NEWS OF THE SPORT WORLD

TWIN FALLS BRUINS PLAY SUPERB GAME

East High Proves An Easy Victim for Fast Football Squad in the Magic City; Coach Evans' Team Completely Bewildered Visitors by Fast Style of Play; Garrity Is All Star Player.

Displaying a brand of football that completely bewildered its opponents, Twin Falls high school eleven won a decisive victory over East High of Salt Lake City Saturday afternoon at Lincoln field, 27 to 7, after a crowd estimated at 3500.

Terrific line plunges by Garrity, Timm and Jenkins; the powerful plugging of the Twin Falls line, and the inability of the Leopards to consistently gain with their chief stick in trade, the overall style of play, tells the story in a few words. A 95-yard run through a scattered field by Clarence Garrity in the last two minutes of play was easily the feature of a game that had for its other features only the outstanding superiority of the Twin Falls team against its opponents from the Utah metropolis.

Time and again did Clarence Garrity demonstrate that he is beyond a doubt the greatest high school football player that ever donned the Redskins. His work on defensive during the game seemed ludicrous. Always on the alert, this stellar pluggish charger broke up practically all of the passes attempted by the red and black. When the East line tore open a hole, Garrity was there to close it up. Adding to his wonderful exhibition as a defensive player, Garrity accounted for four of the touchdowns made by the Twin Falls team, two coming as the result of long runs, one for 95 yards, and one for 60 yards, and the other two from line plunges that would have done credit to a battering ram.

To Captain John Smith and Bill Dera go the honors for the visiting team. These two linemen fought hard throughout to break up the Twin Falls play, and several times were able to get through the line and force the Blue and White backs to take a loss.

Prose, the south-paw of the Leopards, also played a clever game, although he is playing his first year of football.

Kincaid was another member of the visitors who gave a good account of himself. Kincaid hits the line hard, and was responsible for most of the gains made by East High through the Twin Falls line.

Timm, back, was the star in the first quarter. Timm's kick-off to Johnny Leiser carried the ball into the Twin Falls experienced line difficulty in making his yardage on his first attempt. 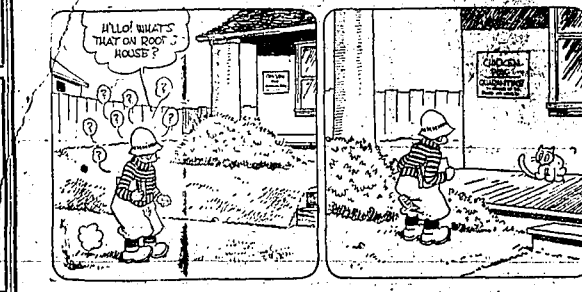
