BASTERREDREA RELEASED FROM FELONY CHARGE

The defendant did not attempt to shoot, but Arizaca seized his wrist to try to get the gun away and in the scuffle it went off twice. The first shot went wild but the second hit Arizaca in the right breast and he fell. Arizaca was convinced that the defendant did not try to shoot his assailant.
