

REGALTY OF OKLA. VOTING TO BE TESTED

Anti-Walton Element in Victory in Stinging Oklahoma Election; Gorman Walton Blames Klan For Result of Balloting.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 3.—A long drawn out court fight was projected today testing the legality of Tuesday's election in Oklahoma at which an inflated amendment to the constitution providing that the legislature might convene itself without a call from the governor, was adopted overwhelmingly.

Governor J. C. Walton, who opposed the election with all the power at his command, today, concerning the court procedure. The fight will be made by the anti-Walton element on the ground that the inflated measure was not advertised at least five days before the election, as required by the Oklahoma law.

The governor claimed he had gained great moral support for his campaign by the result of the balloting. He said the Klan would be blamed by the voters for the defeat of the "anti-Walton" element.

The vote was extremely light—about half of the 450,000 cast at the last general election—in Oklahoma. The governor's high-handed method of handling state affairs, said W. D. Wolfe, leader of the faction in the state legislature demanding impeachment of the governor.

TWIN FALLS WOMEN HURT IN ACCIDENT

It was this hay that caught fire and the car was burned and the car was destroyed.

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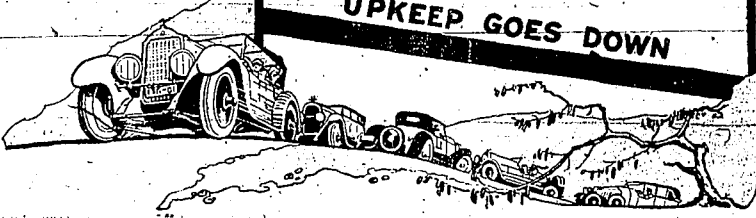

There seems to have been a needless sacrifice of lives. Those in Cole creek and those who are responsible should be held to an accounting.

# Blackburn Said He Sent Powders Aver State Witnesses

### Defense Makes Strong Fight to Eliminate Testimony of Alleged Admissions on Ground That They Were Result of Duress and of Conditional Promises of Relative Immunity; Court Admits Testimony About Some of Alleged Confessions.

Over strenuous objection of counsel for defense, Judge W. A. Habeck today admitted in evidence statements of officers that the defendant Melvin Blackburn told them on the day of his arrest that he had sent the powder to her through the mail and that he did not know what they were all in later asked the druggist from whom he procured them. Blackburn claimed he made statements under promise of earlier prosecution.

Captain J. W. Porter, of the firm of Porter & Wilham, who represents the defendant, sought to show that the statements were made on conditional promise of immunity and as a result of duress, but former Deputy Sheriff H. S. Hamilton and Deputy Prosecutor John H. Barco swore that Blackburn made the statement that he had sent the powder before any promise of immunity, camp up. Mr. Barbo testified that Prosecutor Attorney Taylor said to him that he would tell the name of the druggist if he might be called to the stand for prosecution for second degree murder, and if he did tell it might be that he would be prosecuted only for second degree murder. Blackburn took the stand, regarding testimony that money and said that Prosecutor Taylor told him that if he would tell from whom he got the powder, calling him the real criminal, there would be no prosecution unless his wife died and then only for second degree murder.

After the court overruled the objection the jury was called back and the trial resumed.

**Jacob Scheffer Testifies.**

Jacob Scheffer, by whom Blackburn was employed at the time of the death of his wife, said that he and Melvin were riding together one evening and the latter told him that his wife was sick. He said that in response to question he answered that the doctor believed she was poisoned and said that Melvin declared that he had sent her powder for medicine.

Scheffer declared that he could not give the exact words of Blackburn, but that he conveyed the idea that he was instrumental in having it sent. On cross-examination, Scheffer admitted that Blackburn might have said that the medicine had been sent or given to her prepared or furnished to Mrs. Blackburn.

Miss Selma Johnston, superintendent at the Twin Falls General County Hospital, identified the recent book of the nurse in charge of the case.

Deputy Sheriff J. W. Gabbart was called on and being asked in relation to alleged statements of Blackburn, counsel for defendant objected unless it was shown that such statements were made without duress. It was at this point that the jury was excused and the warm battle over admission of evidence began.

