Many Get Fines for Breaking of Game and Fish Law
The Idaho fish and game department from fines for the month of September has amounted to \$362, according to State Warden Dick Stephens. This is an increase over the receipt of September last year of \$103.65.
During September 42 arrests were made by the warden and the greater number of these were for out-of-season offences and for fishing with-out-a-license. Eight were arrested for hunting out of season and five for lacking a license to fish. Five were arrested for shooting ducks before sunrise and four for fishing within 500 feet of a dam. There were four offenders for fishing in a closed stream and two arrested for the illegal possession of fish. Six people contributed \$160 for having fish traps set in violation of the law, and one each were fined for selling, smacking fish and fishing from forested.

SHREWD PEOPLE SEIZE OPPORTUNITY

Idaho is one of the richest regions agriculturally on the face of the globe. It is blessed with an enriching combination of fertile soil, abundant water and sunshine, a good climate and a fine citizenry. One's hope and confidence would have to be at a low ebb to believe that these happy conditions, these blessings and benefits are leading the farm producers of Idaho toward bankruptcy and the poor farm.

"BOYS—A NATION'S GREATEST ASSET"

Does the boy have a chance? Are we neglecting our boyhood? It would appear that something is radically wrong when we consider the facts concerning the boy problem. Our nation is spending stupendous amounts of money for the protection of life and property through the instrumentality of our police, our courts, and our penal institutions. Seventy-five per cent of those apprehended are merely boys. Are the boys to blame, or has the community failed utterly in realizing its responsibility toward the boy? One in every three boys needs medical attention; three out of every four never reach high school; only a pitiful hand full get an opportunity to learn a trade. Too many of our boys are on blind-alley jobs.

If we are to build better nations, we must see to it that the boys are protected.

The fault is rarely on the part of the boys; usually the parents and the community are to blame. Ask yourselves the question: What do I know about my boys—my sons and my nephews at this moment? What are they doing right now? How much real attention do you give them? How much interest do you take in them and their interests?

The purpose of boys' week is to get you into the frame of mind where you can think for a little while in terms of the BOY. An interest in boys is an investment that pays the largest possible dividends in the markets of real life.

The school, the church, the spare-time organization, and the home each share their responsibility for the boy.

There are the under-privileged and over-privileged boys. Let us see to it that every boy has an equal chance to work out his destiny, without the handicap of thick side alley and wrong gang if he is an under-privileged boy, or that he is spared the handicap of too much money and being spoiled, if he is an over-privileged boy.

LITVIN CASE SHOWS DEFECT IN TRIALS IN COURT

The fact that two juries divided and hung in the Litvin case has caused a good deal of talk to the effect that juries ought to be abolished and that cases should be tried by judges, who being lawyers, and trained in the matter of judging the weight of evidence, are supposed to be able to determine such matters better. The theory does not work out in practice. A few years ago in

Chicago, a panel was made up of lawyers, each of whom waived his exemption, to try a case wherein none of them knew either party to the case. The jury disagreed.
— This is not surprising. In a very important and interesting case from this city last year, the supreme court of Idaho divided three to two. Divided courts passed on the meaning of the term "direct tax" in the constitution for a century and when the income tax was passed under the Cleveland administration, the court upheld the law and then one of the judges changed his mind and reversed the decision which a majority of divided courts had given to the term in question for a century.

In the Newberry case there are four points of view. In the judges, a bare majority of the court, held the statute of Michigan under which Newberry had been tried to be unconstitutional. Four of these took the view that if passed now it would still be unconstitutional, but Justice McKeena, one of the five refused to concur in this view, claiming that the adoption of the constitutional amendment making senators elective by popular vote, which took place after the Michigan statute was passed, might alter the situation and make a statute like that of Michigan, if passed thereafter valid. Three justices for certain reasons held the Michigan statute constitutional at all times, and Chief Justice White for other and different reasons, also held the statute to have been at all times constitutional. Agreement among judges is no more likely than among juries.

Juries are men of different sorts of mind and views and these differences, which are shown in courts, are evidenced in every walk of life. That is why we have divided juries.

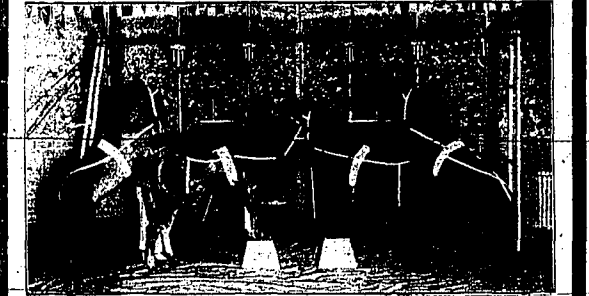

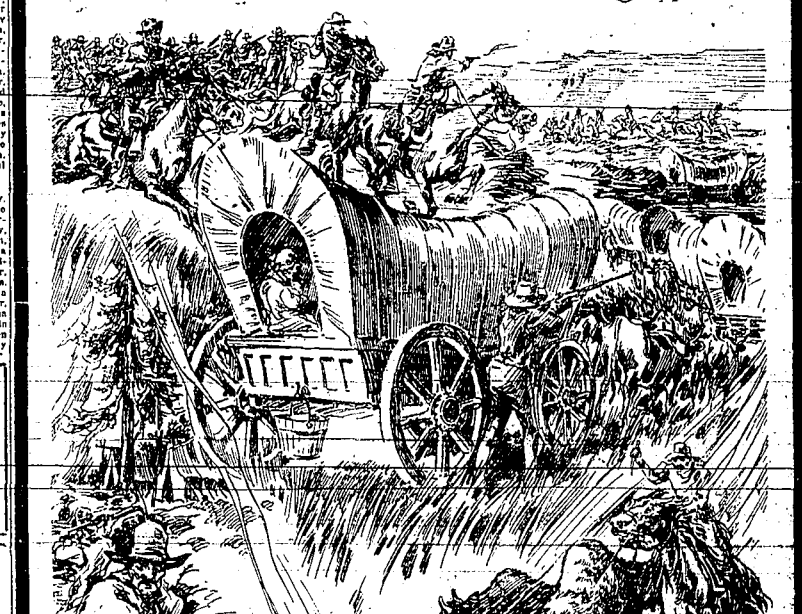
