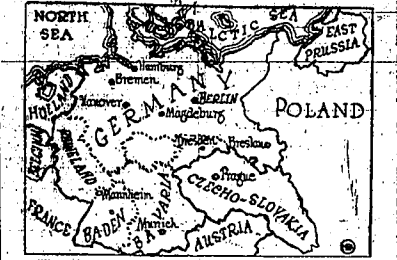

GIANTS SWING BIG DEAL WITH BOSTON BRAVES

 NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Reorganization of the New York Giants, promised by John McGraw and considered vital if the team is to be a factor in the next National league pennant race, has been started by another one of those well known Boston to New York deals. In the first of the shake up that McGraw proposed after the world's series, the Giants sent Dave Bancroft, Casey Stengel and Bill Cunningham to the Braves for Bill Southworth and Joe Osceola.

Bancroft will succeed Fred Mitchell as manager of the Braves and Mitchell, it is understood will purchase a minor league franchise. In announcing the deal last night McGraw said the New York club had three purposes in making the swap—to strengthen a weakness in the outfield, to give Bancroft a chance to better himself and to help Chicago, Madison's Braves. Cunningham, one of the most promising young outfielders in the league and Casey Stengel, one of the best workers in the business. 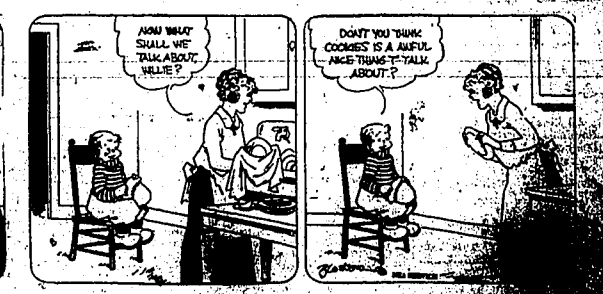

RAILROAD TO START SHORTLY

Belief Expressed That Crews Will Begin on Line from Rogerson in December; Last of Eleven Surveys Shortens Line Three Miles, Cuts Out Tunnel and Saves a Million Dollars.

That the railroad construction work on the line from Rogerson to Wells will start next month about the figures of the engineers now in the hands of the Union Pacific men with full approval and authority it is stated by residents of Contact. The statement agrees with previous information received here. The survey is now complete after the line was run 31 times.

The truth of the specific details in regard to particular work was not generally admitted, correct, as the total estimated cost of construction was reduced over one million dollars since the contractor's estimate was published in the local newspaper.
