

GOVERNMENT DISPOSAL OF WHEAT URGED

Marketing of Surplus by Government to Insure Better Prices Advised by Speaker at International Farm Congress.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 10.—Marketing of America's annual surplus wheat by the government to insure better prices for the producer was urged today by W. K. James, president of the International Farm Congress here.

James' plan would involve turning over by the farmer his surplus or exportable wheat crop each year to the United States Grain Corporation, and the sale by that agency in the world markets.

The plan also includes price-fixing by the government for the bulk of the crop, on the basis of home consumption. Thus under this scheme, the wheat raiser would be guaranteed a certain price for his product, and a world price for the balance.

At present the farmer sells 100 per cent of his product at the low level of world prices and produces a surplus which he must sell on the American price level.

When the farmer delivers his wheat to the warehouse he would receive cash for the home-consumed product, and a negotiable receipt for the surplus.

This method of marketing would automatically restrict wheat production to the amount required for home consumption and encourage diversified farming, James pointed out.

At present the farmer receives for the 75 to 80 per cent of his crop a much lower price than the world market price.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10.—The freighter Stanley Dollar is rushing to San Francisco from 600 miles out at sea.

The radiogram announcing her plight was picked up early last night in the first message Captain R. D. McBeane received from the vessel.

The distress of the Stanley Dollar occurred 24 hours of sea mishaps on the Pacific coast.

The freighter is reported to have a cargo of lumber. She is expected to be floated at high tide today.

TOWNS IN PATH OF FOREST FIRE

Wisconsin Villages Are in Serious Danger of Destruction.

SUPHIOR, Wis., Oct. 10.—National conservation today are anxious to hunt down the forest fire which has been burning since last night.

One person was burned to death yesterday. Many homes have been destroyed and several highways have been closed.

The first fatality of the fire thus far came when Mildred Kolva, 42 years old, wandered into the flames near Mohawk, Mich., and was burned to death.

The bill which the governor will submit to the legislature provides that all secret organizations must file a list of their members each year and prohibit wearing of masks.

NORTH CAROLINA COUNTY LEADS

Mothers in Anson county, North Carolina, who cannot get quart of soup mixtures and tomatoes for the use of their children during the winter have given that food to be used in the noon lunches which the children will receive in school. This sort of preparedness is quite new and worthy of imitation. Hot school lunches are known to be of great value to the youngsters who consume them during the winter. What could be wiser, then, than for the mothers, who know that their children will need them, to prepare the food for their especial benefit?—Baltimore Sun.

If every rural school had a canning club and a cooking club, or the two combined in one, the hot lunch problem would be solved for them. The preparation of a soup or a vegetable stew would be a simple matter. In some cities school children consider themselves badly treated if they cannot have lunch every day. Under weather conditions in most rural communities the hot lunch at school is more important than in the cities. The delicious lunches that can be prepared in these country schools would make the city children envious.

IS IT AN ACCIDENT?

The United States maintains the most comprehensive system for public education in the world.

The per capita income in the United States is higher than for any other nation. Farmers of the United States produce per worker 2.3 times what the farmer of the United Kingdom produces; 2.5 times what the German farmer produces; 3.2 times what the French farmer produces, 4.5 times what the Italian farmer produces. Is it an accident?

Farmers of the United States send their children to school less regularly and fewer days per year and fewer years than commercial, clerical, banking and professional classes.

Agricultural workers constitute 28 per cent of the total of occupational workers and get 17.3 per cent of the national income. Commercial, clerical, banking, professional and miscellaneous classes constitute 32 per cent of the total of occupational workers and get 40 per cent of the national income. Is it an accident?

California enrolls a higher percentage of the population in high school than any other state. The state university at Berkeley enrolls twice as many farm bred students as any other state university.

Out of the fifty agricultural counties in the United States realizing the highest net income, California has 11 and out of the 10 highest counties California has 4. Is it an accident?

A NEW CONSOLIDATION BULLETIN

Consolidation of schools and transportation of pupils is the subject of Bulletin, 1923, No. 41, soon to be issued by the United States Bureau of Education. The bulletin is not confined to what is popularly known as the consolidated school but is an attempt to review and evaluate in general the entire educational movement that has for its purpose bringing children together in larger groups so that the wealth and energy of greater areas may be concentrated on fewer and better schools. It deals with the location and fundamental weaknesses of the 150,000 one-teacher schools in the United States, the history and development of consolidation and transportation since the time of Horace Mann, the economic and educational forces that have caused the establishment of consolidated schools and their value in school progress. In tracing the history of consolidation the author presents the main facts relating to the growth of city systems, independent and special districts; and the gradual extension of the township and county as units of school administration.

There is a discussion of the present status of consolidation, its different forms as shown in complete and partial consolidations, state-grated schools, union high schools, and county secondary schools. Statistical measures both absolute and relative of the amount of consolidation in the United States are given. Finally, the prog-

THE HEALTH EXAMINATIONS. The American Medical Association and the National Health Council have started a campaign urging every man woman and child in the United States to be examined physically once a year on their birthdays. All physicians will receive a plan for the purpose of systematizing the examinations.

There have been many plans for compulsory physical examinations. These have failed but a plan urging voluntary examinations met with increasing favor. People resent compulsory examinations but are busy fearing the greater value of prevention of disease in comparison with the cure of disease they accept the voluntary plan.

Opposition to anything compulsory along this line is supported by certain able scientists, especially those familiar with the history of the matter. They point out that compulsion in any course of conduct never should be used in a situation has failed and that intelligent cooperation is essential in all plans for public health. 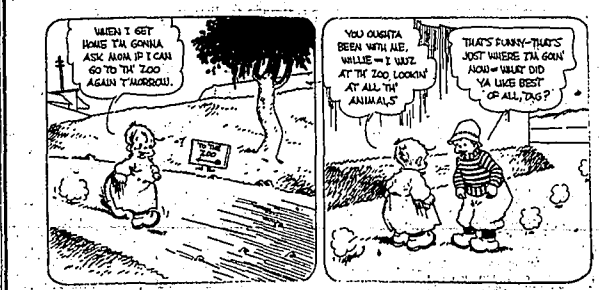
