

Governor Walton Ousted by Senate

Impeachment Trial Ends Dramatically

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Nov. 19.—Governor J. C. Walton was ousted from office today by vote of the Oklahoma senate. The impeachment trial which started November 3, came to an end with the senate voting today guilty on article 19 of the 23 presented by the house, found the vote on the other articles being unimportant. Immediately after the court's judgment was rendered Walton's counsel entered a protest and filed a motion for a new trial. This was merely a matter of form. Judge F. E. Biddle, the ousted governor's chief counsel, entered the protest to have it in the record. A fight to return Walton to office over the heads of the senate will be carried to the supreme court of the United States next month.

Ambassador Council in Partial Harmony While Europe's Peace Totters

Germany stands pat against surrender of crown prince, declaring country will not give him up under any consideration; Stresemann addresses the Reichstag. BEELIN, Nov. 19.—Germany will not surrender the former crown prince even if France takes military action. Chancellor Stresemann made this flat declaration in a speech at a party caucus of members of the Reichstag. He declared federal courts must deal with the leaders of the recent Munich rising. Germany's refusal to submit to reimposition of military control by the allies despite French demands was also emphasized by the chancellor in his bid for support of his party. "Many persons assert that peace no longer exists and demand a nationalist dictator and that a dictatorship came about it would be the most independent form of government conceivable," the chancellor said.

ACT OF VALUATION IN WAR DAYS

The man, who is now in a hospital, is expected to recover.

Eminent Jewish Literary Genius Scores His Loss

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Israel Zangwill today included members of his own race in his caustic criticism of anti-Semitism. He lamented the failure of Jews in the United States to fight the "Klans" and the "Klax" and the Jewish publication which he said was "a half people in this city with cold feet."

COURT ADVISED TO WATCH STEP

Supreme Tribunal Should Exercise Restraint In Legal Cases. CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Unless the United States supreme court is more restrained in its decisions with cases concerning congressional legislation, congress and the courts will be in a constant state of conflict. This is the opinion of a leading legal authority.

Throng Sees Oil Gusher Near Fort Collins, Colorado

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 19.—North Colorado towns and cities were gathered yesterday with 25,000 persons to witness the gusher near Fort Collins. The gusher is expected to produce a large amount of oil.

The High Priest of Our Confession

TEXT—We have such an high priest.
Heb. vii.

The Hebrews epistle opens with the declaration of the glories of Christ and of His exaltation at God's right hand because of the finished work of the cross in which He has for ever put away sin. But it proceeds to display His unblinded work in which He is now engaged on our behalf in the presence of God. As the High Priest of our confession He represents us in the holiest and presents us before God in all His own perfect and glorious life.

Of the priests of Aaron's line it is said in chapter 6:4: "And no man taketh this honor unto himself, but he that is called of God, as was Aaron," and of our High Priest it is added: "Who also Christ glorified not himself to be made an high priest; but he that said unto him, Thou art my Son, today have I begotten thee." Now this quotation from the second Psalm has been declared in Acts 13:33 to apply to Christ in His resurrection. It is therefore His virgin birth that is contemplated; but "this day have I begotten thee" from the death of God's Son. His blood. As He comes forth from the grave in His call to the priesthood.

It is not that Christ has been made without an oath, but His with an oath by him that said unto him, The Lord avoweth and will not repent. This art a priest forever after the order of Melchizedek.

Most God take an oath! He has done so, not once but thrice, and that thrice the oath has been to the testimony of our Lord Jesus Christ. In the one hundred and tenth psalm, "Quoted here, it guarantees to Him not only the perpetuity of the priesthood, but that He shall come to assume his crown, for Melchizedek was both a priest and a king." By the call to the throne of our Lord Jesus Christ appears in heaven on our behalf.

The Priest's Entrance into the Sanctuary
In chapter 9 of the tabernacle and the typical ceremonies of the day of atonement are described. The two goats brought to the priest on that day's was slain, and the priest taking 'one blood inside the veil, sprinkled it upon the mercy seat, and then he took the blood of the other goat, and sprinkled it on the horns of the altar. The two goats formed a part of the ceremony that formed a part of it appeared the cloud of glory, symbol of Jehovah's presence among His people. The cherubim are the representatives of His throne and the symbols of His right of ascent. Their attitude is significant. It is as though they were swooping down to execute the judgment required by the innocent victim, and then they are suddenly arrested in their flight by the sight of the blood. The blood of that innocent victim, shed upon the altar, met the demands of the throne so that it becomes a mercy seat. This ceremony is referred to in Heb. 9, and verse 21 proceeds: "But Christ has come as an high priest of good things to come; neither by the blood of goats nor by the blood of calves, but entered once into the holiest, having eternal redemption."

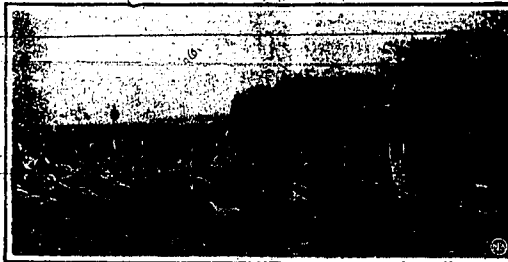
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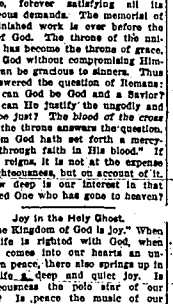

SHOULD BAR THE HOHENZOLLERN

While former crown prince of Germany is enjoying the luxury of a castle, following his five years' exile, France is arranging to bring about his expulsion, seeking in this way to bar the Hohenzollern dynasty from becoming rooted again on German soil.

The United States is interested in the return of the crown prince to Germany and the possibility of the Hohenzollern dynasty coming back into power and as an associate with the allies in the World war it is the duty of this country to register a vigorous protest against the return of Friedrich Wilhelm and the prospective return of his father, the ex-emperor.

France is showing courage and is right in protesting against the return of the crown prince and to endeavor to bring about his expulsion. Poincaré should have the undivided support of his allies in the world war in his stand.

HOW CAN A POOR MAN GET AHEAD?
