CORN AND HOGS

The Iowa and Nebraska farmers, with the exception of those who raise wheat exclusively, will be richly rewarded for their labors this year. Corn is selling at nearly 90 cents a bushel, steers at around \$12, and hogs at \$9. The farmers of other corn and hog states are also in the swing. Iowa is the champion corn-growing state of the Union, and Nebraska is well up in the list. The farmers of these two states also raise hundreds of thousands of hogs and fatten great numbers of range cattle for market. South Dakota and the rich red commonwealth of Missouri are also in the corn and hog business. Illinois and Indiana farmers market products of the same kind. Under such circumstances why should Senator Brookhart rage and the farm bloc imagine vain things!

According to the latest estimates, the average working family spends 44.1 per cent of its budget for food, 17.7 for shelter, 13.2 for clothing, 5.6 for fuel and light, and 20.4 for supplies. The most expensive item in the working family's budget, food, costs the farmer very little. It is probably true that the farmers who grow wheat exclusively are coming out at the end of the horn this year. They deserve such aid as can be extended without adding to the burdens of the other classes. There is no warrant, however, for the demagogic utterances of the politicians who are going up and down the land crying "Bread and Desolation." The corn crop will amount to about three billion bushels this year.

NON-ADVERTISERS 84 PER CENT OF FAILURES

Eighty-four per cent of the firms that failed in a recent year of depression were companies that did not advertise. Floyd W. Parsons pointed out recently to public utility men: "Emphasizing that utility companies cannot depend upon free space for their publicity, but must use scientific presentations of facts in paid advertisements," Mr. Parsons said:

"An ill-informed and mistaken mass opinion on the part of

our citizens can destroy a business no less surely and speedily than bad management; and there is no force except contiguous scientific advertising that can be employed to protect an investment largely depending upon community good-will and subject to legalistic control. Campaign of public education conducted by advertising agents and based on the use of free space can never be made to serve the utility company any more effectively than they can the concern that sells shirts or shoes. There is about the same relation between free advertising with haphazard propaganda and a paid campaign of scientific presentation of fact, as there is between ham and Hamlet."

"And as to what advertising can do for the utilities, it is safe to say that the opportunities are without limit. It is necessary first of all to accept the fact that the utility industry is an advertiserable business. However, it is not a form of enterprise where accounts will fall into your lap without your going after them. The executives of the utility corporations must be told that in a recent year of depression, 84 per cent of the firms that failed were companies that did not advertise; they must be shown that it is just as foolish and costly to employ inexperienced publicity counsellors and copywriters as to hire incompetent accountants or chemists; that advertising will increase volume and thereby lower costs; and that it must be continuous, if it is to be fruitful."
