## STAMPS TO BE PRECANCELED

Device When in Use Will Be a Great Saving on Everything but First-Class Mail.

Another time and labor saving device for use in expediting the mails has passed the experimental stage and is being ready for general distribution. The device will pre-cancel stamps put in colls for use on other first-class mail by large mailers before the stamps have been affixed, and will recall them in the original sized coll, says Scientific American. Hereafter, large users of such mail have purchased uncanceled stamps in colls, which were then placed in the colls by a stamp affixing machine already in general use, necessitating the running of such mail through the canceling machines at the post office.

With the new device in operation, however, the stamps would be purchased already canceled. The mail with the canceled stamps affixed would then be sorted and tied in bundles by the meter according to destinations and sent to the post office, where it would go to the train, leaving the canceling machines at the post office the job of the canceled stamps. The new device is called a pre-canceling machine. Various types have been developed by a number of manufacturers and it will find the department believes warrants giving them a tryout.

# LEGION DRIVE IS EXPLAINED BY MANY LEADERS

Public Given Reasons for Work of the Organization in Seeking Relief Fund; Union Are in Line.

Officers of the local American Legion post are called upon almost daily to do some sort of relief work and the fund for doing so is entirely exhausted they said, when interviewed relative to the present drive for a post welfare fund. They stated also that the question, especially since the present drive began, was frequently raised as to the purpose and need of such a fund in this city.

Legion Post Forth.  
 With the citation of specific instances of dire need among former servicemen, both in Twin Falls and vicinity, the local legionnaires endeavor to explain matters of relief fund to those who are less acquainted with the real facts back of the drive. Because of the difficulty of obtaining the relief of which legion men are entitled, instances of actual suffering are shown. In some cases government relief paper has made it impossible to obtain adequate assistance to entirely deserving veterans, they say.

It is for these deserving "huddlers" that the legion post proposed to take steps and lend a hand in the matter of assistance.  
 Congressman Smith Talks.  
 In a speech made recently before members of the local post, Com-

missioner Addison T. Smith, said there is a large number of local servicemen, during his summer vacation in Twin Falls, had responded to their claims adjusted. The majority of these men have just claims—many of them are suffering bodily—others with one foot in the grave—many with dependent, worthy of attention, said the congressman, but who are unable, in one way or another, to obtain relief from the government. Congress set aside a fund to help these men, why aren't they getting it. That tape is the only thing in it to be prepared for the way it is aiding the government to clear this up, he said.

State Adjutant Albers Quoted.  
 At the late district convention held in Rupert last week State Adjutant Albers went on record as in favor of a more extended plan of aiding the deserving former servicemen. During a period of 18 months he reported 430 claims adjusted. He said the government had endeavored to do soldier relief work but without success. He showed the efficient work of posts throughout the country in stating that over a million ex-soldiers were plan of aiding them within 20 days after the legion took over the work from the government.

Rotary Club Responds.  
 At its weekly luncheon Wednesday the Rotary club went down in favor of the American Legion relief fund drive. Extensive preparations are under way to assist the boys during their final drive.

Kivanlais Fall In.  
 President Frank Stephen of the Kivanlais club, when seen recently, stated that although it was a matter for the club to determine, there was little question as to the attitude they would take. They have accepted a challenge from the Rotarians to play ball, the entire proceeds to go to the welfare fund.
