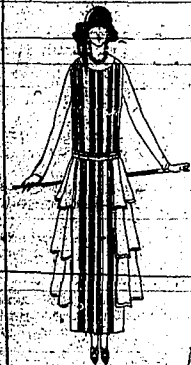

EDUCATION THROUGH MOTION PICTURES

For if there is anything bigger or better or older than anything else on earth it naturally comes from Southern California. Forthwith a lot of professors of something or other that never had a chance to earn fame will spring up and get into a furious dispute regarding whether this human lived one million or four million years ago, long before it has been decided whether he is or ever was a man at all. All this sort of thing leads away from democracy. As long as folk believe that all human beings had a common origin, and that Christ was actually God and came down on earth to regenerate and save all mankind, there can be no fundamental differences between men and women and the tendency is ever toward the adoption of the common rights. But if men are descended from several different breeds of monkeys, who in turn descended from various kinds of worms, the temptation for each person to assume that his own swarm and monkey ancestor tree was the best becomes strong. And it is precisely this assumption that lies at the bottom of so many efforts on the part of men to convince themselves that their remote ancestors were better essentially than those of the other fellow and that they are, therefore, better. That God could make the body of man for latitude by slow process through a certain animal is undoubted, but that he did so make him, and through various lines of ancestry, is alike unproven and destructive of the very principle of democracy.

Unless we multiply the efficiency and redouble the stamion of the coming generation it will not go forward as should. The World was this much to break down the moralism of the conventionalist and it behooves each of us to strengthen our second line of defense for the future citizens of this great America.

PLANT SOME KIND OF TREE

Duty of Every Citizen Who Can, to Contribute to the Wealth of the Country. At last the people are beginning to realize the vital need of tree planting and are extending the practice to a practical way. Massachusetts will plant 2,000,000 trees this year on waste lands near towns. Lake County, Illinois, reports 100 per cent tree planting for the schools. All over the country trees are being planted and more so soon, as it takes from twenty to fifty years to grow trees that are of much use for manufacturing purposes. Our forests are being devastated so rapidly that in a few more years lumber will be so costly for commercial use unless millions of trees are planted each year. Trees have much to do with health, beauty and rainfall, and it is time that every family in this country planted at least one tree each year. Every farm family should plant at least 20 trees a year.

The kind of tree to plant must be determined by the locality. Certain trees will grow best in certain kinds of soil. Almost every home needs more fruit trees. Many homes can be greatly benefited by planting evergreen trees for beauty and to serve as a windbreak. Soft spruce grows quickly and makes good shade trees.—The Pathfinder.

CHEAP CHIMNEYS A MISTAKE

Authorities Have Shown Enormous Fire Loss Caused Indirectly by Inferior Construction. More than \$12,000,000 annually is lost in fire throughout the United States caused by defective and improperly constructed chimneys, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

Building a chimney in the proper way seems a simple matter but this due to ignorance or willful neglect of fact in the building industry do most of our chimneys. The principal defect in building chimney is to place the flues and supports from outer side of the chimney.
