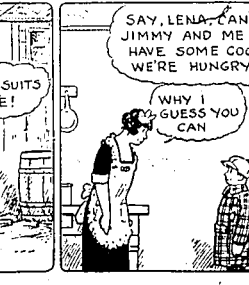

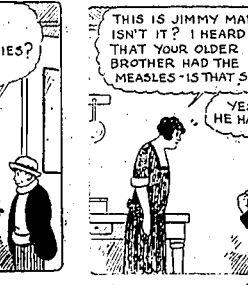

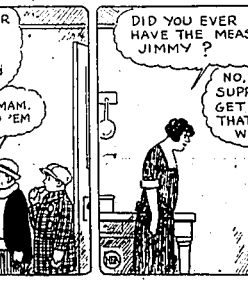

Clearing through the Twin Falls line at will, and excelling in every department of the game, also Burley high school football team defeated the Twin Falls high school squad for the district championship at Burley Saturday afternoon by a score of 16 to 14.

The bludgeon of Bill Kerschlake, center, with his super open work and end runs of "Burr" Canine proved to be too much for the lighter Twin Falls team.

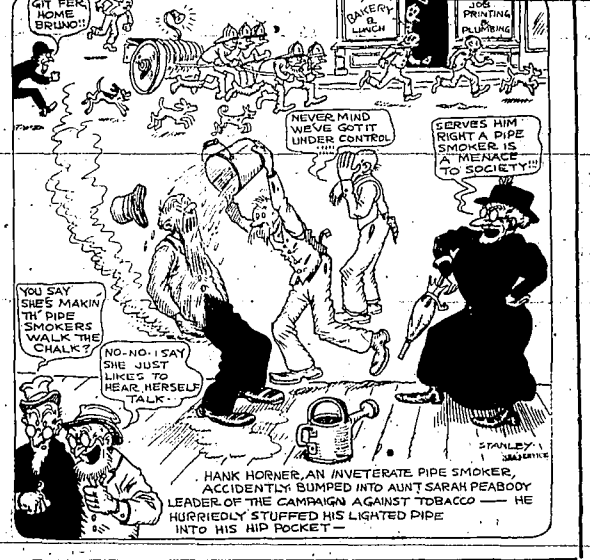
