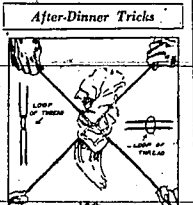

SENATOR BOAH ANSWERS CRITICS

Senator Borah introduced a bill in the United States which provided:

"That in all cases now pending, or which may hereafter be pending, in the supreme court of the United States, except cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, where is drawn in question an act of congress or a statute of a state on the ground of repugnance to the constitution of the United States, at least seven members of the court shall concur before judgment shall be pronounced or rendered, declaring said law or laws unconstitutional and void.

With the principle involved in the Borah bill, I am in complete accord so far as limiting the right to declare laws unconstitutional by a vote of less than seven of the nine members, provided, that the end is secured by a constitutional amendment, which would make provision for a method of assuring continuity in the development of our local constitutional system. But in his answer to the criticisms of the Spokesman-Review the distinguished senator follows his usual course of handing out brilliant conversations without getting down to baton at any point, and his resolution itself, assuming it to be feasible, is hanging in the air, like his evanescent world court plan.

If congress by enactment of a law has a right to declare that courts shall be compelled to enforce a measure unless seven judges declare it unconstitutional, congress by a statute has a right to abolish the court, or to abolish the presidency and compel courts to penalize a man who would attempt to act as president. In other words, congress is omnipotent. It would in that case have the legal power to abolish the whole constitution and continue it, self-in-control indefinitely, or until overturned by revolution. Legally, the British parliament has this right; and it does from time to time extend or shorten its own term of office aside from its method of dissolving and appealing to the electorate.

What we should realize at the start is that the power of congress without constitutional amendment to declare that the courts must enforce a statute whether they believe it constitutional or not, entirely changes the nature of our government. There are many clever arguments for changing our form, some of them very plausible, but they are based on a realization that if we are to make congress solely responsible, we must make our branch wholly responsible, and that is to do this, our entire constitutional system must be supplanted by another. The present form of American government is the most clumsy and unworkable from the point of view of what is called the theory of "responsible parliamentary government," while it is the most perfect model on earth of a government under a written constitution.

There would be some consistency in Senator Borah's advocacy of the passage of his bill if he intended to stage a revolution, but he doesn't. Borah never does start a revolution.

In his letter to the Spokesman-Review the senator says:

"I am perfectly aware that some of the ablest lawyers in the country think it unconstitutional, but if it is the court being partial as to its constitutionality, it is not being partial as to its constitutionality."

Of course, there isn't. And it is not palpably absurd for Senator Borah to assume that after the court has for more than a century and a quarter, asserted by its practice the right to declare certain acts unconstitutional, that it would deliberately stultify itself by the implied admission that it had no such power. Borah knows that it would declare the act unconstitutional. What then? If he were the Italian dictator, he would kick the court out. But he isn't. The Idaho senator, like the writer hereof is a constitutionalist. But why not go about this thing in the right way; why not submit a constitutional amendment? The Borah method is a delay, and even as an amendment would be a makeshift.

Senator Borah knows that the court is often divided as it was in the Newberry case into four divisions, sometimes two and two in view are shown in the majority and two in the minority. It was in Newberry case.

Now suppose that the Borah bill were carried as a constitutional amendment, and there were two minority opinions upholding a law which the majority thought unconstitutional and these were based on entirely different points of view. Congress and every minor court would then be at sea as to which principle to follow.

An amendment might be submitted and carried embodying the principle that seven justices should be necessary to declare a law unconstitutional, provided that congress, and the executive by and with the advice of the judiciary committees of both houses and of the attorney general should declare the law to be in effect and indicate which principle embodied in the conflicting minority reports should be considered the correct interpretation of the statute. In this way the development of law would be regular and consecutive.
