

LOYD GEORGE PLUS CASE IN HANDS OF U.S.

Famous Visitor Carries His Plea Directly to People; Calls Upon America to Help Europe in Restoring Peace After Turmoil.

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—A tremendous ovation was accorded Lloyd George by thousands of persons when the former premier of Britain today arrived here at noon today.

Major Devere and leading business men of the city met at the premier at the Northwestern station when the special train arrived from London.

There was a sound of hoots mixed with the cheering of thousands as the parade moved toward the "loop." The parade ended at the La Salle hotel

WITH LOYD GEORGE, ST. CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 16.—Lloyd George is to carry his case for American aid in settling world problems directly to the people.

He is not disturbed by the fact that the administration at Washington, speaking through the national White House spokesman, has stated that it is not expected that anything will come of the League of Nations.

Lloyd George does not expect the American government to do anything now about the "how-of-the-how" of the League of Nations. He does not expect anything to be done unless the American people impel their government to action. He cannot speak to government by the official status. But he always has been an expert at talking to the common people.

He believes that until the American common people show the way in settling the world's problems there will be no peace in Europe, they will demand that Washington take whatever steps are necessary in consonance with American traditions to do that.

Having sounded his message yesterday before a big enthusiastic audience of northwesterners, Lloyd George intends to do the same thing in every section of the country before he speaks.

"I came here to see and hear, to learn of you," he said. "I did not intend to make speeches nor wish to be in the limelight, but I thought you therefore what is in my mind."

In his speech yesterday, Lloyd George called on America to help Europe make peace. He said that the United States does, he said, "despair of the future."

He added that America, he hoped would come in in due time and in a big way.

UTAH POLICEMAN SHOT TO DEATH

Young Paroled Convict in Rearranged; Strange Story Told

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Oct. 16.—Robert E. Saunders, 26, paroled convict, was shot to death in the Wyoming city yesterday by George Williams, 20, the chief constable.

Williams said he killed the convict according to the sheriff's order.

The alleged confession followed his apprehension at Ludlow late yesterday by George Williams, 20, the chief constable.

Saunders took full responsibility for the killing, police said. He was quoted as saying he and his companion had been in a fight with Williams, who was driving a motor car. At a lonely spot on the outskirts of the city, Saunders said he fired the shot which he said had killed Williams.

Saunders is a paroled convict. He is being held in the Wyoming penitentiary, disposed of Crowther county jail. At Las Vegas, Nev., Saunders said the sheriff told him that the officer's name was not known. All three men were arrested at Las Vegas. The officers are expected to arrive tonight and take them back to San Bernardino.

Oklahoma Residences Flooded by Overflow

Water Breaks Through Banks of Reservoir and Inundates Lowlands of Southern City; Thousands Hurry Out of Stricken District; National Guardsmen Will Protect Homes from Looters.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 16.—A wall of water, released by breaking of the banks of the reservoir, flooded the southern city today, flooding scores of homes in the lowland district.

Flood waters rose seven feet within 20 minutes after forces were released by the reservoir breaking. Automobiles, fire department hoses and heavy trucks roared through the streets at midnight with streets overflowing, waiting the people of the surrounding flood.

Fifteen thousand persons poured from their homes in the lowlands of the southern section of the city during the dark hours of the early morning and rushed through the streets to the high ground on the north side.

Mayor O. A. Crowell ordered a district of more than 100 city blocks vacated when the reservoir water broke from control.

Stand armies of police, firemen, women carrying young children; husbands and other children carrying bundles of clothing, blankets and food hurried through the congested streets.

Many in tears as they left their homes.

On orders of Governor J. C. Wallingford, National Guardsmen were ordered into the vacated districts to protect homes against looters.

Attending the hospital and the aged, to city hospitals which were crowded to capacity.

Emergency relief stations were put into service and operated to the edge of the flood waters, to aid in transporting the refugees to safe sections of the city.

Added to the flood menace was the great wall of water which reached the city. With its main reservoir gone, only emergency tanks remained and it was necessary to get up emergency relief stations.

Emergency relief stations were transferred quickly to higher ground when the rapid rise of waters threatened the homes.

Thousands of homes were under water and many near the main channels of the water.

Washed away, according to police statistics, was a record stage when it peaked the 25-foot crest at 6 a. m.

The inundated plain side stream had been converted into a raging monster by general downpours of rain throughout the southern section of the state during the last two weeks.

During the early part of last night the water ran on a main channel through the city, carrying with it hundreds of men working feverishly in an effort to avert a rise of several feet in water level.

Working on the outlet, the water level dropped and the danger of the dam, cutting rapidly into the hill side.

There was an escape was only a slight trick, but watchers knew that it would be impossible to immerge the water and the city.

Within a moment the trickles grew to a torrent.

Oklahoma City has experienced numerous floods, one of the worst being the one which occurred here today.

Forteen Year Old Girl Tells of Horrible Oregon Crime.

MANSFIELD, Ore., Oct. 16.—"It just has to be done."

The simple explanation is the striking of a young girl, advanced here today by Little-Lucille Covell, 14-year-old step-daughter of Mrs. Ethel Covell, slain by Alton Covell, the girl's brother.

With the youth facing a first degree murder charge and his crippled brother, Alton Covell, in a hospital, the girl, who is the state's chief witness in court. She is expected to testify her brother was "murdered" under the influence of his uncle that he could not do otherwise than kill.

Whether or not the slaying is a murder, the girl's testimony will face a jury trial not been decided today. The court is still considering the girl's testimony and will soon determine if it will be accepted and sentence passed or if the state will stand the formality of a jury trial.

Young Alton Covell, although he has confessed to the slaying, has pleaded "not guilty," claiming the uncle's hypnotic influence forced him to commit the crime.

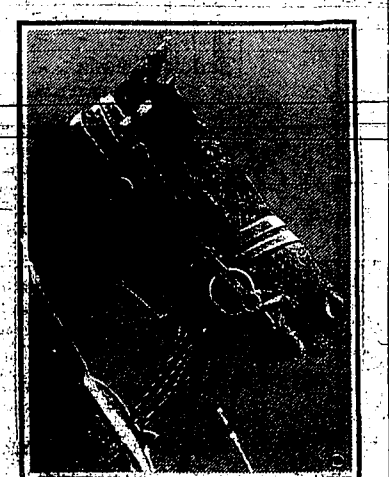
