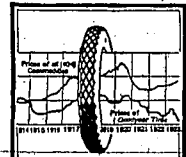
TUNES ON THE HANDKERCHIEF



KANSAS AT WAR WITH RABBITS

Doubling of Bounty Increases Annual Kill to More Than 4,000,000.

Topeka, Kan.—Four million jack rabbits in the annual "kill" of the Kansas hunters, according to an estimate prepared by state officials last week, the receipts of reports from nearly half the counties of the state are to the bounty that had been paid for rabbits during the year.

Damage Crops and Trees. Those who travel through Kansas on railroad trains or by motor car and are watching during the early morning or just about sundown can see the rabbits playing about in alfalfa fields or pasture lands.

It is estimated by officials that the average jack rabbit will do damage exceeding one dollar every year by trampling down wheat, alfalfa, clover and other valuable crops and cutting the young corn and sorghum plants.

The cost of living possibly may get quite a jolt downward as a result of the present condition of the oil industry.

Things were going along merrily, prosperously, in the oil industry—when suddenly the drillers struck enormous gushers in California. The oil from these wells is exceptionally high in gasoline.

California now is producing 40 per cent—two-fifths of the oil produced in the United States.

Very fine for the owner of the California well. But the owner of the well in other states is in a tight corner. His prices on oil yielding less gasoline to the barrel, have been slashed time after time. The result is that the producing end of the oil business in general is in worse shape, as far as profits are concerned, than any other big basic industry probably worse off than general farming.

As you probably know, oil production is, in the main, separate and distinct from refining. The pipe line companies and refiners let the small man take the chances at finding oil, then buy his oil—if he finds any and set prices without consulting him.

How can this affect the general cost of living? Here's how: There are about 280,000 oil wells in America, and new wells are drilled constantly. So the oil industry consumes enormous quantities of iron and steel, especially pipe, also wire and manila cables and a great variety of manufactured goods.

Prices always are about as high as the buyer can pay. An oil industry, operating on a losing basis, can't pay former high prices for supplies.

What'll happen? Unless oil prices rise again, prices of materials used by the oil industry will, by competition, fall.

Once started, there's no telling where such a drop would stop, nor how many commodities it would affect.

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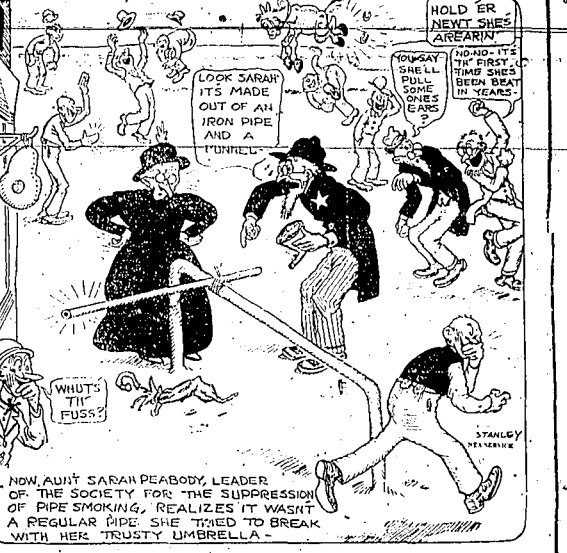
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ALBERT BUSHNELL HART OF HARVARD UNIVERSITY TO LECTURE HERE SOON

Famous Historian Will Give Interesting View of World Problems as He Sees Them.

Albert Bushnell Hart, noted educator and historian of Harvard university, is to lecture tomorrow on "United States and the World" in lecture at the Municipal Auditorium.

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There is nothing settled or academic about Dr. Hart's style. He speaks to our masses and always has something decidedly worth while to say—facts that can be pressed upon his hearer's old historical background and his incomparable insight in world affairs today.

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Large Flowers on Earth

Amorphophallus Put on Exhibition in the Famous Kew Botanical Gardens Near London.

In the tropical section of Kew gardens is a plant, the Amorphophallus, which produces the largest flowers in the world.

A man standing upright can barely reach the top with the tips of his fingers, and with open arms he can only reach half way round the circumference of the funnel-shaped spathe, says London "Tit-Bits."

The odor of the flower is said to be abominable—"a mixture of rotten fish and burnt sugar."

From the center of the quickly falling flower, the stem of the plant rises upward to a height of 15 feet, with markings like those on a python's skin.

Although the plant, which is a native of Sumatra, looks like a pre-juvenile young tree when fully grown, it is really herbaceous in habit, dying down annually like the wild arum or cuckoo-pint, to which it is allied.

The Kew specimen is about six feet high and will not be seen in bloom until next year.

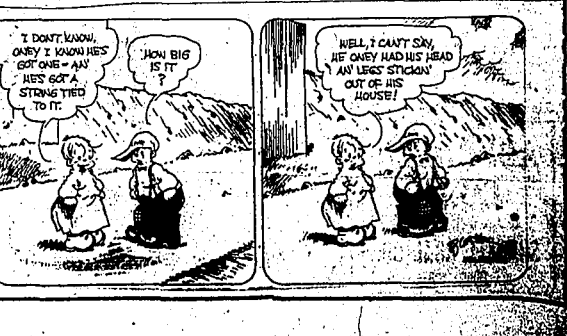

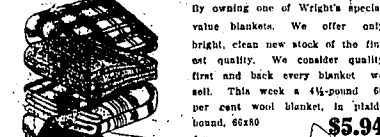

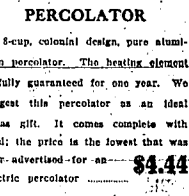
