Tragedy Takes Place In Greek Catholic Church at Chicago; Stream of Lead Poured Into Body of Rev. Basil Steubek.

CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—Altonia today witnessed the death of Rev. Basil Steubek, a Greek Catholic priest, who yesterday shot and killed the Rev. Basil Steubek, 44, in the Greek Catholic church of St. Michael the Archangel here.

Witnesses reported that the church was crowded from their meditation and they were taken into a panic as the solemn Sabbath quiet was shattered by the crash of a revolver shot and the shrill maledictions of the woman.

Officials are trying to determine whether the indictments of the woman should also be returned in connection with the embezzlement of funds for constructing the Church of St. Michael and the Archangel had anything to do with the affair.

Mrs. Strutzky, who is 42, is the wife of Rev. Nicholas Strutzky, a former pastor of the church and now pastor of the Church of St. John, the Evangelist, in Raymond.

After her confession the woman said her revolver had been given her by Father Nicholas Strutzky of the town, Ohio, "for my own protection."

Friends of Ed Lockhart Beat Oklahoma Jailer Into Submission and Liberate Prisoner; Leaves Trail of Crime.

OKLAHOMA, Oct. 6.—Ed Lockhart, the month's most notorious desperado, gained his liberty in one of the most daring jail breaks in Oklahoma history (see today).

Lockhart, arrested last week and lodged in jail at Jay, Okla., obtained his freedom when three men drove up in front of the jail in an auto and left after Jack Carey over the head with fists of fury. They were until he agreed to release the outlaw.

The prisoner, with his pals, sped out of the city to the security of his hide-out in the Osage hills.

Lockhart, a protégé of Al Spencer, who was shot to death three weeks ago, has a long career as jail breaker and outlaw. At Spencer's death he became the leader of a gang which for five years has operated along the Oklahoma-Kansas and Oklahoma-Arizona borders, holding up trains, trains and paymasters.

While under a 25 year sentence for robbing a bank, Lockhart was paroled in August by Governor J. C. Walton. Two days later the parole was revoked when the executive learned that Lockhart had come back to his old haunts in the Osage hills.

Authorities were unable to locate Lockhart until they picked up his trail through bank robberies. He was finally captured by Sheriff Smith on the Baker farm near Jay. With three companions, all heavily armed, Lockhart thought himself secure in a barn fortified as a fortress. The sheriff's posse, however, surprised the hideout, taking the gang without firing a shot. Lockhart's cell had \$2,000 had been offered for Lockhart's arrest.

When one reads the record of deaths from poison hooch it would seem that such a warning was sufficient evidence for the young and old of Twin Falls county to leave the stuff alone but the contrary is true. There are now many young and old who drink this poison regardless of the great danger which lurks in this beverage.

If this rain does not cease farmers on the Twin Falls tract will lose thousands of dollars in their crops in the next few weeks. If the fellow who is operating this rain-making machine can be persuaded by any sort of process to cease this foolish trick it will be the greatest blessing that can come to this tract. Very little damage has been done thus far but the next few days will tell if this rain continues.

The budget of the Boy Scout movement has been fixed at \$5000 and this would seem small enough when you consider what a splendid service this money will render to humanity. This district which includes Rupert, Burley, Twin Falls and Blund should be able to raise this sum without any very strenuous effort. The cause is indeed worthy and the response should be in keeping with the good that this money will accomplish for our future citizenship.

Striking confirmation of the trite statement that many things in the scripture which were unintelligible when written have been made clear by modern development was furnished at the trial of the Blackburn case last week. It was made plain that those living on party lines in the country have unusual facilities for garnering information. Thus is made clear one interpretation of the scriptural statement that "what is whispered in the closet shall be shouted from the house-tops."

CENTRAL AMERICA SOUND FINANCIALLY

While every government in Europe has increased its debt enormously during the last ten years, the five Central American governments all have smaller financial debts than they had ten years ago. Prior to the war, most capital for these governments came chiefly from London and Paris. American interests are now predominant in Central America, but as yet have done little or no long term financing for our five southern neighbors.

Our failure to undertake more constructive work in Central America is to be regretted; first, because the lack of foreign capital has somewhat retarded progress in that part of the world; secondly, because some opportunities for the profitable employment of our capital and expansion of our trade have been neglected. It is true that Costa Rica and Nicaraguan government finances have been rehabilitated through our co-operation, and Honduras has made an adjustment of its debt which clears the way for the investment of American capital; but such construction as has been done by Central American governments in the last ten years has been financed entirely from domestic resources.

During the same period the production and trade of these countries has expanded steadily, and their economic position today is probably better than it ever has been. Especially notable has been their management of currency problems; with the exception of Guatemala, there has been no paper currency inflation, and the exchange rates of Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Honduras and Salvador have been stable for a long time close to par. In view of the fact that the currencies of well-established gold-standard countries like Denmark, Norway, Holland and Great Britain are selling at a discount from the United States dollar, the currency record of Central America is a remarkable tribute to the financial acumen of its leaders.—New York Commercial and Financial World.
