The falls going and coming to the county hospital are to have a new sidewalk this fall and this will be greatly appreciated by the pedestrians who live or have business in that direction.

Football holds the attention of perhaps more people at this season of the year than any other sport ever gets. It is one of the most thrilling games that has ever been contrived by the human brain and attracts perhaps more players than any other single sport. Twin Falls residents have been in the habit of witnessing a stellar type of football and there is much interest here in this national game. Twin Falls fans will travel a long distance to see a good game and the younger generation almost breathes this sport from the time they enter the grades up to the high school age.

Another jury has disagreed as to whether Lavin is guilty or innocent. It is too bad that the county is put to such a heavy expense in trying such cases and yet this seems to be the only method of bringing about justice. Now the federal courts will take up this case and will spend a great deal of money on same. The cost of these criminal cases is very heavy and yet it is perhaps the only way to check crime but it seems sometimes that an uneven distribution of this cost falls on certain communities and perhaps they are not to blame because the cases happen to come up in that particular district.

Here comes some one with the statement that liquor is being dispensed at various places in Twin Falls but we have failed to see any such wholesale distribution of "moonshine" as our friend assures us is going on. There is at least one place we believe not more than a mile from this office where something must be going on that attracts a great many men. Whether this is a joint is impossible for us to say but the crowd that goes and comes looks suspicious. However this place seems to be able to disguise its business if booze is being sold at this particular number. If the officers are not exercising due diligence on this subject we hope they will. It is very easy and simple to criticize and find fault but it is another thing to find and apply the remedy.

The Twin Falls high school will open again next Monday after being closed for several days in order to allow the boys and girls to work in the fields. We believe that the time has come when these children should be called back to their studies. They have had a good vacation and have accomplished a lot for the farmers. If the weather continues pleasant it will help the farmers greatly in being able to get their crops in. The sugar beet harvest and the potato digging have really just started and it will take many weeks before these are taken care of. But the lessons should now be stressed to make up for the time that these young people have lost in the fields. In other words, some of the social functions should be cut in order to allow for real hard study.

Doing unto others as ye would that they should do unto you as given us by the Master is being demonstrated by the judges of our city that have the leadership in the benefit to be given next Tuesday evening in the Old Fellows hall, for the relief of Miss Hazel Lounsbury. The story of her handicap is given in this issue. The business men of our city are responding nobly to the committee solicitation. Our business men are most generous and to relieve the needy. The entire county should be glad for which all opportunity of patronizing the carnival, the proceeds of which all go towards a life benefit to a worthy young lady who has shown such a sweet spirit of appreciation. This is not such a bad world after all.

In so far as prohibition is a political issue in Vermont, the lines are now drawn for a straight wet and dry contest in the senatorial election. Mr. Dale's nomination by the republicans places the republican party squarely back of the Volstead act as now written; Mr. Pollard's nomination by the democrats places the democratic party squarely in opposition. The democratic hope is to attract wet republicans to the support of Mr. Pollard; but, no matter how wet the wet republicans may be, they must vote against President Coolidge in order to register their disapproval of prohibition. Such an alternative has the aspect of a political tragedy which can only be appreciated by those who understand what President Coolidge means to his native state. The outlook for Mr. Dale's election to the senate by a normal plurality is excellent.

External signs of night activity in downtown Boston have been materially diminished since the advent of prohibition. Formerly, after the evening performances at the theatres, streams of taxicabs conveyed supper parties to the hotels and restaurants. The situation did not change materially when the center of gayety shifted from the older hotel district to the region round Park square. Yet in those older days, when people really abandoned where darkness now prevails, the subway closed at 12:30 a. m. Persons who had occasion to use the traction system after that hour were obliged to ride on the surface lines, on which service was by no means frequent. It may be that while there are fewer persons visible in downtown Boston, and while in all parts of the city the taxicabs have multiplied, there is as large a number as ever who

desire to use the street cars late at night. Possible the army of night workers has increased. At all events, for the first time the Boston subway is to be kept open all night. The elevated and subway trains will not run, but the street cars will be operated through the midnight hours. The public trustees of the Boston elevated are making a helpful concession to the public.

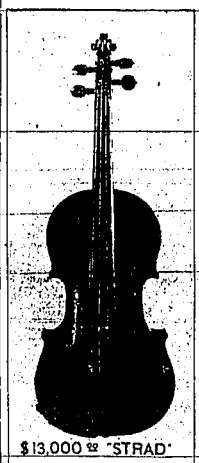

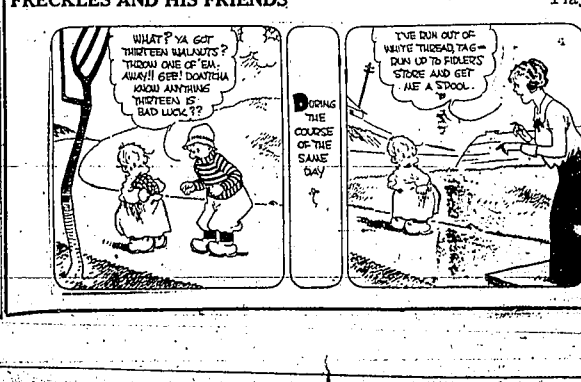
RAILROAD TIME TABLE

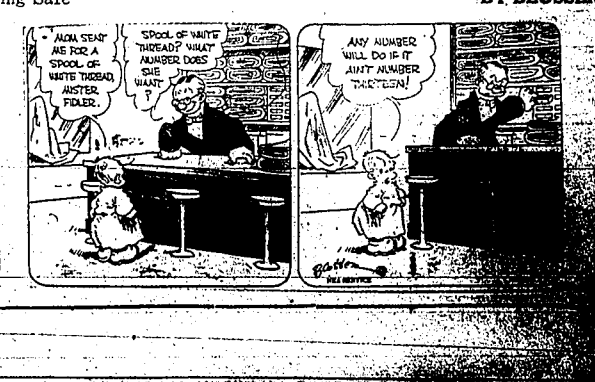
