DEATH CALLS BONAR LAW, A TRUE MARTYR TO HIS OFFICE

Septic Pneumonia Immediate Cause of Englishman's Passing; Duties of Former Position Undermined His Health Before Resignation.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The Right Hon. Andrew Bonar Law, prime minister of Great Britain from October 1922 to May, 1923, died at his residence in London at the age of 64 today.

Death followed a long but fruitless fight in England and on the continent in the effort to cure a chief of the British state during one of the most trying periods in its history.

The passing of Bonar Law, although not unexpected, caused profound grief throughout the nation when announced in the morning newspapers.

Bonar Law really sacrificed his life for his country. He knew he was signing his own death warrant when he took over the strenuous duties of the premiership after the resignation of David Lloyd George last year.

PARIS, Oct. 30.—Andrew Bonar Law died another martyr to the terrific responsibilities of office, in the opinion of his friends here.

The heavy strain of taking a decision to finally rupture the war entente probably contributed more than any other thing to bring about his breakdown.

When Bonar Law left the conference room where he virtually ended the line entente of France and England he was scarcely able to walk, his face was drawn and haggard and his lips and hands trembling.

U.S.S. West Virginia to Be Most Powerful of Fighting Vessels

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 30.—The U. S. Navy is building the battleships to be built by the United States government under the Washington arms conference limitation and six to be equipped with the electric drive, thereby completing a "electric fleet" which will be commissioned at the Newport News shipbuilding yards about Dec. 1. She will be the largest of the U. S. S. Maryland and the U. S. S. Colorado.

This vessel is 624 feet long, 27 feet wide at the water line and weighs 32,000 tons. She is expected to make 21 knots and has a cruising radius of about 10,000 miles.

The West Virginia will be commanded by Captain Thomas J. Bamm and will replace the U. S. S. North Dakota, of which she is the replacement.
