OUR TRADE WITH JAPAN

Has shown enormous gains in recent years. Big increase in the percentage which we hold in the trade of Japan.

Trade of the United States with Japan totalled 385 million dollars in the fiscal year 1923 against 197 million dollars in 1913, 165 million in 1921 and 20 million in 1922. The trade with our neighbor across the Pacific has far outstripped that with other parts of the world as evidenced by the fact that the 1923 trade with Japan is 19 times as much as in 1913, 8 years earlier, while our total foreign trade in 1923 was only 5 times as much as in 1913.

It was about the year 1913, says the Trade Record of the National City Bank of New York, that our export trade to Japan began to show a remarkable growth. Our total exports to that country in 1913 were but \$18,949, jumping to 21 million dollars in 1915, \$75 million in 1917 and \$277 million in 1923. All of these figures are based on the reports from Japan.

OUR TRADE WITH JAPAN
also show big gains, but not as large proportion as that of the exports, the total imports from that country having advanced from \$2,450,000 in 1913 to \$42 million dollars in 1923, 16 million in 1915 and 37 million in 1922. The 1923 total is, in both imports and exports, about four times as much as in 1913.

Japan's own trade figures show not only large gains in her trade with United States, but that the percentage of her trade which she draws from and sends to this country has steadily increased. In 1913, the year before the war, her exports from the United States formed 17 per cent of her total imports and in 1922 they were 31 per cent of her imports. In 1913 her shipments to United States formed 29 per cent of her total exports and in 1922 over 40 per cent.

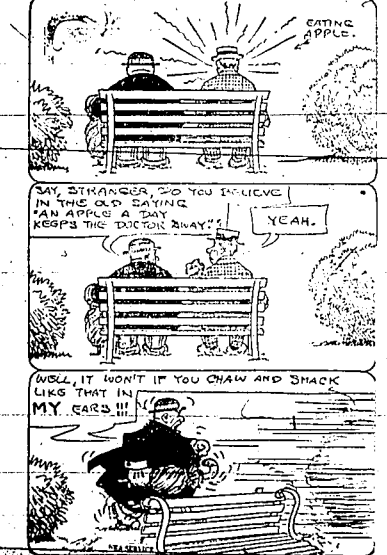
SALES TAX NOW IN EFFECT

JUNGLE HIDES ANCIENT CITY

Place in Ceylon Was Founded 437 B. C., and Covered Area of Sixteen Square Miles.

Reason of the buried cities of Ceylon, the most fully excavated to date is Anuradhapura. Not that excavation can be said to be at all complete, but at the present stage startling facts are revealed.

Here, says a writer in the Christian Science Monitor, was an ancient city, a contemporary of Rome, which for extent quite dwarfed the "rose-colored Rome" was built on seven small hills—Anuradhapura's splendid summer cover are spread at least sixteen miles square.

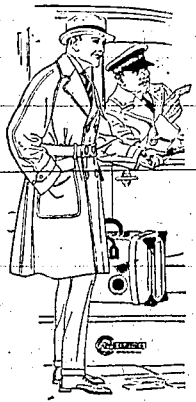

DELANO IS READY FOR RAILROAD

Big Mining Company Rushing Work in Order to Have Plenty of Ore Ready by June When It Is Expected to Ship Out Over New Line.

That everybody is busy in Delano is an extensive scene in anticipation of the railroad which is under construction. It is confidently predicted that ore will be shipped by rail on the copper center by next June, and that the result of activities there, with the consequent market furnished for this part of the country and the opening of the line to the west will make Twin Falls a city of from 40,000 to 50,000 people within five years, with population made today by Frank K. Foster of the firm of F. K. Foster & Co., Seattle, who is also assistant secretary of the Nevada Bellview-Copper company. Mr. Foster was in this city with Vice President Campbell of the copper company in his way back to Seattle, after looking over the contact property, the main DeLano.

Mr. Foster said that the company was beginning work on the 200-foot level, and would extend the 200-foot level operations westward. There is also operation at the 100-foot level in what is known as the Ducks trail, where paying ore in large quantities is mined. He stated that the 400 tunnel prove as successful as anticipated, the capacity of the DeLano would be doubled.

"We expect to be shipping out ore in large quantities by June, over the new road," he said, "as we are convinced that it will be in contact by that time. I have been in Coeur d'Alene and Elko during the past few days and have not heard the slightest word about the construction of the road anywhere except from a few hill-billy who mean to raise a question. I am inclined to think that there will be a little construction left this fall, but not much, and spring, as the company would not put heavy machinery out during the winter months. We are getting on with the plant in shape and are confident that it will give the best results."

"General Manager W. H. Harrison will move in at once. He is moving his family here, from San Francisco and will be on the job shortly."

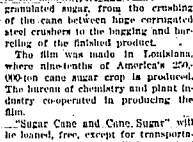
