in the shooting to death of Thomas H. Abbott of Pittsburgh, Washington county, a Klansman.

Gardner conferred with chiefs of the Klan here and officials of Carnegie is an effort to learn what caused the mob of citizens who gathered to attack the klansmen with clubs and revolvers.

Chief Burgess Conley declared the mob attacked the klansmen when the latter insisted on holding a parade, without a permit.

Scores of arrests were made but the klansmen were released on a small fine on a charge of carrying revolvers. One man, Patrick Nicholson, an undertaker of Carnegie, who was seen by eye-witnesses holding a revolver at the time Abbott fell, police say, was held in jail.

Dr. W. H. K. Evans, imperial wizard of the Klan, who intended the initiation of a band of candidates on the Forsythe park grounds the following afternoon, was prevented by the police and conviction of Abbott's slaying.

Sam D. Rich, King Kleagle of the Klans, announced a similar request. Twenty thousand Klansmen had gathered at the Forsythe farm here Tuesday night, August 27, for the initiation. A number of the klansmen came into the borough limits and caused the crowd to disperse. Unpleasantness followed but it was not until the crowd of klansmen decided to hold a parade against the express order of the officials of the town that the riot started.

The mob's attack "Carriage" citizens' headquarters, clubs and drew men from the crowd and warned them not to cross into the town. The marchers were ordered to disperse.

An automobile leading the parade was wrecked on the Carnegie hill. The mob chased and arrested of "John Jones" and "John Smith" filled the air. The battle lasted for an hour over an area covering four Carnegie hill. The battle was finally arrived with shot guns and clubs and restored order.

Over three hundred pieces of fire arms from cheap pistols to shot guns were found in the streets when the mob was finally dispersed.

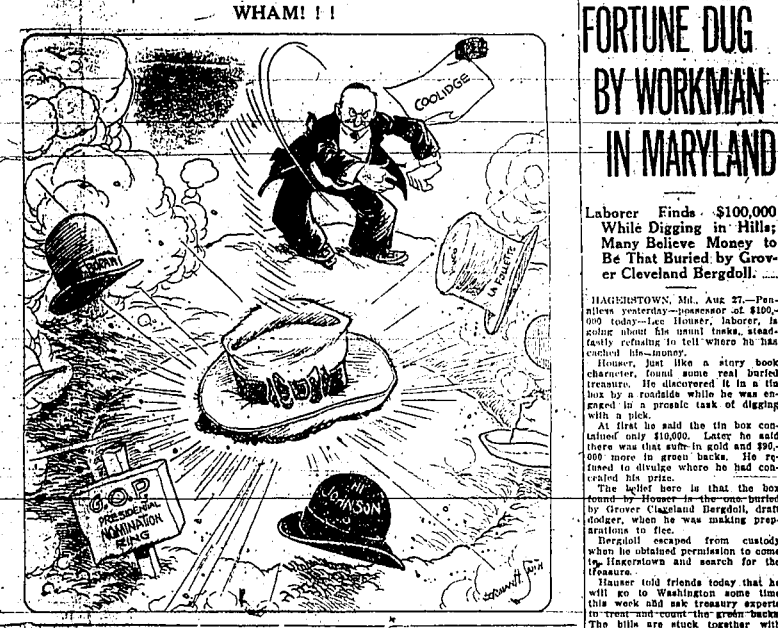

McGraw's fighting Reds, out of the race just a week or so ago, are back in again as strong as ever. The Cincinnati club has not yet broken a winning streak that has run to eight straight games and it is just three and a half games back of the league leaders.

With a great trip through the east in which they won ten out of 15 games the Pirates are one game back of the Reds and four and a half games behind the Giants.

Both the Pirates and the Reds are playing better baseball than the Giants and it is a credit to the great team of John McGraw that the Giants' champions have been able to retain the lead with all their setbacks.

Only the stoutest of fighting hearts has enabled the Giants to remain in front. Their defeat of the Cubs yesterday is typical of the team that is keeping them in the lead. The Giants went into the last half of the ninth, needing three runs to win the game and the Altridges was going like a million.

Jimmy O'Connell hit a homer. There were two down and McGraw slapped one at Barney Pflieger. He ran it out at his best although it looked like a check that was moving so fast that he went to third when Pflieger threw the ball at McGraw and Jack Bonny was a pinch hitter and he knocked a home run, winning the game.

New York was in a peculiar position. The Giants figuring that the schedule will help them over the hill, continued to play and the Reds will meet in eight games and one of the contenders is very likely to be killed off. It is just as likely to be the Reds as the Pirates.

In the American league the Yankees are just moving along, winning and losing. With all that, they are the most in the lead and there is little to worry them.

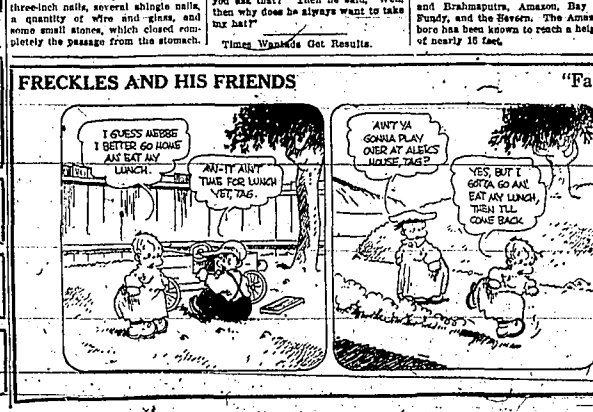
