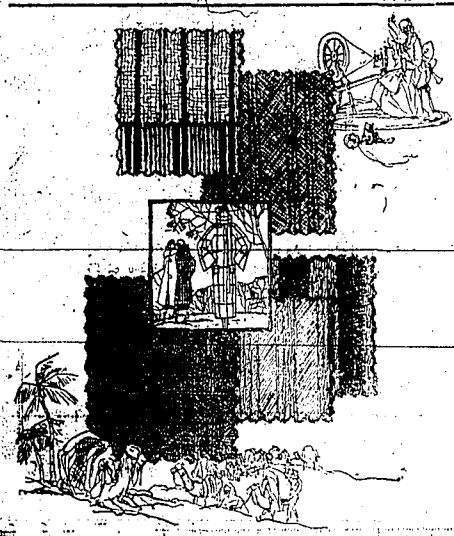

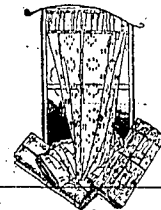

## CO-OPERATIVE ORGANIZATION VERSUS LEGAL PRICE FIXING.

Senator Borah is on sound ground when he tells the farmers in his syndicate letters that there is more to be expected from farm organization and co-operation in marketing than in governmental guarantee of prices. There is a superficial similarity, however, in government regulation, control and ownership on one hand and co-operative farm organizations on the other which the senator in a recent speech confused with ignorance. The senator was quoted as saying in substance that the fixing of the price of farm products was on the same plane as fixing the price of services of railroads and public utilities. The reason given for fixing the price of utility service is directly opposite to that given for fixing the price of farm products by those favoring the plan.

Effort to fix prices for public utilities is made on the perfectly sound theory that these are natural monopolies and that if unrestricted by regulation and in extreme cases by government ownership, they will put the prices so high that grave injustice will result to the consumers if left uncontrolled; and that part of this effect is produced by exercising governmental functions. Price fixing for farm products, and as an alternative co-operative marketing are urged on the theory that it is impossible for farmers to form a monopoly and that unless prices are upheld either through effective co-operation or through government action, the market will at times become demoralized and prices be forced down too low. Farm organizations and labor organizations are exempted from the operation of the anti-trust laws because it is recognized that that form of monopoly which springs from limited supply cannot be formed and maintained, and hence no real trust can be formed.

Co-operative organizations for marketing should be encouraged, because of their beneficial effects in straightening the market and giving out supplies when needed instead of piling them all on the "market place." It is an error to suppose that they can freeze

out competitors in the same line and form a real monopoly that will stick. Men in the private buying business have some advantages where they seek only legitimate instead of gambling profits. Occasionally a set of men are selected who do such effective team work in connection with an efficient manager in co-operative buying that they would be the best in private business, but the rule is rather the other way. On the other hand, however, co-operation is necessary to keep the person who raises products from being lured by the mercy of gamblers. The formation of co-operative selling organizations is therefore necessary in order to eliminate the worst, not the best of dealers and get that steadiness of marketing which is so necessary for best results.

Naturally, the theory that are engaged in any line of production the more effective will be the organization. General government control of lines of business is not advocated by even the warmest friends of government ownership, who argue for their theory only in industries that are comparatively simple in their organization, are natural monopolies, employ relatively few men compared with the volume of business transacted, and now operate under a public franchise.

Co-operative farm selling organizations are advocated in a class of business that nobody save extreme socialists and communists would say should be owned by the people as a whole in their public organized capacity. They are so highly competitive that it is realized by lawmakers both of state and nation, that they can never be so closely organized as to squeeze the consumer unduly.

In cases of that kind co-operative organizations can be formed without limit. On the other hand, should governmental price fixing in competitive lines start it is hard to see where it could logically stop short of the ideal Sooner's plan of universal price fixing.

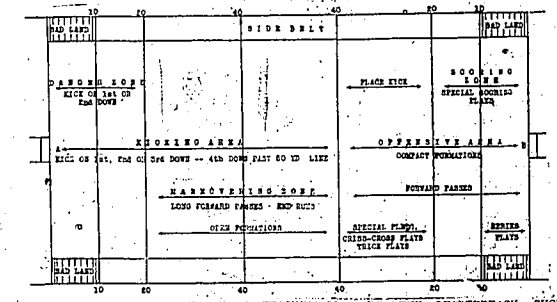

The generalship employed in a football game should be a result of the history of played games, the experience and study of the coaches, and the mastery of the sequence of plays, the experience of coaches, the style of coaches, the style of offense and defense, the relation of plays bears to another, and the formations which contain the various plays, make up the system previous to each game. The system determines the tactics and strategy to be employed.

The average, successful, as a general, is of the opinion that the quarterback does all of the thinking for the team as far as the selection of plays on the field is concerned. ## Less Regulation of Railroads by Government Asked

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 11.—Plea for less regulation of the railroads by the government and a larger campaign power to enable the roads to purchase new equipment was sounded today by W. L. Storey, president of the Santa Fe, in an address to the annual Southwestern Business Congress here.

"To make the railroads of more service to the public and to enable them to take care of increased traffic demands, they should have an earning power that would enable them to make expenditures in the way of betterment," Storey said.

The Santa Fe president denied charges of Clyde M. Hurd, candidate for the republican nomination for governor of Kansas, that the interstate commerce commission had over-estimated the value of the nation's railroads, and that this valuation had placed a burden of \$700,000,000 annually on the roads, which would necessarily be reflected in higher freight rates.

"These conclusions are false," said Storey. "Because the railroads have not earned a fair return on the valuation fixed by the commission."

Storey charged that Hurd wanted to "destroy the value of the roads and have the government take them over."

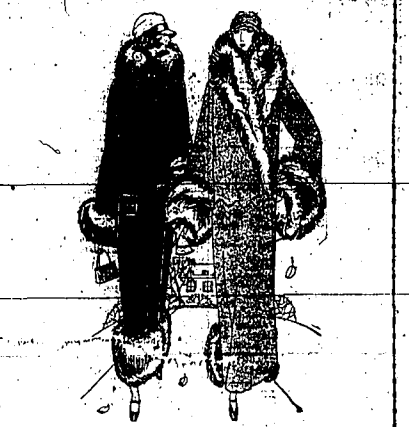
