

THE LEAGUE POINTS WORLD WAR

Break With Italy Is Narrowly Averted This Morning by the League of Nations; Second World War Was Freely Predicted in Washington and in European Countries. Italy Files Huge Claim.

GENEVA, Sept. 6.—The league of nations council, avoided a break with Italy late today. After deciding at a previous session to reaffirm the council's competency to adjudicate the Greco-Italian dispute, the only action the council took at a public meeting later was to recommend that the council of ambassadors at Paris find a basis for settlement of Italy's demand for reparations for the death of her commissioners at Janina.

Second War Was Foreseen

The following story came early this morning and a second world war was flash by many news columns. The peace of the Balkans, with the alternative of another general war which may involve all nations, is in the balance today as the council of the league of nations deliberates. The council decides to ignore Italy's claims and adjudicate the case of Greece against the claims of Italy. The council will also consider the request for mediation, statement of the leading nations declare the following items will be nullified.

- 1-The whole structure of the league will be undermined and the society of nations will collapse.
2-Four treaties which ended the world war will be impugned for their clauses which bind their signatories are similar to those of the covenant of the league.
3-Decision of the league by which several smaller nations are abiding against their will will be nullified.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—New antagonistic moves on the part of Italy against Greece has heightened pessimism here. Italian marines occupied three islands in the vicinity of Corfu. Italy filed with Greece a claim for \$100,000,000. The first cost of the expedition was a punitive measure for the slaying of the Italian commissioners.

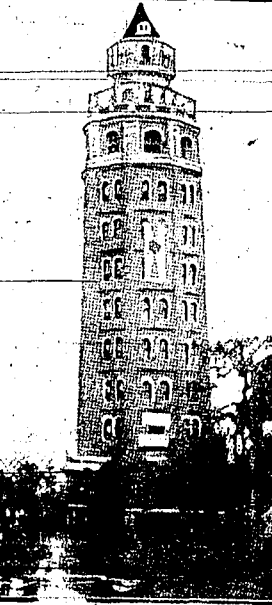
POWDER WORKS EXPLODES; ONE MAN IS KILLED

MARTINEZ, Calif., Sept. 6.—One man was killed and six injured and the nitroglycerine warehouse of the Hercules Powder Company, situated at Martinez, Cal., exploded at 11:45 a. m. today. MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 6.—James W. Willett, commander in chief of the G. A. R. today made an address before the annual convocation here. He urged congress to authorize a \$12 monthly pension for the widows of veterans and \$100 monthly for their widows. He also proposed the increase in pension in a resolution in which the compensation, attended by ten thousand men of the G. A. R., is expected to adopt. Twenty thousand civil war veterans died this year, Willett announced. The annual convocation year will be elected today.

CHICAGO, Sept. 6.—A movement for new wage increases on all class one railroads. This was announced today by David Robinson, president of the brotherhood of railway firemen and engineers, declared today. The general chairman of the organization went into executive session today to decide whether or to launch the movement at this time. "Our general chairman will vote on the question and if they are favorable to wage advances we will organize plans to secure them," Robinson said.

BORAH CHIDES JAPAN; CITES KOREAN CRIME

Idaho's Senior Senator Files Japan but Nevada's Opposes. BORAH, Ore., Sept. 6.—"I pity Japan in her tribulation and sorrow but I can't help but remember the Japanese massacre in Korea in 1910," said Senator William E. Borah, speaking here last night at the fourth Idaho-Oregon conference of the Methodist Episcopal church. "Then Japan stole Korea's independence and now she is murdering her own people," Borah said. "I wonder if it is not written above the heavens of Japan's 'Korea' and their unbecoming 'Vengeance is mine, saith the Lord.'" Senator Borah upheld his stand for Russian recognition, saying that the present economic crisis is the only form of government which can hold the Russian people.

UNION COAL MINERS GIVE ULTIMATUM NEXT MONDAY

Operators State That No More Than a Ten Per Cent Wage Increase Will Be Granted and the Union Check Off System Cannot Be Granted; Disputed Points Must Be Left to Arbitration.

HAHRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 6.—Union and operator delegates who conferred privately with Governor Blitch in an effort to settle the anthracite strike, now in its sixth day, have submitted their "ultimate concessions."

This was the announced position of both parties today as they re-assembled in the capitol for a final attempt to reach a settlement. "Final" signifies "no progress has been made" and it will build confidence of success. "The final word of the operators is that they intend to accept a wage increase of no more than a five per cent wage increase, the subject of the union no longer than 1925; the union check-off cannot be granted; arbitration points—no check-off arbitration. The final word of the miners is that they intend to receive assurances in dollars and cents of how much of an increase they are to receive."