In substance the testimony offered was to the effect that on May 11, following the arrest, Blackburn told Gabbart that he and his wife had decided to get rid of the child about to be born, that he appealed to a druggist friend, who said, "You know what it means to me if it goes out." That Melvin said that a lady went into the drug store to get powders from the druggist and returned with packages which he did not open, but sent as they were. The deputy sheriff said that later he wanted to know who the druggist was and Melvin said that he would find the man at the City Drug

store. When brought there, Melvin pointed out T. F. Murray.

The deputy sheriff said that he told Blackburn if he would tell the whole truth it might be easier. Later he said that his recollection on this was clear and that he had told Melvin that if he would tell the whole truth and tell where he got the powder and what he would do with it would share the blame. He said that he did not promise Melvin immunity. He stated that the officers question Blackburn closely and number of times. Asked if he did not have a row with Blackburn on one of these occasions, he said he did not. Subsequent to this, Blackburn's a bar, he said that Blackburn had contradicted himself and Gabbart had refused to name any man as giving the powder, saying that the man was married and had a family and it was unwise for him to suffer.

For the purpose of keeping out of the case, he said to have been procured under duress the defendant Melvin Blackburn on the stand.

Melvin testified that he had been urged to make a statement and had been promised a measure of immunity.

"Deputy Prosecutor Barbo was asked if he recalled that Blackburn said before the production of charges that he had been told by the police that if he gave them a confession and he said he did not know he went to the sheriff's office. Blackburn did not see and seen the druggist and that the latter said it was calomel. Afterward, Prosecutor Taylor made his statement, regarding possible recollection.

**Murray Informs Wrong.**

Before Gabbart was put on the stand, T. F. Murray was called. It appeared that he had been endorsed on the information as T. F. Murray. Objection to his testimony without further foundation was sustained.

In his testimony, relative to what is said to have taken place in the sheriff's office, Blackburn did not say, today whether his statements there at that time, when he admitted conditional immunity was pronounced. The part of the Gabbart testimony relative to the alleged pointing out of T. F. Murray was not permitted to go to the jury when Mr. Gabbart was recalled. The court held that no foundation had been laid for the testimony that Blackburn had statements in the absence of the jury. Mr. Murray was not told of the alleged pointing out of T. F. Murray.

Effort to get the testimony about a conversation later about a woman was ruled out as not having proper foundation, after which Mr. Haral, father of the dead woman, took the stand and testified that at the hospital Blackburn had told him that he got the powders from a woman who had given it to her husband for him and that he had mailed it. Sisters of the dead woman testified that they got the powder out of the mail.

Following denial that he had disposed of the powder this year, not sheep as perfectly understood, William R. Dwyer, left the stand yesterday to give place to Dr. W. H. Dwight who was called to the stand. Testimony of Dr. Dwight was that Blackburn had

tried to vomit, took the powder, and pulled at wrist joints when he called. He gave ingested to strangle her heart action, and that he had "taken" effect. Blackburn was treated at the hospital and after a few days could swallow. Later she had violent vomiting of blood and convulsive action was shown. He stated that with responsibility for her death. Two or three weeks before the poisoning Mrs. Blackburn had called at his office, said she was in a box and asked him to help her. Dr. Dwight said he refused and advised her to go ahead and become a mother again.

Dr. Dwight was asked in regard to statement alleged to have been made by Blackburn regarding absence of a box to the latter wherein the defendant is said to have declared that it looked something like one he had.

Dr. Dwight indicated that Blackburn did not positively identify the box which is said to have contained the chloro powder as having once been in the possession.

Francis Clement J. R. Dooley told of examining two powders which the testimony showed had been turned over to Blackburn by the defendant when they had been given by Dr. Dwight after they had been received from Mrs. Haral who got them from her daughter, Mrs. Blackburn. He said that one contained 50 and the other 75 grains of bichloride of mercury. Either would be a killing dose.

Dr. Dooley gave the chemical names of bichloride of mercury (hydrochloric acid) and calomel or chloride of mercury (by
