

RELEASE OF MRS. SCHICK DESIRED

Accused Woman, About to Become a Mother, Does Not Want Infant to Bear Stigma of Jail Birth; Care From Solution.

SAN DIEGO, Oct. 25.—That Mrs. Sarah Margaret Schick's baby may not bear the stigma of jail birth, immediate release of the mother on bail will be sought by Adam Thompson, her attorney. It was learned today just before Mrs. Schick was arraigned on a charge of fornicy.

Mrs. Schick will be brought before Justice J. D. Feinberg who last week held Mr. and Mrs. E. Drew Clark in \$5000. The three are alleged to have conspired to seize the property of the missing General G. Schick, a wealthy real estate operator, through a forged power of attorney.

In view of Mrs. Schick's confession and her pre-natal condition, Thompson will seek to have her bail set lower than \$5000. It is expected that the district attorney will not allow her to go free without arrest on any other charge.

The Clarks have not attempted to furnish bail.

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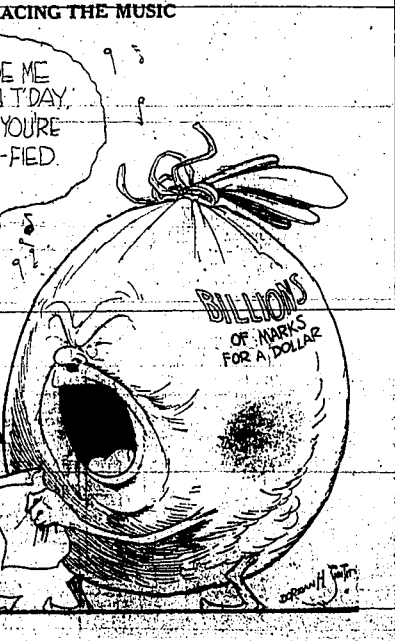

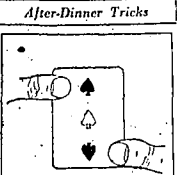

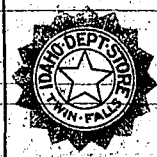

Will the Steady Gain in Popularity of the King of College Sports End in Its Superseding Baseball as the Great American Game?



To the average spectator, more thrilling per minute than any other form of sport on earth.

To the partisan followers of the game and of the institutions involved, a battle of the gods.

To each side, every person with even the slightest acquaintance with the game, the positive assurance that the very next play will provide a thrill such as comes but once in a lifetime.

Such is football.

It is football, with its inclusion of the mastery of tactics, speed, and many that are not so tame, about it, supersede, baseball as the popular national game of America!

More rapid, the sport of kings in football, only rival when it comes to enthusiasm on the part of great numbers of spectators. But at the race track, sport experts agree, the enthusiasm is caused by purely selfish motives, whereas the football fan gets his thrills from the action presented by men who risk life and limb for the other person than that "top line" to take part in a man's life, and immediately accept the terms of their follow men as full payment for their effort and sacrifice involved.

Followers of the many sports of the day may take exception to the above matter of attendance and enthusiasm. It is true a world's championship heavyweight bout between contenders of note may draw in the crowd, more persons than a major football game. There is, however, not one such fight in a decade, while football is a weekly and semi-weekly event for several months each year.
