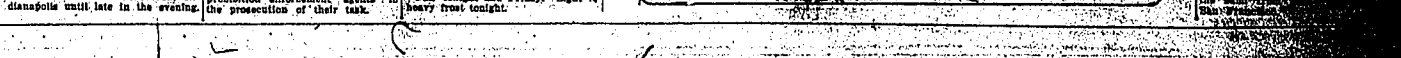

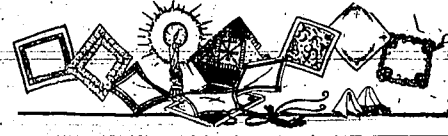

Next year it is the duty of both great parties to see that only those who favor enforcement of the Volstead act shall be nominated, in order that this question shall not be an issue and that people may be permitted to consider other issues without fear that the Tam power will sneak into control.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the state convention of which is now in session here can be depended on, to keep a lookout from the watch tower to see that the forces of King Alcohol shall make no undiscovered advance.

ENFORCE ANTI-TRUST LAW

There is considerable complaint, which should be investigated, to the effect that there is an creamery trust which is systematically working to freeze out smaller competitors, with a view of monopolizing the butter producing business of the country, and that this trust is operating in Idaho. With a view of preventing this sort of thing a law was passed in this state which prevented a concern paying a high price for cream temporarily greater than difference of freight would warrant in any community, for the purpose of eliminating local enterprise and then dropping it again when it succeeded. This method is a favorite one with trusts. In addition to this there is an excellent general anti-trust law in this state prohibiting the formation of monopolies imposing fines and imprisonment for its violation and allowing civil damages for those injured by the practices of monopoly.

It is charged by independent creamery men that the big interests evade the law by manipulating the grading of cream in communities where local competition is strong and that several municipally competing companies are maintained by the trust. If these things are true they should be proven and the law invoked and enforced. There is very elaborate legal machinery in this state that might be brought into operation. In the meantime, the organization of co-operative creameries might be tried as a means of furnishing wholesome competition, which in the long run is the best antidote for monopoly.

STARVE OUT THE FIRE DEMON

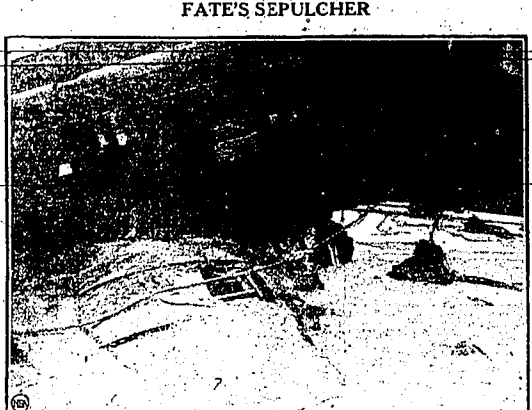

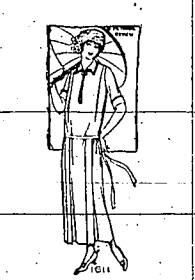
TUBERCULOUS SOCIETY IS ORGANIZED