MANY AMERICANS ARE NOW MISSING IN JAPAN

Total of Over Seventy Americans Are Already Known Among the Dead in Japan Earthquake and Fire Area; Tokio Dead Now Estimated at 30,000 and 100,000 Injured; Total Number of Dead in Japan Is Now Estimated at 40,000.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—Americans and other foreign casualties in Yokohama now total about seventy, the state department was advised today by American Consul Davis at Shanghai.

Davis reported that in Tokio there have been no foreign casualties, according to his information. At Hakone, mountain resort near Tokio, there were three foreign casualties, according to Davis' information. The names of the Americans and other foreigners killed and injured have not yet been verified, he said.

Secretary of State Hughes upon his return to Washington today issued a statement declaring the United States is "expressly shocked" at the Japanese disaster. He praised Japan and said that "the historic friendship of the two peoples was cemented at the Washington conference."

## IDAHO SHOULD COMPLETE NORTH-SOUTH ROAD

It is unfortunate indeed that Idaho has been unable to complete the north and south highway, a link in transportation that will do more to promote unity in this state than any one thing else. This highway will bind together the north and the south as few accomplishments have done. It will furnish an avenue of travel between two extremes and thus bring about closer communication.

We have an east and west road across this state of which every Idahoan is proud. It has done much toward making travel from one section to the other possible. It is highly spoken of from a highway standpoint and from the standpoint of standard construction. It is just as important that we have a north and south road in as good condition. The state should put forth every possible effort to finish the uncompleted sections of the north and south highway.

Idaho cannot afford to be small from a road construction standpoint, nor should Idaho permit itself to trail behind other states in the matter of good building. Each year is witnessing a greater demand for better roads and the states that are building these roads are the states that are growing.

The Capital News heartily indorses the sentiment expressed in these resolutions passed by the various chambers of commerce and commercial clubs in this state urging the state to complete the north and south highway without delay, in fact to make an extra ordinary effort to do so:

"Whereas, the north and south state highway is one of the first highway projects approved, and authorized by the state of Idaho, and is of first importance to the people of Idaho in the development of that spirit of unity and patriotic loyalty which should exist in every commonwealth; and

"Whereas, a large sum, aggregating four million dollars or more, has been expended by the state and national governments in co-operation with counties and local committees, upon the said highway; and

"Whereas, the benefits which should be realized from the use of the highway, are made unavailable, and the purpose of the investment practically defeated by reason of a few uncompleted sections in the Salmon River canyon, viz. south from Biggins, 11 miles; between completed points, 9 miles, total 23 miles. The further expenditure of a relatively small sum would open the highway to through travel, and traffic, making possible that intercourse, and exchange of commodities, which would result in added prosperity, and prompt better feeling within the state. Also removing the barriers which now exist between the people of the north and their state capital, therefore be it.


"Resolved, that further delay in the completion of the highway through the Salmon River canyon would be unwise, unexpedient and unjust, and we hereby recommend, and urge the early completion of the same, and the much needed surfacing of that portion of the constructed highway lying between the summit of the Whitebird grade, and the town of Whitebird. When the harvest and threshing season is over, laborers will be more plentiful, and as the climate of the Salmon River canyon is well adapted to fall and winter operations, we recommend that contractors be let before that time."—Capital News.

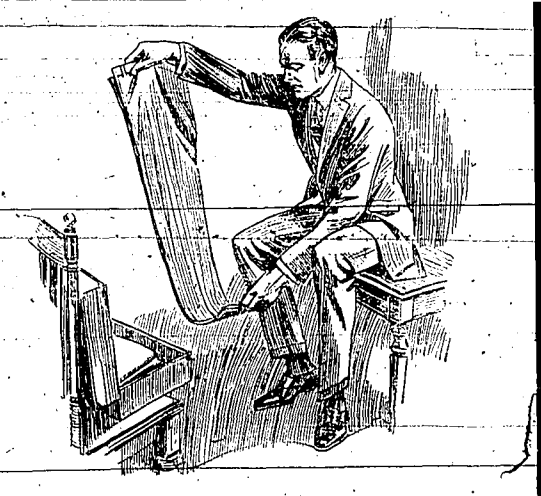

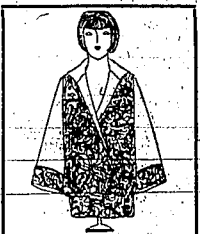

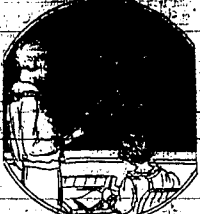
