Stresemann Advised by Pan German Element to Terminate Resistance

WOULD PERMIT FRENCH NATION TO RULE RUHR

Pressure Brought to Bear on Dictator in Present Turnout.

BERLIN, Nov. 14.—Members of the Pan-German party today were pressing the Stresemann government to break with France even at the risk of war, it was learned from well informed sources. Stresemann plans to ask supporting the Ruhr population for their own France, an amendment yesterday were considered attributable directly to influence of Pan-German leaders.

"Germany would cease negotiations and in France give her worst possible terms," was the plan. "Through this step might mean loss of the Ruhr and the Hiltnerland, the German government would never admit of any extension from the Reich and all Germany would consider their loss only temporary," it was said today.

The last of the subsidies to the population of the districts will cease by November 25, if the plan adopted yesterday in a conference between Chancellor Stresemann and representatives of the occupied regions is carried out.

The taxes for county purposes as shown on the real estate levy are approximately \$27,000 less than last year. This is a far greater reduction than Dan Comer of the county board predicted would be made in his speech before the Jefferson club last spring.

The celebration of Armistice day Sunday and Monday caused most of us to overlook the fact that this is the period for the annual roll call of the American Red Cross, which began Sunday and will end Thursday night, November 29. This period is set aside by President Calvin Coolidge as the time to get the names of all connected with this great work. It will take about \$12,000, 000 to run the Red Cross during the year which ends on June 30, 1924. About \$2,100,000, an increase of \$120,000 will be needed to care for veterans of the World war. Domestic demands are increasing. The roll call for this great and beneficent society should find everyone answering "aye" at the call of name.

WILL IT WORK?

The secretary of the interior announces that on January 1 next he will reorganize the reclamation department and make it what in effect will be a political bureau. As a senator, Idaho will be doing well in this new deal for two of the best political appointments go to Idaho men. But as to the successful working of this new plan, the people of Idaho can probably form a better opinion than the people of any of the other states, for both the leading managers have been in the public gaze as Idaho state officials.

D. W. Davis was not a bad governor and would probably have been a big success if he had not persisted in giving most of his time to politics instead of to the state. Miles Gannon was not a bad agriculture commissioner, though most of his energy was devoted to raising political hell generally. One may reasonably expect the new appointments to be of the same general character and we may expect a little fairly good work for reclamation and a lot of very earnest work for politics. It is difficult to see how an engineer who has any pride in his profession or desire to make a career can remain in this new organization.

By the way, was there not to have been a fact finding commission to decide what should be done to reclamation? Seems to me to put in the same pigeon hole with the engineers—Statesman.

EVADING THE ISSUE ON MARTIAL LAW

The men conducting the impeachment of Governor Jack Walton started the proceedings originally on account of the fact that the governor had declared martial law, it was said unnecessarily, in a large part of that state. Later it was asserted that Walton had hired men at state expense for private purposes, that he had improper dealings with oil magnates and a lot of other things, which, if true in all their implications, would warrant impeachment. This may all be true. If so, it was proper to inquire into these other matters in connection with his impeachment, and if sufficient and properly proven, he should be impeached.

Still, the fact remains that if there had been no martial law there would have been no impeachment. The application of martial law where there was no martial law because of the causes set up technically, as it was the principal one in fact. It was in this regard that the majority of the Oklahomans opined that turned the attention of people in every state toward the controversy in this commonwealth.

As shown in the article in The Times some time ago from the lawyer's reports annotated from which the entire chapter bearing on the subject was quoted, the governor of a commonwealth has wide discretion in this matter. If he abused that discretion the people ought to know it. Now we find that while Walton wants to be heard in this respect to this issue, his foes want to drop it. Why?

It is true, after all that he did not go too far in this matter? For even if it could be proven that he had a narrow technical right to do what he did the people would turn against him if the impeachment trial should show that he went too far.

Should the Oklahoma senate refuse to consider this main question of the Walton impeachment trial, and at the same time insist on proclaiming martial law and will be inclined to doubt the justice of any of the proceedings brought against him, and to discount heavily any of the statements made by witnesses testifying against him on other counts.
